**Editorial Snap Shots.**

The outlook of the world war might have been quite different had the United States made proper preparations when Germany invaded Belgium.

Please don't worry as to what the other fellow is going to subscribe in the Liberty Loan drive. It is the big or small amount you are going to subscribe which will count in going over the top the first day.

A socialist member of the Bavarian lower house made the statement that "1,300,000 Germans already had been killed and the country's debt is now over a hundred million marks (\$25,000,000,000)." With a few more weeks fighting like the past week, Germany's death loss will be 2,000,000 men.

If a newspaper man should publish false reports about persons and business men he is liable for a damage suit, and it is right that he should be sued and made to pay. Why not apply the same rule to citizens who peddle false reports about other people? It seems to us that a good many false reports are going the rounds and they should be stopped and a damage suit against gossip mongers might do a whole lot of good right now.

The Kaiser poked fun at the little contemptible English army. It is now fighting the most titanic battle of the ages, inflicting the severest punishment on the Kaiser's army in the present war. Rah, rah, for British pluck, and bull dog tenacity. But our sympathy and praise for our British allies should not be stinted, and we American citizens should be the first to show our appreciation of their valor and determination to wipe out Kaiserism and the junkers of Germany from off the face of the earth, for the British have suffered great losses.

Lord Nelson's admonition to the British fleet when it started the battle of Trafalgar was: "England expects every man to do his duty." The same thing applies to the Liberty Loan drive, with this difference. "The United States expects every man to do his duty." The day that Lord Nelson uttered those words he received a fatal wound on the battle ship victory and was carried below to the cock pit where he expired. But the Victory was one of the ships that carried on the fight and won what is known as the battle of Trafalgar. Every person who subscribes for a Liberty Loan is helping the country win a victory over the tyranny of a blood thirsty Kaiser and the junkers of Germany, who are fighting to conquer the world and bring it under their rule.

Everyone should get the Liberty Loan spirit, and everybody should do their bit cheerfully. That is the spirit that should prevail in Tillamook county when the Liberty Loan drive starts one week from next Saturday, and should be kept up while the drive lasts. There will be no misgivings about this county not reaching above its quota if we all start with the right spirit, keyed up with enthusiasm and our patriotic duty. The government of the United States is making a demand upon us to do our best and we should all liberally respond, considering it a grand privilege to do so. We appeal to every person in Tillamook county to get the Liberty Loan spirit, making this the biggest drive ever pulled off in this county. That would be insignificant to what the English army has been up against the past week, and which saved the allies from a severe and crushing defeat.

"Over The Top in One Day!" That is the slogan of the Liberty Loan boosters in Tillamook County. The Headlight suggested this several weeks ago and the committee thought it was a good idea and intend going over the top on the opening day of the drive. Most of our citizens have made up their minds, also the amount of money they are going to subscribe and this can be done in one day, without extending the time over several days. That is the idea the committee want us to impress upon the people of Tillamook county, and we hope they will readily comply with the wishes of the committee. It is not even necessary to wait for the opening day of the drive, for persons can go to the banks in their banking district and make arrangements to have their subscriptions placed on file and recorded on the opening day of the drive. Do not delay but attend to it right away. We feel sure Tillamook county can go over the top the first day and we feel sure it will do so if there is no delay in our citizens recording their subscriptions.

The snap shot man is in doubt as

to the best policy to be pursued in regard to road work. There is good business judgment in the idea of conserving as much road money as possible, and delaying the road work in the county until such time as labor and material are cheaper. From what we can gather, it will be a loss of about 40 per cent of the road money to build roads now. From that point of view it would seem the most sensible thing to do to conserve the road money. This is what some of the other counties are doing. On the other hand however, there are roads that should be improved for local travel, especially where local industries have been established, which must and should be looked after. That is the situation that now confronts the county court. So we have about reached this conclusion, conserve as much of the road fund as possible but not retard the industrial development of the county where roads are absolutely necessary. There are roads in the north part of the county, to the logging camps, that should be improved, as soon as possible, which is a military necessity, and the question of economy should not enter into it, and no time should be lost in keeping them in good condition for travel. That and the main road between this city and Cloverdale are roads that should be improved, and should other road work be delayed on account of the extra cost of construction, people should not become impatient or complain.

F. C. Baker, of the Headlight, Tillamook, is to be candidate for joint representative. Fred is a booster worthy the name and as a representative in the Legislature Tillamook County would get all she is entitled to or something would be doing. The Courier will boost the Headlight editor and we believe Tillamook County will give him a big vote.—Cloverdale Courier.

Don't be too swift Bro. Taylor, for Bro. Baker has not a very lofty opinion of himself of making a good state legislator. If there was any pork hanging around the state capital that belonged to Tillamook county we'd be hog enough to hog the whole barrel, even if it was porkless day, but that is not the only requirements. So, please, Bro. Taylor, do not fore us in to become a candidate for joint representative. We do feel, however, that Tillamook county should put up a good man for the position and the county should be ably represented in the lower house.

It has been thought wise to defer the election to bond the county until the general election next November. This may not meet with the ideas of some of our citizens who are out and out boosters for a hard surfaced road through the entire length of the county. But after giving the matter a little consideration, we believe they will see the wisdom of this. In the first place, it is doubtful whether the government would allow the county to sell bonds, and coupled with the high rate of interest and the extra cost of construction on account of scarcity of labor, which is needed elsewhere, it has been thought wise to delay the county bonding until fall. This would save the expense of holding a special election. And another thing, even if another special election was held, by the time the legality of the same was thrashed out in the courts, it would be too late this year to expend the money, even if the war should cease and the country return to normal conditions. Should the citizens decide to bond the county at the fall election, and there is no doubt whatever but they will, the county will be in a position early next year to map out an excessive road program. Taking all the conditions under consideration, we think this is the wisest thing to do and to the best interest of the county and the good roads movement for a hard surfaced road through the county.

**The Frame-Ups.**

The Rowe-Baker frame-up which was to boost Representative F. A. Rowe for U. S. Senator for the short term, has developed another frame-up in Portland. The Portland frame-up is to this effect: Ex-United States Senator Mulky is to run for the position, and when he is elected he is to resign and the Governor to appoint the Republican who is elected for the long term. We hope Representative Rowe will file his petition and give the Portland frame-up a run.

We cut this from an exchange: Editor Fred C. Baker, of the Tillamook Headlight, has sprung the name of State Representative F. A. Rowe for United States Senator for the short term, which will cover a period of but a few weeks. Baker thinks it will give Tillamook some advertising and will also give the county some prestige when it comes to going after harbor improvements.—Newberg Graphic.

Fred C. Baker, editor of the Tillamook Headlight, has entered into a political frameup whereby he is to boost a friend for the short term United States senatorship and the friends of the other man are to boost the editor. But we are afraid Baker will never make it. He is too honest and gives publicity to the deal in his own paper. One so lacking in political sagacity is too innocent to associate with the pork barrel statesmen at Washington. Otherwise than that Baker seems to have many of the necessary qualifications.—Cottage Grove Sentinel.

**Rowe is Pleased with Work.**

Frank A. Rowe, County Chairman of the Tillamook County Liberty Loan Committee, is pleased with the work thus far. He says: "I am greatly pleased with the way the Liberty Loan campaign is being organized. In the several districts of the county the committees which have charge of the work are working hard to get their organization primed for the work. With such hard working and capable men at the head of the work in the various communities as we have I feel positive that Tillamook County will by far oversubscribe her quota. While the 3rd loan has been fixed at \$3,000,000,000 all oversubscriptions will be received and the race or competition between communities will be to see which will supply the largest oversubscription. A large oversubscription will have the effect of showing the German people that the people of the United States are now thoroughly awakened to the situation and are determined to supply all the money necessary for the successful completion of the war and the absolute destruction of German militarism. A large oversubscription to the Loan will mean a longer period before the next loan and this would have a beneficial stabilizing effect on business conditions."

**Do You Want Bolshevism?**

In these troubled times many agents are abroad trying to appeal to peoples sympathies and patriotism, not for patriotic purposes, but for personal gain. Many conscientious and patriotic people are getting bit by these agents without knowing what they are getting into. One of these schemes being promoted at the present time is the National Non-Partisan League. This organization, in states which it has gained a foot hold has affiliated with the Socialist and I. W. W. and thus lines up against the government and law and order. Of the fees collected to join, the agent soliciting members gets about one third. When stock is sold for one of the organization's stores only 90 per cent of the first \$10,000 is available for purchase of stock of goods all over that is used to promote the organization and swell the pockets of the promoters.

Organization is not done out in the open where men will have a chance to talk it over and exchange opinions and ideas but a man is cornered and filled full of soft talk and told how he is abused until he really thinks he is and finally buys a "bottle of the patent medicine" that is to cure all social and financial ills. The new member is then asked to keep still about it until some time later so that the neighborhood will not get to talking the matter over. Anything of this kind that has to be organized in secret and then spring on the people and will not stand discussion at public gatherings is not, as a rule a very good institution to tie to. Who suspected that the Bolsheviki in Russia had such forces until they finally broke out and now we know that the leaders of Russia had sold out to the German Kaiser and Prussianism.

Do you, Mr. Farmer, want to tie up with the "Wabbles" the Bolsheviki and the pro-Germans in working against the very thing our boys in France and our farmers, spruce men and shipbuilders and all of us at home are fighting for? If not, then be careful about joining the non-partisan league which is dominated by bosses to greater extent than any political party the country has ever known. You only need to investigate the matter thoroughly to be convinced.

A Citizen.

The greatest steam locomotive in the world has been put into service by the Baldwin locomotive works. It is so gigantic that its boilers had to be made flexible at three different joints so that the locomotive could turn around a curve. It is more than 100 feet long and weighs some 450 tons. Twenty-four drive wheels, each standing as high as an average sized man, afford its traction.

The French soldier is paid \$20 a year; the German \$38 a year; the British, \$89 a year, and the American soldier, \$360 a year. War is now costing the nations of the world six and a half million dollars an hour and 160 million dollars a day. The United States is under an expense running to fully one-fourth of the total amount, at least 40 million dollars a day.

A colored minister of the Baptist church, so runs a story, in order to strengthen and confirm the faith of his congregation, took as his text: "In those days came John the Baptist preaching in the wilderness of Judea." **Fatigue and Toxin.**

The idea that fatigue is due to a specific toxin, as suggested by Weibart early in the century, has been a popular one, but the late investigation of Lee and Aronovitch at Columbia university shows it to have no good foundation. There is nothing, therefore, to encourage the hope that an antitoxin may be found. In the experiments made with animal muscles, a test muscle suspended in the juice of a fatigued muscle lost much in contractile power, but the juice of a non-fatigued muscle produced substantially the same effect.

**Largest Poisonous Reptile.**

The Surucucu, known as the bush-master, is the largest poisonous reptile in the world, and is fortunately rare and found only in the depths of the jungle and swamps, where man rarely penetrates. It attains a length of twelve to fifteen feet; the color of its body is rose, or rather yellowish pink, with brown patterns and tints of purple. Its bite is almost always fatal. Its fangs are an inch long and as much as ten ounces of venom have been extracted.
