**Notice.**

To Whom It May Concern: Whereas, the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners of the State of Oregon has propagated and stocked and is propagating and stocking the waters of Tillamook Bay and its tributaries in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, with salmon and other food fish, and;

Whereas, said Tillamook Bay and its tributaries are frequented by salmon and other food fish, and for the purpose of protecting the same, the said Board of Fish and Game Commissioners has decided to close certain of the tributaries of Tillamook Bay, as follows, to-wit: Hoquarton Slough above a point on said slough where the quarter section line running north and south through the center of sections 24 and 25, T. 1 S., R. 10 West, Willamette Meridian crosses said slough; and also that portion of said slough between a point 100 ft. above the uppermost portion of the mouth of Stillwell Ditch and a point 100 feet below the lowermost portion of the mouth of said Stillwell Ditch; and also that portion of said slough between a point 100 ft. above the uppermost portion of the mouth of the Old or North Fork of Trask River and a point 100 ft. below the lowermost portion of the mouth of the Old or North Fork of Trask River; and also all that portion of the Tillamook River above a point thereon where the township line running north and south between Ranges 9 and 10 West of the Willamette Meridian crosses the Tillamook river; and also the whole of Trask River, including the main river and all its branches, forks and tributaries, and also that portion or branch thereof which empties into Hoquarton Slough and commonly known as "Stillwell Ditch" all being in Tillamook County, State of Oregon, to prevent fishing therein by any means whatever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling, for salmon and other food fish.

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given by said State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners that said portions of said tributaries of said Tillamook Bay, described as follows, to-wit: Hoquarton Slough above a point thereon where the quarter-section line running north and south through the center of sections 24 and 25, T. 1 S., R. 10 W. of the Willamette Meridian crosses said slough; and also that portion of said Hoquarton Slough between a point 100 ft. above the uppermost portion of the mouth of Stillwell Ditch and a point 100 ft. below the lowermost portion of the mouth of said Stillwell Ditch; and also that portion of said Hoquarton Slough between a point 100 feet above the uppermost portion of the mouth of the Old or North Fork of Trask River and a point 100 feet below the lowermost portion of the mouth of said Old or North Fork of Trask River; and also that portion of Tillamook River and its tributaries above a point on said river where the township line running north and south between Ranges 9 and 10 West of the Willamette Meridian crosses said Tillamook River; and also the whole of Trask River, including the main river and all its branches, forks and tributaries, and

also that portion or branch thereof which empties into Hoquarton Slough and is commonly known as "Stillwell Ditch," all being in Tillamook County State of Oregon, are, and each and all of them are, hereby closed to fishing of any kind, except with hook and line commonly called angling, for salmon and other food fish, from and after the first day of April, 1918, until said tributaries of said Tillamook Bay are again opened to salmon and other food fish fishing herein prohibited as provided for by Section 5316 L. O. L., as amended by Chapter 400 of the General Laws of Oregon, for 1917.

And it shall be unlawful to fish for, or take or catch salmon or other food fish in any of the said waters so closed from and after the 1st day of April, 1918, and any and all persons violating the provisions of this notice will be prosecuted as by law provided.

Section 2—Any minor who shall violate any provision of this ordinance upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$10.00 and in default of the payment of such fine, shall be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine shall be discharged at the rate of one day's imprisonment for each \$2.00 of such fine. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. The present ordinances of Tillamook City being inadequate to properly restrain minors from being upon streets at late hours it is declared that the provisions of this ordinance are necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and it shall be in effect immediately upon its approval by the Mayor.

Read for the third time before the Common Council at 9:30 o'clock p.m. March 4, 1918, and passed at 9:31 o'clock.

**ORDINANCE NO. 360:**

An ordinance to regulate the going of children on the streets at night and declaring an emergency.

The people of Tillamook City do ordain as follows:

Section 1—That no minor under the age of 17 years shall be permitted to go abroad upon or wander about the streets of Tillamook City after the hour of 9:00 o'clock at night at any time during the months of October, November, December, January, February or March, or after the hour of 10:00 o'clock at night at any time during the remainder of the year, unless such minor shall have the written permission for that date, of his or her guardian or parent, in his or her possession, or shall be accompanied by such guardian or parent, or unless
