

Candidates in Primary Election.

Coun Clerk Erwin Harrison received certificate of the primary ballots for both the Republican and Democratic primaries to be held on Friday May 17, and contains the following names for the first congressional district.

Those names appear on the ballot will not be adhered to, as under the law whenever two or more persons are candidates for the same office, the names on the ballot will rotate, to avoid giving an alphabetical preference. Under the 1917 act all the names in any one precinct will be in identical the same order, but the names will be rotated among the various precincts so as to have each name appear at the head of the list when possible.

Old Pioneer Passes Away.

Hiram Terwilliger, pioneer of Portland citizen, who typifies the spirit of the west and whose family name is known throughout the state, died at his home in south Portland early last week from causes due to advanced age. For 70 years he has lived in Portland, arriving with his parents after an eventful trip across the plains. He then was five years old.

His father, James Terwilliger, took up a donation claim in a densely forested district, through which the Macadam road now passes and which in recent years became widely known by the beautiful Terwilliger boulevard which skirts the hills above the west banks of the Willamette, in South Portland.

The father later bought a piece of property, one corner of which subsequently was designated as First and Morrison streets, and there erected a cabin and a blacksmith shop. The elder Terwilliger plied his trade there for many years and in that vicinity the son grew up as a child with mostly Indians for playmates. For a while no white neighbors were closer than on the next claim and Hiram learned to speak the jargon fluently.

In 1850 the Terwilliger family removed to South Portland, and 200 yards from where the modern home of Mr. Terwilliger now stands was built the homestead log cabin. The son lived there a number of years and engaged in a variety of pursuits. He mined, worked as a logger, operated a dairy and worked in a tannery built by his father.

In 1869 he married Miss Mary Edwards, of Tillamook, and together they lived in this county for nine years. Later they returned to Portland and lived continuously there until his death.
