**Editorial Snap Shots.**

Now that new receivers have been appointed for the Bayocean property, we hope they will be able to straighten out the difficulties.

With the exception of about half a dozen men, those employed at the ship building plant are Tillamookers, who are doing as good if not better work than in other ship yards. That speaks well for Tillamookers.

Lane county has appointed over 80 road patrolmen to take the place of road supervisors, who are to act as foremen of road work in their districts. That means, practically, Lane county has over 80 road bosses.

There is every indication that the war will continue for several years, and that there will be some severe fighting on the Western front this summer, with a big casualty list. The allies have a hard fight before them, but they will win out in the end, for Germany's man power will grow weaker every battle it engages in.

How strange, a gentleman connected with a farm paper was in the city this week and boosted for Olcott for governor. As Olcott is a smooth politician, and Governor Withycombe is an experienced farmer and who has helped more than any other man the agricultural industry of Oregon, we cannot understand how any person connected with a farm paper or any farmer can see any logic in supporting a smooth politician for governor in preference to a man with vast agricultural experience. The dairymen of Tillamook county are wide awake, but we do not think they are going to vote for a smooth politician, especially as Governor Withycombe has made a splendid war governor.

It is the desire of a number of business men that the Headlight should endeavor to induce private parties to get into the rived spruce business, as the government is wanting a large supply. There are many places in the county where private parties can start small camps, but not enough spruce suitable for riving to put in large camps. This should prove a profitable employment, and it is hoped many of our citizens will make an effort to rive spruce for the government. As there is no prospect of the war coming to a close for several years, the rived spruce industry in this county promises to become a big industry. This is another opportunity where Tillamook people can assist the government, and we sincerely hope that our citizens will do so. We understand that the government will haul the spruce if those who are riving it will place it on the main road near where it is rived. It was the business men of Tillamook City who gave their financial support in starting a shipbuilding plant, to assist the government in obtaining more ships, and they are now anxious to assist in every way possible in expediting the production of rived spruce for the government. As there are plenty of men in the county who are accustomed to working in the woods, they would be the proper persons to take hold of it.

The next Liberty Loan drive is to start April 6th, and the first day of the drive is to be made a record breaker in Tillamook county. There are at least 1000 men in the county who should pledge themselves to subscribe \$1,000 or more between now and the 6th of April. Will you be one of those who will do so? It is that much money saved and earning you a good rate of interest. But that is only a minor matter. Uncle Sam needs your cooperation and financial aid in the bloody war Germany forced upon the world. The person who only takes a \$50.00 or \$100.00 bond when he should take \$1,000.00 or \$2,000.00 is not showing a very patriotic spirit. Probably there are some persons in Tillamook county who do not realize the magnitude and seriousness of the world war, but now that our soldiers are being slaughtered and a long casualty list is published every day, the horrors of the war will be more keenly felt in the United States. Citizens living in this favored section of the county have nobly responded in the past to every drive that have been made, and now that the government is making another call for financial assistance, we feel sure that the citizens of Tillamook county will readily comply. We appeal to everybody to do their best, so that on the first day of the drive Tillamook county will have reached its quota, so between now and the 6th of April go to the bank in your district and notify it as to the amount of Liberty Bonds you will take. Do it now. Don't wait until tomorrow or next week. Be one of the responders.

**The Commercial Club and the Rived Spruce Controversy.**

The action of the Tillamook Commercial Club in calling attention to the waste in getting out rived spruce is a matter for fair discussion, for one must admit that the method is wasteful, as well as a fire menace to the entire county. There is no getting away from these facts, and that was the reason some of the members of the club took the matter up and sent a telegram to the Oregon delegation at Washington. Colonel Disque took exceptions to what was written, but the substance of the telegram was what was gathered from mill men as well as those who had started in to rive spruce. The members of the club thought the waste could be avoided if the spruce was logged and taken to the saw mills, especially as the government has been advising people to Hooverize and stop waste. Colonel Disque claimed that the saw mills were not getting out spruce fast enough, there being an urgent demand for the same for war purposes, and no matter what it cost the government had to have the spruce. That placed quite a different complexion on the situation, for waste or no waste, it was a military necessity, and no obstacles should be placed in the way of obtaining it. The letter from Colonel Disque was referred to members of the club and they have made reply which we give below.

Dear Sir:—Your favor of the 14th inst. addressed to myself as President of the Tillamook Commercial Club duly received and contents noted.

Speaking for the Club, as well as for all loyal citizens of this community, I will say in answer that it was not nor is it now my intention on the part of this club to hinder or delay the work of the government in the matter of getting out spruce for the swift and effective prosecution of this war, having in view also conservation and efficiency. With us it was simply a question of the best means to the speedy end. We all realize that the government has made mistakes in the manner of conducting the war, which is to be expected, as was shown by Senator Chamberlain, and we as loyal citizens simply wanted the government to know what mistakes, if any, was being made in the matter before us.

We know nothing of the method of "riving" of the spruce timber, except what came to us from mill men and others who claimed to know how the work was being conducted.

What we said in our letter which you much objected to, was almost word for word from source mentioned. We are just as anxious as you are, representing the government, in making this war as swift and effective as possible, and are glad to know from you, that our views as stated in our letters are erroneous. We did not wish to throw a straw in the way of the government in prosecuting this war swiftly and surely. But we do think that there should be, and undoubtedly will be means provided by the government and our local authorities working together, to protect our vast timber tracts against the fires which this

method of getting out the spruce is sure to cause and to do something for our roads, which the heavy haul of said timber are cutting to pieces. We are much pleased to know that the method the government is pursuing is the proper and only method, in view of conservation of time, the all essential element in the winning of the war in getting out this spruce. We are willing, if no other way can be found, that every foot of our timber should be destroyed by fire, or otherwise sacrificed, in order to win the war, and we are standing right at the back of the government in every way, and offer Uncle Sam, not only our timber, but all we have and own, together with our lives, subject to the government's wishes.

Still we reserve the right to criticize what does not seem to be right, but are always willing to acknowledge our mistake, as in this instance, and want you to understand that the mistake is one of the head and not of the heart, and in the future you will find no body of our citizenry more eager to give the government and you, as its representative in this spruce output, than is the Tillamook Commercial Club.

We are sending a copy of this letter to our delegation in Congress.

**Tillamook Boy Heard From.**

How glad we always are to hear and see news from our boys in Uncle Sam's service. We hear more about those in the army than those in the navy, but there are a few things of interest from Peter Wyss, Co. A. 6th U. S. Naval training Station, San Francisco, California.

Well, first of all, we are stationed at Goat Island; the climate here is much like that of Tillamook just at present, but one never knows much about that until they have lived in one place at least a year.

On February 22nd the people of Oakland gave a celebration in honor of the sailors and soldiers, everything being free to men in uniform. We were first taken auto riding about the town and adjoining country and then to Berkeley and shown through the beautiful university of California. In the evening we were taken to our hosts' homes and had supper, we were entertained most royally and we'll not soon forget the kindness of Oakland's people.

Once a week we get liberty from 1 p.m. until midnight. Last Sunday a few of us were fortunate in securing 36 hours liberty and we made good use of that time. We went to San Francisco which takes about half an hour, on a government boat free of charge. One of San Francisco's most wealthy men took us sight seeing about the city. We went to the park and to the famous Golden Gate and Cliff House, there were about 2000 people there and from the looks of the cars, every person must have owned one. It certainly was a sight worth seeing. Wouldn't Lewis and Clark open their eyes in astonishment if they could see what a change has come over their old camping ground. Our host took us to the Young Girls' Club for supper where we enjoyed an exceedingly pleasant evening.

The people of Oakland, San Francisco and the other towns are certainly good to the men in uniform.

For the most part we are well although we do sometimes enjoy minor sickness such as we have at home, but are always sent to the hospital and well cared for. We live much out of doors, have good plain food to eat and plenty of work consisting of drills etc. The Y. M. C. A. furnishes us many amusements such as movie theatres, lectures and the like, also stationary and plenty of reading material.

I will probably be stationed here for about six months more and then sent to sea and in my endeavors to "get Kaiser Bill's mustache" I hope to meet the many Tillamook boys also engaged in the same occupation. Our hats off to Oregon and three cheers for the good old U. S. A.
