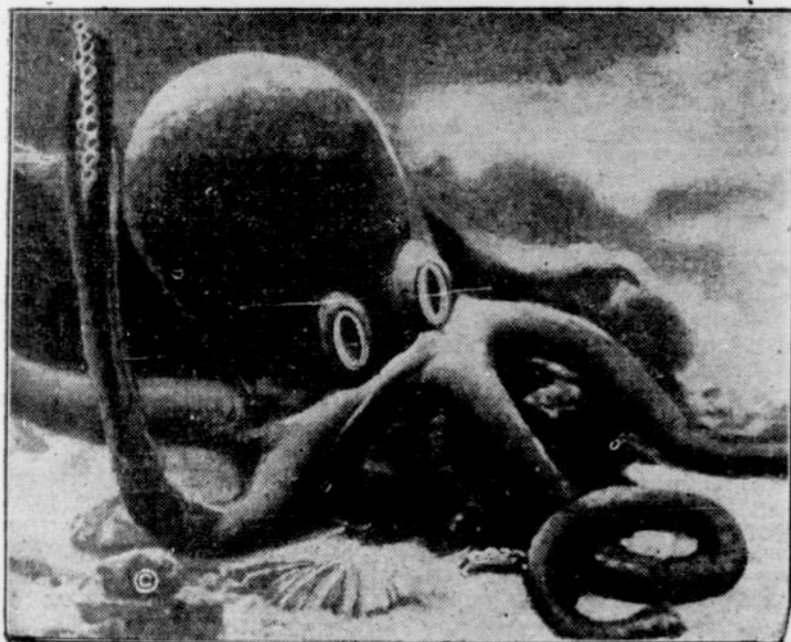

Advocates Advertising Cheese.

To the Editor of the Headlight:—
Your article in your highly valued paper in which you advised the dairy men of Tillamook to stay with the cheese business instead of starting on a new venture, is a good one. It seems to me that now is the time of a life time—it is the psychological moment to get our name and product on the market. Everybody is talking economy in food and clothing, the papers are full of it. Daily articles are appearing on the meat substitute. Cheese is the logical and healthful substitute which is backed by all the food authorities of the country, including the United States department of Agriculture. But what are the dairymen of this county doing to insure this market for themselves, what are they doing for the present and future output of Tillamook cheese and in what way are they taking advantage of the opportunity now given. It seems to me that up to the present time they have not done anything nor are they doing anything now.
I want to say to the dairymen of Tillamook County, don't sit back and be contented with our present sale, no matter if it has increased, let us get our products trade marked, identified and named. I feel confident that there is a big market awaiting the cheese manufacturer; and it is only a matter of getting before the public with our products, as cheese will constitute a goodly portion of the daily food in every home. If we will help ourselves and put some of our money

into advertising our products we will get it before the public and we will be in the lead as no one questions the quality of Tillamook cheese. I want to ask every dairymen to stay in the cheese business and put some real "pep" behind the Tillamook cheese in the form of advertising. Insist that your directors appropriate a sum for this purpose.
