Is the Slogan of the Tillamook County Third Liberty Loan Boosters—Business to be Suspended the 6th April and Patriotic Parade in Tillamook City.

The Liberty Loan Board held a business meeting Tuesday evening and adopted the slogan "Over the Top the first day," for the Liberty Loan drive. In order to live up to this slogan the Board determined that the business houses should close Saturday, April 6, until four o'clock in the afternoon. It was the sentiment of the Board that this policy would allow the business men to devote all their time that day to the taking of subscriptions to the loan and insure the success of the slogan "Over the top the first day."

The desire of the board is that the people take care of their business in town so far as possible on Friday April 5th, so that the entire day of Saturday, April 6th may be devoted to the pushing of the Liberty Loan campaign. The Board urges that the people make up their minds now to buy bonds and buy them on the first day of the drive, Saturday, April 6th. You intend to buy bonds, buy them the first day. Our country and our allies are depending on us, and it is up to us to do our full patriotic duty.

A proclamation; Tillamook County is to go over the top on Saturday April 6, 1918, by subscribing its quota of the third Liberty Loan in one day.

To insure success, a holiday is hereby proclaimed for Tillamook City on this date, to continue until 4 o'clock p.m. All places of business shall remain closed until that hour, unless the loan be sooner subscribed.

Bond Issue is \$3,000,000,000.

Washington, March, 25—The third Liberty loan, to open April 6, will be for \$3,000,000,000, and all over subscriptions at 4 1/2 per cent interest.

Bonds of the first loan, bearing 3 1/2 per cent interest, may be converted into the new bonds, but those of the third loan will not be convertible into any future issue.

The Jersey Sale Next Week.

The Curtis Jersey sale to be held in Tillamook, April 2, promises to draw a big crowd. It is probably the greatest herd of production bred Jersey cattle that has ever been offered at public auction either east or West, and buyers will be present from long distances.

A little analysis of the breeding represented in this herd we believe will be of interest to the dairymen of Tillamook county. The herd is headed by Pappy's Golden St. Mawes, a son of Rosarie's Olga Lad, who sired 27 register of merit daughters at the Ed. Cary farm, Carlton, Ore., and is out of St. Maues Poppy, the best daughter of St. Maues, her record being 1,120 pounds of butter in a year. This young bull has sired some grand individuals and thirteen of them will be in the sale. A number of the heifers already in milk so that those interested will not only know the value of the breeding stock of the animals but will get a line of what they are apt to produce.

Another sire represented in the herd is Lavina's Olga Lad, a son of Rosarie's Olga Lad, and out of one of the good daughters of St. Maues. St. Mawes was a bull that was developed by Ed. Cary, at Carlton, and that was sent to slaughter before his daughters freshened and demonstrated that their sire was an unusual one from the standpoint of production inheritance. Twenty of his daughters are in the Register of Merit and according to the official records, no other Jersey sire in the world has twenty or more daughters that average so high as those of St. Mawes.

There will be fifty-six cows, heifers and bulls in the sale and eight out of ten of them are of the St. Mawes, or Rosarie's Olga Lad blood lines. It is a line of breeding that is known wherever Jerseys are found and that it was developed in Oregon is a good reason for keeping it here.
