Tillamook Erects Liberty Temple.

The Liberty Loan enthusiasts of Tillamook City arranged for the erection of a Liberty Temple and on Tuesday morning the work was started on a building where Heaston's barber shop was located. All of the carpenters in the neighborhood volunteered their services and the carpenters and others were a busy bunch when work started in the morning. A. crected and the large number of citizens who were doing their "bit" to have the building finished that evening. At noon dinner was served in the

Notwithstanding the weather was same as if it had been a bright, sunny day. At six o'clock in the evening the building was finished, painted, with electric lights, and ready for occupancy. The building is 18 by 24 feet with five flag poles at the top. The middle pole will have the Stars and Stripes and the others will carry the flags of our allies-England, France, Italy and Belgium.

The building will be used by the committee having charge of the Liberty Loan drive in the Tillamook bank district. As Tillamook County's quota is expected to be some where near \$200,000 this will entail a good deal of work on the several committees, but the people in all parts of the county should heartily respond. and buy liberally of the Liberty Loan
