Another effort is to be made to bond the county for \$425,000 for the purpose of building a hard surfaced road through the county. When the bond measure was submitted to the people last June it was carried by a large majority, 1499 voting for it and paid a glowing tribute to the boys 678 against. When the case was taken to the Supreme Court it was knocked out on a trival technicality. Then the question was raised whether another election could be held within twelve months, for the law provides that only one special election can be held each year.
