Learn How to Substitute Food Stuffs And Help Win the War.

Much is being said and done these days in the way of Food Conservation, especially of the essential food stuffs needed to feed the army and our Allies. Every American household is willing to substitute so far as they know how. The Home Science Department of our Colleges have been working to find the best methods of using substitutes without lowering the nutritive value of food or injuring the palatability.

That the results of their findings may be placed before the housewives so they can put them into effect, they are sending out Demonstrators to meet the ladies of the various communities and explain the best use of substitutes.

Report of Tillamook Cow Testing Association.

A total of 271 cows were tested for the month of February, yielding an average of 493 lb milk and 21.4 lbs. butter fat. The high herd was that belonging to Carl Hunt, who's 10 cows averaged 570 lb milk and 28.45 lbs. fat. Mr. Hunt also had the high cow with 1050 lbs. milk and 48.3 lbs. fat. The average cost of feed per cow for the whole Association was \$5.03. The honor roll as follows:
