Big Dramatic Moments at Gem.

There are many picturesque and moving scenes in the Vitagraph's visualization of Hamlin Garland's novel, "The Captain of the Grey Horse Troop", which comes to the Gem Theatre next Monday, April 14. JAIL TERM FOR BOOTLEGGERS

"Tillamook Kid," who Squealed, Gets Deferred Sentence.
Something of a jolt to the alleged liquor rings brought to light through grand jury indictments of a few weeks ago was delivered Monday, when three San Francisco men, who confessed to complicity in workings of the rings, were given six months in jail by Federal Judge Wolvorton.
Two of the men showed they had borne excellent reputations and all sought to escape with fines. These facts brought them no special consideration.
Howard Edmunds, known as "Tillamook Kid," and Walter E. Hardy, said to have been the working heads of the two rings, and Joe Cressens, fessed to packing the liquor in trunks for shipment, had sentence deferred, though all pleaded guilty to the conspiracy charge they face. This is said to point to interesting developments when the trials of more influential of the supposed operators are called. In other words it is believed this trio will take the stand for the government.
The three San Francisco men upon whom sentence was pronounced after they entered pleas of guilty were Gus Temps, Fred Tibbetts and John J. McKenna. Temps is owner of the City Express Company in the Bay City. His part in the ring regime was that of handling and forwarding the liquor-laden trunks upon stolen baggage checks.

SPLENDID RECORD MADE BY TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

Went Over the Top Before Liberty Bond Drive Commenced.

"Over the top the first day" was Tillamook County's slogan in the Liberty Loan Drive, which started last Saturday, but that proved altogether too slow for the Tillamook county bond boosters, for Tillamook county was over the top before the drive started and was well on the way over the second top when the drive commenced.
Tillamook county set a fast pace far in advance of other counties, and when the first day's work in the drive was completed, the county had more than double its quota and aiming to go over the third top. Saturday evening it was estimated that about \$25,000 had been subscribed, and when the drive is over it is confidently expected that it will have trebled its quota with \$315,000.
Saturday was practically a closed day as far as business was concerned, and people flocked here to take part in the parade. The Liberty Temple was the scene of activity where Liberty Bonds were being disposed of as fast as they could be written, and at six o'clock many persons had not been able to get in to buy them.
A delegation, composed of the members of the County Court, Mayor R. T. Boals and business men with the fife and drum band went to the ship yard of Feeney-Bremer Co. A chicken lunch was served in the hull of the vessel, when over 150 sat down, and also took part in the patriotic exercises that had been suggested by the shipping board.
D. L. Shrode, who is chairman of the committee of this bank district in the Liberty Loan drive, was the toastmaster, and when he announced that Tillamook county had doubled its quota up to that time, this brought forth a round of applause. Dr. Boals was then introduced, and he made a good speech, being applauded every few minutes.
Headed by the fife and drum band the party marched from the hull of the ship to the ship yard. Here Captain S. S. Johnson made another of his patriotic addresses, which was followed by the raising of the Shipping Board's ensign under that of the Stars and Stripes. This brought forth another great cheer.
St Clair I. Thomas read a communication from the Shipping Board addressed to the shipbuilders, after which the crowd repeated the oath of allegiance. The gathering came to a close when one of the men called for three cheers for President Wilson, followed by three cheers for the Shipping Board, the Superintendent and Feeney-Bremer Co.
The parade in Tillamook City in the afternoon brought together a large number of people. It was a little late in getting started, but no one appeared to be impatient. It was some what of an attractive parade. A brass band played patriotic airs as the procession followed it through the business portion of the city, made up as follows: W. R. C. and G. A. R., members of the Red Cross, school children and the junior Red Cross, Tillamook Hose company, employees of the A.F. Coats Lumber Co., and a long string of business men and others. The patriotic exercises were at the Liberty Temple, where the service flag of the Hose Company was displayed and the names read by Thos. Coates, each of whom came in for applause. Mrs. Fred Poorman sang two vocal solos and the national anthem was led by the choir, followed with orchestra music.
Captain Johnson addressed a meeting at Bay City on Saturday afternoon, and State Senator T. B. Handley talked to the boys in the logging camps at Nehalem the same day.
The Oregonian stated on Tuesday: "Wheeler, in Tillamook County, was the first community in Oregon, probably in the United States, to earn the proud right to ten stars on its honor flag, commented state officials Monday as they cast up the returns.
"To the Federal Reserve Board will go forward information that Wheeler, a little town in Tillamook, to which they apportioned the puny sum of \$9000, already has sold \$90,000 worth of patriotic pledges.
"Tillamook county with four banking districts, has heavily oversub-
