PROPOSED COAST HIGHWAY.

For Military Defense of Pacific Coast--Tillamook County Included in the Project.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 21, 1918. Secy. Commercial Club, Tillamook, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—In today's mail I am forwarding you a pamphlet and map issued by the Pacific Coast Defense League, which, I believe, will appeal very strongly to your organization.

May I request that you call the attention of your Commercial Club to the work of the Pacific Coast Defense League, and that you display the map in a conspicuous place in your Club's rooms?

Mr. W. G. Patton, our field representative, may have already called on you and explained in detail to your members just what the Pacific Coast Defense League is trying to accomplish. If he has not already done so, either he or some officer of the league will visit you in the near future and, if agreeable, address your members upon the subject.

We believe that we have the biggest proposition that has ever been attempted on the Pacific Coast and that there is no possible argument against it. If you will study the map you will at a glance, realize that this System of Military Highways, as suggested on the map, is really the greatest means of defense for the Pacific Coast. We do not claim that these highways are located in the proper place, but it was necessary for us to make some kind of a suggestion and this map embodies this suggestion. The tentative locations was decided upon after exhaustive study and valuable assistance from the Highways Commissions of the States of Oregon, Washington and California. We are only suggesting these routes, leaving it to the United States Engineers to make a definite location in accordance with their own ideas.

We fully realize that this is not the time to attempt to build these highways and we do not ask the government to construct them at this time. Our first duty is to the present struggle and all our energies and resources should be devoted to pushing this war to a successful conclusion. We do, however, ask the United States Government to adapt an adequate System of Military Highways on the Pacific Coast, as a means of defense, and to appropriate sufficient money to make necessary surveys, permanent locations and estimates of cost of construction, so that by the time the war is ended, the United States Government will have definitely decided upon its plan of procedure and can then immediately start construction of these Military Defense Highways.

By the time the war is over, the United States will have no less than two million men in arms and probably a much greater number; the number depending entirely upon the duration of the war, the longer it lasts the greater number of men in the army. This will draw a great number of men from commercial and industrial activities and will, of course entirely disrupt the commercial and industrial status of the country. National endeavor will have been concentrated upon the production and manufacture of these particular articles which are necessary to carry on the war.

To plunge this country from a peace loving nation of industrial producers, to a patriotic nation concentrating all its efforts to supplying and producing the necessities of war, will not be anywhere near as great a change as changing this nation back to its original position; that of a nation devoted to peace and contented to devote all its energies to producing and manufacturing the necessities of the commercial world. For immediately upon declaration of peace, there will be thrown back upon the nation, without employment, an army of two million or more men, and the task of securing immediate employment for that great number of men, is one of tremendous difficulty and will bring the Government face to face with a problem fully as difficult to solve as was that of preparing the same army to enter the present conflict.

The producing, manufacturing and industrial conditions of peace times, will not immediately follow the end of the war, and it is safe to presume that when the war does end, it will end quickly and without very great previous warning. It will take time, and a great deal of time, in which to readjust the commercial and industrial activities of the nation, and it will be absolutely impossible for our Government to find employment for this great army of men immediately after the war is over. While employment is being found for them and during the necessary time which it will take to readjust the commercial and industrial conditions of the country, these men must either be supported by the government, or we will have on every hand, soup kitchens and bread lines, with its accompanying privations and suffering.

What a splendid opportunity will be offered by solving this difficulty if we can persuade the government to adopt these military highways, as a means of defense for the Pacific Coast, and immediately after the declaration of peace, set to work on these highways, whatever men of the army that are unable to find employment elsewhere. The condition outlined above is one that probably has
