## Editorial Snap Shots.

It is remarkably strange how the German war lords and junkers of that country misconstrue every speech that President Wilson makes.

If your name is not included with the Liberty Loan subscribers, and you are financially able to buy one, what is your reason for not supporting the government in this critical time in the history of the United States?

To sum up the war in a few words, the Kaiser, who was ambitious to rule the world, is responsible for the great sacrifice of life, the cruelty, the distress, the suffering and the debt every country is plunged into. Such a fiend as the Kaiser should be wiped off the face of the earth, for he and the junkers of Germany are a lot of cold blooded murderers.

Bro. Shrode surely knows how to fix the weather man, for fine weather helped to make the Liberty Loan drive a success Saturday. Say, Bro. Shrode, what brand was it you doped the weather man with? But what a contrast to the opening of the last Red Cross drive, when a real live southwest snorter deluged the county with torrents of rain for several days.

"A quick, decisive war, would be a good thing for Germany, but a prolonged war would mean bankruptcy." That was the opinion of German bankers previous to that country starting the horrible war in answer to a question by the Kaiser as to what effect a war would have on Germany's financial standing. A big indemnity looked good to the Kaiser and he took a gambler's chance.

It is reported that Uncle Sam has spy detectors in 299 small towns and cities throughout the United States, and the organization is being extended to cover about every part of the country. These detectors, backed by the best secret service in the world, are going to make it pretty hard for the Kaiser to make any mischief in America, or get much information from us.

There is no getting away from the fact that everybody felt proud in Tillamook county at the result of the first day's Liberty Loan drive in this county, even those who were not in a position to buy one. In the years to come Tillamookers will be able to look back with pride at what was accomplished on Saturday. It seems that a color scheme in cards is in vogue during the drive, but the managers appear to have made no special color for counties like Tillamook that more than doubled its quota the first day.

Loan week develops some agreeable surprises—Wheeler, in Tillamook county, for example, with a quota of \$9000 and a subscription of \$90,000—Oregonia.

But we want to remind our honorable contemporaries that it was Brighton, just a little west of Wheeler that is entitled to first honors, as will be seen by the list published in this issue. Tillamook people took their hats off to Brighton in the last Red Cross drive, and they do so again, and with a great deal of pleasure and pride. We do not want to deprive Wheeler district of any honor, for the Nehalem Valley's record is one we all feel proud of.

Who's telling the truth or telling falsehoods? It is generally known by those who have become acquainted with timber in Tillamook county, that a splendid body of spruce timber is situated a few miles south east of Tillamook city. A few weeks ago a number of our citizens were surprised when told that this timber was not suitable for riving. Now we are told,

by those who are competent to give an opinion, that it is the best spruce belt in the United States. Consequently there is all manner of ideas floating around why this timber is not being cut to supply the government in its demand for spruce.

Very few persons realize what a large amount of work is imposed upon the banks by the Liberty Loan drives. They act for the government in the collection of the money, but receive no compensation for their work they have to perform, therefore, it is only proper to thank the banks of the county for the patriotic service they are rendering the country. Take the two banks of this city, 1200 persons in this banking district bought Liberty Bonds, it devolves a large amount of work thrust upon the banks. So we should all appreciate the lively interest the banks of the county have taken in the Liberty Loan drive, for they did much to bring about the flattering results in putting Tillamook county high up in the list of the counties that have over subscribed their quotas.

"Let's do it, boys! put Tillamook county over the top the first day of the next Liberty Loan Drive."

That was a snap shot in the Headlight, on March 14, and at a time when it was generally supposed that Tillamook County's quota would be \$200,000. It was from the suggestion of this editorial that the Liberty Loan Committee coined the slogan "Over the top the first day!" Then the liberty loan boosters got real busy and went about their work with real earnest determination to gain the goal in one day. All parts of the county imbibed the Liberty Loan spirit and because enthusiastic boosters, and the people of Tillamook county became inspired with the desire to assist President Wilson and the government in the prosecution of the war. The war news, which was of a serious character, for the Germans had driven a wedge 30 miles deep into the British lines, had something to do with creating a deeper interest in the Liberty Loan drive.

C. J. Edwards will be a candidate for joint representative for Yamhill and Tillamook counties on the Republican ticket. It seemed a little hard this year to induce any one to make the race, owing to other activities and the sacrifice one is called upon to make in filling that office, for it is a financial sacrifice. We are glad that Mr. Edwards consented to enter the race, for we feel sure he will consciently represent both counties in the state legislature. The editor was strongly urged to run and Mr. Edwards would have preferred us doing so, but we managed to persuade him that he was the best man for the position. That is how Mr. Edwards decided to become a candidate, for he wanted Tillamook county represented in the lower house. And this is how the editor managed to crowish. No matter who else is in the race, Tillamookers should get in and help boost Mr. Edwards, for he has been a good booster since he came to Tillamook and that is the reason we admire him so much, for it is men like Mr. Edwards who help build up a community, not the business men who hold back and lack initiative.

The County Court went over the Bayocean road as far as the ship yard on Saturday, and found something big doing down there. The editor used to come in for more or less good humored criticism about the Bayocean road, which some of our good citizens christened "Baker's Boulevard," but it fully demonstrated what we often contended, that as soon as the Bayocean road was built, industries would spring up on that side of Tillamook bay. We have no word of criticism for those who opposed building the Bayocean road, other than to say they were somewhat short sighted and could not see the industrial advantages the road afford. There is every reason to believe that the ship yard will be a permanent industry, giving employment to large numbers of men, and what money may have been spent on the road is comparatively nothing to the great benefit that will be derived from it. But the snap shot man will not be satisfied until the Bayocean road is completed, which should be done as soon as possible, for the road was started primarily for the purpose of giving Bayocean a road and a way out. We repeat what we have often stated about the Bayocean road, it is a rank injustice to deprive Bayocean of a road when there are so many persons who wish to build there as soon as they have a road.
