

STANFIELD MAKES KNOWN HIS PLATFORM.

Eastern Oregon Rancher to Make Vigorous Campaign for United States Senator.

Stanfield, Ore., Jan. 10.—At the annual Committee Meeting of the agricultural and dairying interests of Umatilla County, held here today, R. N. Stanfield, Republican candidate for the nomination of United States Senator, was the principal speaker. There were hundreds of his neighbors and life-long friends and acquaintances present, and in the course of his address he stated the principals upon which he would stand in his campaign which are as follows:



1. To support the national administration and the heads of the government with all my ability and energy in the speedy and vigorous prosecution of the war to a peace satisfactory to the democracy of the world and compatible with the highest ideals of our civilization. 2. To a selective draft in practice as well as in theory, which shall insure organization of the national army and at the same time save the necessary labor and supplies for the continuation of our industrial pursuits and commerce. 3. To an equitable control and regulation of food supplies, commerce and industry, and the establishment of a primary market in Portland on equal basis with Chicago and Eastern ports. 4. To a nation-wide prohibition and to all measures which shall make it practical and operative and not theoretical. 5. To establish by the federal government of a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia river. 6. To effective rural credit legislation and administration with a particular view to its adaptability to the needs of Oregon. 7. To construction by the federal government of a military highway along the Pacific coast, and federal aid in the construction of permanent highways. 8. To see that Oregon participates,

resultful representation in Congress at Washington. "I pledge myself, if elected United States Senator, to respond to every appropriate call upon me for service to my country and similarly pledge myself, if defeated, to perform, to the limit of my ability and opportunity, every task that may be allotted to me as a citizen. I have sought always to do the latter; I hope I shall during my campaign be able to convince the people of Oregon that it is to the general interest for them to do the former. I do not assume that I have greater capacity, diligence or understanding than others; but I know, as all know, that there are many things to do which have not been done, and which I think I can help to do. For these reasons I offer myself to the people of Oregon as a candidate for United States Senator at the Republican primary in May. "I am a farmer and a stock raiser. I am a native son of Oregon. I have had a modest part in its industrial, commercial and political life. I have had personal contact with some of its problems, and I have had a definite and growing interest in others; and I believe I know as well as another what is needed for development of the state's mighty resources. There should be helpful national legislation, an end of administrative neglect and discrimination, and a vigilant and persistent presentation, before the legislative and executive departments of the federal government, of Oregon's deserts and wants. "I expect, if elected Senator, to serve at all times every proper interest and to be at the command of every citizen with a rightful claim on the government's attention. I hope and expect at all times and in all practical ways to serve the whole public, so that there would no longer be necessity, when a crisis or emergency arose at Washington of concern to Oregon, for Chambers of Commerce or Commercial Clubs, or public bodies of any kind, to feel obligated to protect their interests through private and unofficial representation. I shall also expect my acts to advertise me and my service, and I should not seek undue publicity before either action or accomplishment. "I understand full well that the people of Oregon will not elect me Senator, or to any office, unless there shall be good reasons for their action. They should not, and of course they will not, grant me their favor because I desire it, or ask it, but they will, and they should, prefer that candidate who it seems to them it can serve them best. If the nature of any duty or service is thoroughly studied and well comprehended, it is already partly accomplished. "A Senator should be well informed as to every phase of Oregon's present development and future prospects; and he should have the wish, the will and the knowledge to act promptly and fearlessly on every occasion. I believe I know what should be done for Oregon, and I know the people know that much can be done that has not been done, and I have to convince them that I am sufficiently well equipped to perform the important duties of the senatorial office. "In that spirit and with complete confidence in their good judgment, and with an abiding faith that their decision will be correct, whether it is for or against me, I submit my candidacy to the Republican voters of Oregon, as later I shall submit it to the whole people if duly nominated."

England's "Bit."

The persistent attacks of the Germans and anti-English Irish among us on Great Britain since the beginning of the war have also been directed toward making France, Canada, the United States and every one else possible dissatisfied with Great Britain's share in the war. The facts do not substantiate this charge. Great Britain has 45,000,000 population, in contrast with 30,000,000 for France, 36,000,000 for Italy, 175,000,000 for Russia and somewhat more than 100,000,000 for us. This 45,000,000 has furnished a far larger proportion of the naval strength and shipping than any other nation, and has done this from the beginning of the war. This has also necessitated bearing most of the odium attached to the blockade which was for the general benefit of all the allies as well as England. From the beginning, also, they have furnished more money than any other nation. In the first two years of this war they did not furnish as many men as either France or Russia, but at present the British army in France is about as large as the French. The British have, besides, an army in Egypt, another at Saloniki (as have also the French), and another in Mesopotamia. Moreover, the British Isles have furnished as many men in proportion and suffered as great a loss as any of the colonies, besides putting forth an extraordinary industrial effort.—World's Work.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR KNITTERS

Red Cross Needs Sweaters and Trench Caps, so Get Busy.

Are you knitting? The Red Cross gives the clearest explanations of how best to make the things that should be supplied. Below are the Red Cross instructions for the new sweater and the trench cap: Use khaki-colored or dark gray yarn for sailors. Use No. 5 needle for sweater; No. 3 needles for trench caps. Directions for Sleeveless Jacket One-half pound yarn. Cast on 80 stitches; knit two, purl two for four inches, and then add one stitch after every fifth stitch until there are 96 stitches. From this point knit every stitch on right side. On wrong side slip one, purl one, slip one, purl one all the way across. When sweater is 14 inches long bind on last four stitches on each side to reduce width at armhole. Then knit plain first and last six stitches on each row for border around armholes. When sweater is 21 inches long knit plain for two inches. Knit 32 stitches, bind off 24 for neck very loosely, knit 32. Knit back and forth on last 32 stitches, allowing six ribs for shoulder (Be sure to stop on the inside edge.) Break off thread and knit six ribs on other shoulder. Cast on 24 stitches on same needle and fasten the thread to thread of first shoulder. Continue plain knitting for two inches. Then make back like front casting on four stitches on each side at end of armhole. When back is 19 inches long, bind off every sixth stitch, reducing number of stitches to original eighty. Knit two, purl two for four inches. Sew up sides to point where notch of arm hole begins. Finish neck with single crochet and buttonhole arm hole for two inches from each side of seam, or finish entire armhole with one row of single crochet. Directions for Trench Cap. Cast on loosely on three needles 112 stitches, 40-30-30. Knit two, purl two for six inches, knit one round plain. Knit two stitches together, knit eleven, knit two stitches together, knit one. Repeat to end of round. Knit four rows plain. Then knit two stitches together, knit nine, knit two together, knit one. Repeat to end of round. Knit four rows plain. Continue in this way, narrowing on every fifth round and reducing number of stitches by the narrowing stitches left on two (as seven five, three etc.) until you have twenty-eight stitches left on needles. Divide on two needles, having fourteen on one needle and fourteen on the other. Break off wool thread length and use darning needle. Holding the knitting needles together with "front" needle next to you, wool at right end of "back" needle, you are now ready to finish the cap. With wool always under knitting needle and at right of darning needle, slip darning needle through the first front stitch in the position of knitting and slip stitch off the knitting needle. Slip darning needle through second front stitch in the position of purling and leave stitch in the knitting needle, making a prepared stitch. Draw wool close as in knitting. Slip darning needle through first back stitch as in purling and slip stitch off knitting needle. Slip darning needle through second back stitch, as in knitting, and leave stitch on knitting needle as a prepared stitch. Now slip darning needle through second front stitch in position of knitting and slip stitch off knitting needle. Slip darning needle through third front stitch in position of purling to prepare. Purl second back stitch, slip it off knitting needle and knit third back stitch to prepare. Continue until all stitches are slipped off and then weave thread lengthwise through the cap for four inches. Also thread the length of wool at be-

ginning of cap and weave it likewise. This cap may be drawn over the ears or roll back, covering only top of head.

ANOTHER LIBERTY "DRIVE."

What Tillamook County Did at Two Previous "Drives."

There is to be another Liberty Bond "drive" soon, and it is our duty to come to the support of the government and help it win the war. This may appear to some as coming quite often, but it is a most serious war that the United States have embarked upon. President Wilson and the government says we cannot quit until the war is won and the military rule of Germany stamped out. It is going to take piles of money, and then some more piles of money, to prosecute the war to a final finish. It is no easy job that the country has tackled and far more serious than most of us realize. The government is again going to appeal to the people for another loan and most everybody who possible can should be prepared to buy more bonds.

Tillamook county participated in both "drives", the first raising a comparatively small amount as the following will show:

Definite quotas were given to the different counties and communities by state headquarters for the Second Loan, but these quotas were based on the minimum call, not on the maximum. Of Oregon's 36 counties, 24 responded with over 100 per cent of their minimum quotas, and two with over 167 per cent, which percentage was equal to the maximum quota. The counties in order of rank with percentage obtained as based on minimum quota are as follows:
