First Tillamook Boys Drafted.

Oregon must furnish 369 men for military service and entrain them for Camp Lewis, Wash., between March 29 and April 2, as its share of 90,000 men to be called up throughout the United States on those dates. No county in the state is to be exempted from this draft call, according to orders just received from the War Department by the Adjutant General of Oregon. The 369 men to be taken from the state on this call will be credited later on the quota Oregon is called to furnish in the new draft, the date of which is yet to be announced. To fill the present call, the 369 men required will be inducted out of Class one on sequence of their order numbers. Tillamook is to furnish only four men, the first on the list are Richard Elmer Meyers, Nehalem; Ernest Edmunds, Pacific City; Carl Emery, Hebo; Rowland Fraser, Tillamook.

Liberty Loan Boosters Meet.

A representative gathering of citizens from different parts of the county was held at the Court House late Wednesday afternoon to hear Attorney J. K. Kollok, of Portland, who came here to confer with those who will take an active part in the next Liberty Loan drive, which is scheduled to commence on the 6th of April. Frank A. Rowe, of Wheeler, is the manager of the drive for Tillamook County, and a large number of committees have already been appointed.

Mr. Kollok went into details how the drive was to be conducted, giving the local people considerable information on those points, for it is proposed to conduct an intensive campaign. What probability, is of most interest to the people of this county is the amount of money to be raised in Tillamook County, which Mr. Kollok thought would be double that of the last Liberty Bond Drive, which will be \$198,000. This will be determined on the amount of money in the four banks in the county on the 31st of December, 1917. There will be four bank districts in the county, the local committee having already designated the territory in each.

Teaching Trift in School Districts

The schools have been notified through the office of the County School Superintendent, of the house to house canvass for the War Savings Campaign for March 19 to 23. These orders came from the State Director of the War Savings Committee.

The quota allowed to Oregon schools is an average of \$20.00 for each child enrolled in the schools. Each should have earned and saved by December 31, 1918, the above amount. All teachers should make careful monthly reports to the County Superintendent, as the government will no doubt call for a report at that time, and we want Tillamook County to be in the list.

The following amounts have been reported to the County Superintendent to date:

No. pupils having Liberty Bonds, 19

Amount invested in Liberty Bonds by pupils, \$1050.00

No. pupils owning War Savings Certificates, 56.
Amount invested in War Savings Certificates, \$388.23.
No. pupils owning Thrift Stamps, 147.

Amounted in Thrift Stamps, \$169.00

The object of the government in this campaign is to start five million boys and girls in our schools on the road to thrift by becoming owners of Thrift Stamps.

The County School Superintendent asks this question: Has your boy or girl ever been inside a bank? The next time you are in town where your local bank is located, why not take him in and introduce him to the bank people? They will welcome you, you will be interested to note the effect on the mind of the child. He will not forget his first visit to the bank under such circumstances as long as he lives. The object is to cultivate an acquaintance of and confidence in responsible men of sound financial institutions, so that as he grows to manhood he may be saved from possible financial loss by consulting reliable men before embarking on questionable financial ventures.
