He was standing on one of the runners of a sled of heavy timbers which was being used to haul machinery when the line running through a pulley on one runner of the sled became entangled and jerked the two runners together crushing the body between them.

The Club will meet at Red Cross headquarters for work on the last Wednesday of each month. The afternoon was pleasantly spent finishing booties for the Belgian Relief. Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Lovejoy were the invited guests present. The hostess served a dainty lunch at a table decorated consistent with Easter. The next meeting will be April 19 at the home of Mrs. Richer.

Captain O'Brien, of the 447th Aero Squadron, was in the city on Wednesday, and he informs us that one week from next Saturday members of the

squadron will give a dance at Garibaldi, the proceeds to go to the Red Cross. He came up from the camp at Miami to challenge Tillamook to a game of base ball at the fair grounds one week from next Sunday, and it is the intention of Captain O'Brien to form a league with Nehalem, Wheeler, Tillamook and the 447th Aero Squadron.

Sheriff Campbell returned to Tillamook on Tuesday from Portland where he had taken eight pro-Germans and I. W. W.'s. The federal authorities ordered the internment of Herman Solaro and Otto Amme, both German alien enemies. Anthony Pietila a member of the I. W. W. when he reached Portland, said he had been misguided in joining the I. W. W., and tore up his card in proof of this. He gave his word that he would return to Tillamook and join the Royal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, when he was released.

Herman Solaro, who was employed by the Tillamook County Bank, was taken to Portland on Sunday and turned over to the federal authorities. For a long time the people of Tillamook county have been suspicious of Solaro, who visited most parts of the county on horseback, and some had him sized up as a spie. Solaro is about 35 years of age and came to the United States in 1910. He has two brothers in the German army. When Solaro came to the United States he was accompanied by a German spy named Steins, who was recently arrested in New York. For some time Solaro worked as steward at the Elk's Club in The Dalles and then came to Tillamook. Some one phoned to Portland from Tillamook that "If you don't intern this fellow Solaro at once somebody will have to bury him". Last fall Solaro had been placed under bonds by the government, and on Monday he was interned until the close of the war.

D. L. Shrode, chairman of the Tillamook Liberty Loan committee with M. F. Leach, W. B. Alderman, F. D. Small and Fred C. Baker went to the ship yard on Wednesday, and at noon Mr. Shrode gave the shipbuilders a talk on the Liberty Loan drive, and in doing so said every man there should take a Liberty Loan Bond, which he believed they would do. The men gave several rousing cheers showing how interested they were in the drive. It is safe to say that the men at the ship yard will do their bit, not only in building one of the best ships for the government, but will help considerably in putting Tilla-

mook county over the top next Saturday. Everybody who are working at the ship yard are loyal, patriotic citizens and they take a keen interest in their work, everything progressing in a most satisfactory manner, and when the vessel is completed it will be a credit to everybody who have been connected with its construction. As an illustration of this, when the government inspector was in last week he was more than pleased with the fine workmanship put into the building of the boat, which will insure more contracts from the government.

Sale of Registered Jerseys Bring Remarkable Prices.

The H. H. Curtis herd of registered Jerseys which sold April 2nd, in Tillamook, brought the highest average price of any Jersey sale that has been staged west of the Rocky Mountains, and we believe, west of the Mississippi River. Fifty-three head brought a total of \$18,100.00, or an average price of \$341.00. This included all the animals big and little and certainly was a remarkable showing.

The bull, Poppy's Golden St Mawes No. 131311 brought \$1700.00, which is also a record public sale bid for the same territory. A group of ten Tillamook Jersey breeders bought the bull jointly. They are as follows: P. W. Todd, Wm. Maxwell, Claude Ackley, I. H. Neilson, Gus Peterson, Solhe Smith, Joe Donaldson, Ed. Cary, T. H. McCormack and Leonard McCormack.

This bull is, without doubt, one of the richest bred bulls in America, or in the world. His dam St. Mawes Poppy, has a record of 1120 lbs. butter in a year, and has 2 sisters with over 900 lbs. and 4 more with 740 lbs. The sire, Rosaries Olga Lad, has 15 daughters with over 500 lbs. butter in a year, most of the records being made in the heifer class. The bull is almost a perfect Jersey type. He sired many of the youngsters that were sold in this sale. The good this bull will do this county in the years to come is hard to estimate.

St. Mawes Waltz Rosarie, No. 299-348 topped the females for \$850.00, going to Will Maxwell, has a heifer record of \$549 lbs. butter. This cow is in calf to the \$1700.00 bull and due May 14th.

Her yearling bull, bred by the same sire, sold to Joe Donaldson for \$400. Mr. Donaldson was the heaviest buyer in this sale, getting 7 head for \$2925.00. He got some of the choice ones, among them, Eminent Lad's Pussy, a very showy cow, all dairy type, and picked by some, before the sale as the top cow.

At 8 o'clock in the evening about 50 of the members of the Tillamook Jersey Club and visitors sat down to a banquet at the Tillamook Hotel. Jersey spirit ran high and the praises of the breed were sung by nearly all those present. Morrison Mills, president of the club, acted as toastmaster. The proceeds of the lunch at the Fair Grounds at noon and \$30.00 from the sale of one of the bulls went to the local Red Cross, or a total of about \$63.00.

It is most gratifying to note that of this entire herd of Jerseys sold here only 6 head were bought by parties outside of the county, in spite of the fact that several outside bidders came with the idea of taking away all of the best animals.

Program for Parade on Saturday.

The parade formation and line of march at 11:00 o'clock a.m. Saturday April 6th.

Formation will be as follows:

- G. A. R.
- W. R. C.
- Red Cross
- School children
- Fire and Drum Corps
- Firemen
- Patriotic Boosters, women and men.
- The Liberty Board, G. A. R., W. R. C., and Red Cross will form in order as given, on Stillwell Avenue facing North, head of column resting on 2nd Street. School children will form on south side of 3rd St. facing Stillwell Ave. and west. Fire and Drum corps and Tillamook Rifle Club will form on north side of 3rd Street facing Stillwell Avenue and west. Firemen will form on South side of Second street facing Stillwell Avenue and West. Patriotic Boosters, both men and women will form on north side of 2nd St. facing Stillwell Avenue and West.

Line of March will be as follows: North on Stillwell Ave. to 1st St.; thence east to 2nd Ave. East, thence South to 4th St.; thence east to 3rd Ave. East; thence north to 2nd St. thence west to 1st Ave East; thence south to 4th Street; thence east to 3rd Avenue east; thence north to 2nd Street; thence west to 1st Avenue East; thence South to 4th St. thence east to 2nd Ave. east; thence north to 3rd St.; thence west to 1st Ave. East.

It will be strictly a walking parade unless there is some one who is feeble or unable to walk, in this case they may use auto or other conveyance and form on Stillwell Avenue south of school house. There are not enough autos for all to ride, and Our Boys Over There are not riding in autos, so why should we on this one occasion.

Children from schools in county districts will report to Mr. Bowman at school grounds, who will give you place in the line.

There is a place in the ranks for everyone. See that you yourself are in line. If you are not a member of any of the organizations taking part in the parade, take your place with the patriotic boosters. No matter what or who you are or where you are from, we are all on the same level in this fight, both men and women, so be on hand.

If there is not 500 people in the parade we all will be disappointed.

Parade will be short, only marching 16 blocks, about 1/2 mile so do not let that be an excuse for you not being there. Parade will start at 11 o'clock.

Organizations and all who take part be at your place by 10:30 o'clock. If you have a flag be sure and have it with you.
