and prices are now considerable higher than when we bought the above. When our accounts are all in, company can pay an additional \$621.44 to the bank, leaving that item then \$478.50.

LONG PRAIRIE CREAMERY CO.

Factory received 2,628,940 lbs. of milk during the year. 107,892 lbs. butter fat in milk. Average, 4.021 per cent fat, 55,588 lbs. December milk was separated and cream shipped to Portland, making 2,449 lbs. butter fat.

291,080 lbs. cheese made, making 4,080 boxes. Yield, 11.31 lbs. cheese per 100 lbs. milk.

2,527 lbs. butter fat was realized from skimming whey, and this sold for \$1,114.18.

Cheese sold for \$68,174.12, an average of 23.42c. Tillamook. No Long-horns were made and bulk of milk was received after prices had declined to lowest of year. Total receipts were, \$69,733.01. 1916 receipts were \$39,302.13. Receipts for making and hauling, \$7,199.35. Expenses for the year were \$7,057.86. \$845.00 was paid on separator account.

Factory received 2,980,970 lbs. milk. 120,593 lbs. butter fat in milk. Average, 4.045 per cent. 328,297 lbs. or 4,805 boxes cheese made.

Average yield, 11.2 lbs. cheese per 100 lbs. milk. Cheese sold for \$76,855.10. Average price 23.41c. Tillamook.

Of the above milk, 49,251 lbs. were separated in December, cream bringing \$1,167.20. The above milk contained 2,288.08 lbs. fat, or an average of 4.52 per cent. Our test to farmer was over 4.85 per cent.

Cheese sold for \$14,401.90, an average of 22.9c. the lb. Average yield was 11.27 lbs. cheese per 100 lbs. milk. Factory received \$1,603.33 for making cheese. Average yield, 11.61 lbs. cheese per 100 lbs. milk. Factory also made 1,830 lbs. of cheese for Beaver and Beaver made 408 lbs. for us. Company received \$2,483.54 for making cheese. Cheese sold for \$23,369.73. Expenses for the year were \$2,484.09. This includes dividends of \$100.00, \$36.35 was paid F. Heyd & Co. on new work.

Average yield, 11.24 lbs. cheese per 100 lbs. milk. Estimating December cheese still on hand brings the total year's make to \$30,649.98. Average prices received, 23.69c. per lb.

East Beaver also made up \$266.52 worth of cheese for company in March and \$111.97 worth of cheese in July, while this company made up \$87.72 worth of cheese for East Beaver factory during May. This would change the totals and averages above just a little.

Factory received \$3,296.82 for making cheese and charged for hauling \$106.60. Expenses for the year were \$2,500.95 as per itemized account.

Junior Red Cross Activities.

The literature, instructions, etc., have not yet been received in sufficient quantities to supply all the schools demanding information regarding the organization of the Junior Red Cross in the schools.

The Junior Red Cross is a new class of membership authorized by the American Red Cross, to enlist the school children of America in Red Cross work. All boys and girls of school age, attending public, private or parochial schools may join. It is open only to the student body of the school as a whole. Students individually cannot join.

Many of the schools are becoming very enthusiastic in the matter. The Tillamook City school is getting the work under way.

The children and teachers of the Fairview school are conducting a campaign for membership very energetically. The principal, Miss Glines, reports that the school will in a few days be 100 per cent signed up for the Junior Red Cross. That is a record to be proud of. The Fairview school is the largest rural school in the county.

The schools of Wheeler, Nehalem, Bay City, Beaver, Cloverdale, Oretown, Meda, and others not yet reported to this office are doing their bit in this way.

Instructions for all the schools will soon be forth-coming. Buttons will be furnished for the children of each school, application is received by the Local Red Cross Chapter.

Public School Pupils Interested in Thrift Stamp Drive.

This drive is being vigorously prosecuted, especially in some schools. General reports will not be received by Superintendent Lamb to the amount of stamps and certificates sold until the last of this week. The children are very much interested in saving the pennies to buy the Thrift Stamps.

The Bay City school leads in this matter as far as reported to date. Four of the pupils have sold \$50.00 worth of stamps and one girl sold \$109.00 worth. All these young people are enrolled in the Junior Rainbow Regiment, made up of the first thousand to sell at least \$50.00 worth of stamps in the state. They are aiming to make theirs a 100 per cent thrift school. They will win.

Many children are not buying candy etc., but saving every cent possible with which to buy thrift stamps. Teachers report quite a rivalry between children as to which can save the most and invest in stamps. After the child's first purchase, then he is naturally anxious to see the savings increase. It is a valuable lesson for the child.

The Industrial Club work in the schools is much better organized this year. Several schools are 100 per cent enrolled. The course in Food Preparation is a very profitable project for girls, while boys, gardening, dairy herd record keeping and pig raising are excellent training.

This year the government has set aside an amount of money for regular Industrial Club Extension work if the county meets the amount. The amount for this county is \$200.00, the county court appropriated a like amount. This sum is to be used to pay the salary and expenses of an agent of the O. A. C. Extension Service to be continuously in the field during the months of May, June and July and August to visit and instruct all boys and girls enrolled in the clubwork. This is done as a war measure to encourage more gardening, etc. The College has appointed Miss Claudia Brown of Sand Lake school, to have charge of this work. We are putting Tillamook County on the map in the line of industrial work, through the efforts of the teachers.
