If there is not 500 people in the parade we all will be disappointed. Parade will be short, only marching 16 blocks, about 1/2 mile so do not let that be an excuse for you not being there. Parade will start at 11 o'clock.

Organizations and all who take part be at your place by 10:30 o'clock, If you have a flag be sure and have it with you.
