Death of C. W. Hogan.
We are sorry to announce the death of Charles W. Hogan, who died north of this city on Wednesday of last week. The cause of death was neuralgia of the heart.
Mr. Hogan was born in New York, June 20, 1850, and in 1879 was married to Miss Elizabeth Palm, also of New York.
Mr. Hogan moved to Michigan and later to Oregon, where he first settled in the Willamette valley. From there he came to the southern part of Tillamook county, where he resided for many years near Cloverdale. A few years ago Mr. Hogan removed to Tillamook.
Rev. R. G. Sumerlin, of the United Brethren church, conducted the funeral services Friday, and the interment was in Bay City cemetery. Mr. Hogan left, besides his widow, three children, Mrs. Guy Ford, of Myrtle Point, Or., Mrs. Oscar Werschul and Harry H. Hogan, of Tillamook City, Oregon.
Death of W. B. Powell.
A telegram reached this office on Wednesday stating that Willis B. Powell, an old resident of this county, had died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. A. Williams, in Missoula, Mont., and that the body was on its way to be buried in Tillamook.
A pioneer of 1852, Mr. Powell belonged to the great caravan of plain emigrants who suffered severe loss while making their way to the Eldorado in the West. He was born in Miller county Mo., March 14, 1844, and was six years old when the little farm was sold and the proceeds devoted to the purchase of oxen and provisions for the journey to the west. His father, Sherrick Powell, was born in Kentucky, as was also his mother, Elizabeth (Clarkson) Powell, and the latter died in Washington, in August, 1883, at the age of seventy-eight years. Sherrick Powell moved from Kentucky to Illinois, where he lived for several years before settling in Missouri. April 1, 1852, he started upon what was to be his last journey, yet he was doubtless one of the most hopeful of those who were staking their all upon the promises of the west. He was captain of the party, and guided it safely as far as the Powder River, where he was stricken by cholera, and was left in a lonely wayside grave on the plains. His family continued their journey after performing the simple rights for the dead, and in time located on a claim on Lewis River, in Washington. They had three hundred and twenty acres of land and engaged in farming there until 1867, the mother depending on her five boys and seven daughters both to manage and do the work around the farm.
When his services were no longer required at home, Willis B. Powell went to Clark county, Wash. and took up land on the east fork of Lewis river, where he engaged in stock raising until 1884. He then disposed of his farm and moved to Yamhill county, Oregon, purchasing a place near Bellevue, four miles from Sheridan. On a farm of 94 acres he engaged in general farming and stock-raising until 1901 and then moved to a dairy farm in Tillamook county.
Mrs. Powell was born in Iowa, February 17, 1848, and crossed the plains with her parents in 1862. She died a few years since.
