quence it is expected that at least half
a dozen dairymen will put in milking
machines.

In the matter of rates, changes and
regulations of the Pacific Telephone
and Telegraph Co., the hearing will
be held at the office of the Public
Service Commission at the court
house, in Portland, on Wednesday,
Feb. 20 at 10 o'clock.

The Bayocean road is now finished
as far as the shipbuilding yard. It is
the intention of the county court to
gravel the road when the weather will
permit. A. Arstall, who has the con-
tract for the road as far as Flower
Pot, will resume work as soon as
weather will permit.

The local exemption board has re-
ceived instructions to proceed with
the physical examination of all draft-
ed men placed in class one. The ex-
aminations were discontinued for a
week, but a new order makes it com-
pulsory that all men in that class
must forthwith be examined.

C. A. Dunn, who was in the employ
of the State Highway Commission,
doing work in this county, is now at
Salem. He has charge of the new pav-
ing plant operated by the State High-
way Commission. He writes: "Keep
pounding that bond issue on the back
or Tillamook County will stay in the
mud."

Fred Metzke, of Cloverdale, pur-
chased 22 head of dairy cows in this
vicinity and took them to Tillamook
county for sale. Most of the bunch
were from the Lone Fir Dairy north
of town. Mr. Schunter, who has been
operating that place for the past two
years, will discontinue his dairy busi-
ness.—Newberg Enterprise.

A peculiar accident happened to
the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Will
Roberts, who live on the Kilchis
river, last week. It seems that the
child was sleeping on a bed, and in
awaking fell out, and in doing so be-
came entangled in the bed clothes, it
was strangled to death. The child was
ten months old.

The directors of all the co-operative
associations having separators will
hold a meeting at the City Hall next
Saturday, at one o'clock, to consider
the question of putting in a butter
plant. At this meeting some of the
dairymen want to take up the propo-
sition of paying for butter fat on the
flat plus six basis.

election of officers and other business
comes up. It is desired that a full at-
tendance will be had.

Word has been received by the
Women's Civic Improvement League
that the films for "Alice in Wonder-
land" have been sent to Tillamook. As
soon as they arrive here the date will
be fixed, which will be some day next
week. The play will be given at the
Gem Theatre, there being an after-
noon and evening performance.

Solon Schiffmann vs. E. L. You-
mans and W. E. Thomas is a suit filed
in the Circuit Court to recover
\$2500.00. It is alleged in the complaint
that defendant and plaintiffs owned
certain spruce timber, and that in
January 1918, the defendants wrong-
fully and unlawfully entered upon the
land and began cutting and removing
the timber, having removed approxi-
mately 100,000 feet valued at \$2,000.

Dr. J. E. Reedy, who volunteered a
few months ago in the Veterinary Re-
serve Corps, and was commissioned a
first Lieutenant, has been called to
active service. He will receive advice
as to where he is to proceed as soon
as instructions are received from
Washington D. C., which is expected
this week. Mrs. Reedy will go to
California, and they have rented their
home to Mrs. Jack Olson.

A bad accident occurred this morn-
ing when Sheriff Campbell's auto
driven by Dr. Reedy crashed into the
approach on Tillamook bridge and
capsized off the bridge. The others in
the car were Floyd Wilson, Jim Wil-
son and Fred McKinley. The auto fell
on top of the occupants into the mud
and it was fortunate that it was low
to the ground, otherwise they would
have been killed. Dr. Reedy, J. Wilson
and McKinley are badly bruised up
and had to be taken to the hospital.

Captain Louis O. Henderson, son of
Attorney J. L. Henderson, sailed for
France about the 1st or 2nd of the
month, and it was thought he might
have been on board the Tuscania
when she was torpedoed, but this can
hardly be the case, as there was not
sufficient time for him to have reached
the other side. Captain Henderson
is well known among Oregon Univer-
sity men, for he graduated from the
state university. His home was at
Hood River previous to joining the
army.

Milton A. Miller, Collector of In-
ternal Revenue for the State of Ore-
gon, has been notified by the Treas-
ury Department at Washington, D. C.
that the time for filing the 1917 in-
come tax returns, including individ-
uals and corporations, has been ex-
tended to April 1, 1918, thus giving
an additional month to that provided
by the War Tax Act of October 3,
1917. As soon as the blanks are re-
ceived each corporation will be noti-
fied. Collector Miller would appre-
ciate the early filing of returns, so
that the work of his office may not be
unduly congested.

The three ponies, offered by Russell
Hawkins, of Tillamook, as prizes for
the three best essays to be written by
the high school students, and the
grade school pupils of Oregon on the
subject, "What Can We Do To Win
the War", will be given to Miss Opal
Clark, of Washington High School,
Portland; Irma V. Coulter, of Hood
River, and Dorothy Christensen, of
Prineville. The contestant essays
were divided into three classes, each
of which tried for one of the ponies.
The first class was composed of grade
school students, the second of grade
school pupils aged 11 or more and the
third of grade school pupils aged 10
or less. Miss Clark was the winner in
the first class, Irma Coulter in the
second and Dorothy Christensen in the
third. Miss Kathryn Kirk, of Tilla-
mook, received honorable mention.

Died at her home in Bay City, Ore.,
Feb. 7, 1918, Mrs. Elizabeth Good-
speed, aged 69 years and 4 days.
Elizabeth Jane Harshman was born
in Whitley county, Indiana, Feb. 3,
1849. In 1866 she went with her par-
ents to Isabella county, Michigan,
where in Sept. 1868, she was married
to Elijah E. Goodspeed, who died
May 2, 1917.

Since coming to Oregon in 1907 she
has made her home in Bay City. She
is survived by three children, Mrs.
Flora Hicks, Egbert C. Goodspeed, of
Alberta, Can., and Mrs. Anna Hess,
of Bay City, Ore., and twelve grand-
children.

that the carrier leave Tillamook on
receipt of the mail from the afternoon
train. I understand this provides the
service desired and that the mail will
be advanced 19 hours.

from their society function Saturday
night.

The captains report nearly one hun-
dred attended the work rooms last
week. We still notice women sitting
on boxes. Where is that unused chair
from your house?

An Act to amend an Act entitled,
"An Act to incorporate the American
National Red Cross," approved Jan-
uary fifth, nineteen hundred and five.

Be it enacted by the Senate and
House of Representatives of the
United States of America in Congress
assembled, that section four of the
Act entitled "An Act to incorporate
the American National Red Cross,"
approved January fifth, nineteen hun-
dred and five, is hereby amended to
read as follows.

"Sec. 4. That from and after the
passage of this Act it shall be unlaw-
ful for any person within the juris-
diction of the United States to falsely
or fraudulently hold himself out as or
represent or pretend himself to be a
member of or an agent for the Ameri-
can National Red Cross for the pur-
pose of soliciting, collecting, or re-
ceiving money or material or for any
person to wear or display the sign of
the Red Cross or any insignia colored
in imitation thereof for the fraudulent
purpose of inducing the belief that he
is a member of or an agent for the
American National Red Cross. It

shall be unlawful for any person, cor-
poration, or association other than
the American National Red Cross
and its duly authorized employees and
agents and the army and navy sani-
tary and hospital authorities of the
United States for the purpose of
trade or as an advertisement to in-
duce the sale of any article whatso-
ever or for any business or charitable
purpose to use within the territory of
the United States of America and its
exterior possessions the emblem of
the Greek Red Cross on a white
ground, or any sign or insignia made
or colored in imitation thereof, or of
the words "Red Cross" or "Geneva
Cross" or any combination of these
words; Provided however, That no
person, corporation, or association
that actually used or whose assignor
actually used the said emblem, sign,
insignia, or words for any lawful pur-
pose prior to January fifth, nineteen
hundred and five, shall be deemed for-
bidden by this Act to continue the use
thereof for the same purpose and for
the same class of goods. If any per-
son violates the provisions of this
section he shall be deemed guilty of a
misdemeanor, and upon conviction in
any federal court shall be liable to a
fine of not less than one or more
than five hundred dollars, or impris-
onment, for a term not exceeding one
year, or both, for each and every of-
fense."
