Editorial Snap Shots.

The Liberty Temple should contain a list of every person who volunteered or were drafted into the service, with the branch they belong to from Tillamook County.

The Germans call the United States Soldiers "Devil's dogs," and the soldiers from Scotland "Women from hell." It must be that Germany realize that they are going to get hell knocked out of them.

We must confess that we are not an authority on military tactics. If we were we might understand why so many soldiers are brought to the jumping off place of the northwest from the East and Middle West when men are so badly needed in France.

S. B. Huston's withdrawal from the Republican senatorial contest must have hit Oz West like a bomb-shell, for it has upset the plan to split the Republican party and elect West. The Republicans are now uniting on R. N. Stanfield and West can already see his own political defeat.

Before Germany started the drive to break through the English army, the generals made a boast that they had 300,000 to sacrifice to accomplish their object. They have failed and no doubt sacrificed over a million men, hence the complaint in Germany about the great sacrifice in life. The Kaiser don't care for the lives of his own soldiers any more than the lives of the soldiers in the allied armies as long as he can gain his object and become the military dictator of the world.

Most of us have done more or less preaching and given a whole lot of advice to women to stop waste. We think the women have a "come back" at the government about waste of money and a wilful waste of time in the construction of airplanes. A great deal of credit is due the women of the country in their endeavor to prevent waste and conserve food, but when the government wasted millions of dollars, it looks to most of us that the government at Washington should show a better example and prevent the wilful waste of public money.

Over in Washington County the federal authorities gave the Sheriff and two prominent business men of Hillsboro a jolt when they arrested them for having liquor shipped into the state. They owned up and were each fined \$250 and ten days in durance vile. That places sheriffs and bankers under a certain amount of suspicion. No wonder that the arrest caused some gossip over in Washington county when the people elected a man to the office they expected him to obey and enforce the law, and having violated the law, the judge should have given him the maximum penalty.

There are a good many persons who express the opinion that they wish Roosevelt or Taft was president. It is safe to say that either of these presidents, when war was declared, would have sought and obtained the advice and assistance of experienced business men, and would not have placed persons at the heads of departments who knew not how to run them in a business way. As a illustration of this the airplane muddle is a good criterion. We believe that if Roosevelt had been president the United States would have had thousands of airplanes in France today and between two and three million men.

It is plain as the nose on a man's face that West's game is to bring about another factional fight in the Republican party, with the intention of obtaining support from the McNary faction after the election. Since Mr. Huston retired from the race, Oz threw some bouquets at him, but Oz need not worry, for Mr. Huston retired from the race to avoid a factional fight after the primaries. As we stated last week, there is only one thing for Republicans to do at the primary election, and that is to vote for Bob Stanfield, and our advice to the Republicans of Tillamook county is that they turn out and vote for Stanfield, and in doing so they will show that they do not want a Democratic political boss to boss the Republican party.

The Oregonian made this surprising statement on Sunday: "There are two thousand applications, mostly from women, to the Portland School Board for positions as teachers and instructors. There are about thirty vacancies to fill. The total surplus is thus shown to be about nineteen hundred and seventy (1970). They must seek employment in the schools elsewhere, or find other work here. Who will explain why it is that the school jobs are enormously overcrowded, while other occupations are suffering from lack of help? Is it the wages? Or the hours? Or the congeniality of the task? Here is room for the service of some public, or semi-public, organization, that will divert nearly two thousand women from places where they are not wanted to places where they are wanted."

Have the Republican party of Oregon become so ignominious that it has to be dictated to by Oz West, a Democrat? We don't think so. West has agreed to retire from the race for United States Senator if Bob Stanfield will do the same, making a "walk-over" for Senator McNary. Stanfield has as much right to aspire to the position as McNary, and it looks decidedly funny that West should want to play the roll of political boss and tell Republicans what they should do. It is Republicans who should decide who is to be their candidate on the Republican ticket, not a Democratic political boss, and it will not help McNary in the least now it is known that a Democratic like West is wanting a Republican for United States Senator. What can the Democrats think of West for advocating the candidacy of a Republican?

A good many persons, especially of German extraction, would not believe that Germany was responsible for plunging the world into the most horrible of the world. They would not believe it, and retorted that England was the cause of the war. The interesting article in another column, giving the memoranda of the German ambassador to England previous to the war, places the entire blame upon Germany and her war lords. Germany not only planned the time when the war was to start, but expected to crush France and then Russia, extracting a big war indemnity and another big slice of territory. There is no getting away from the fact that when Germany mobilized her army, she played the roll of a big robber, and to obtain her ends the kaiser and the junkers did not care a whoop how many lives would be sacrificed.

Ralph Williams again aspires for the position of Republican National Committeeman for Oregon. He is a good man for the position, and if his advice had been taken Hughes would have been elected at the last presidential election. He counseled harmony in the republican party and had republicans in California and Washington buried their little petty differences the same as Oregon did, there would be a Republican administration today, and the big business men of the country assisting in the prosecution of the war. It is true that the Democratic misleading slogan "He kept us out of war" influenced a large number of voters, and to our way of thinking, gave Germany the impression that the United States was too absorbed in money making to enter the war and too cowardly to resent the abuses she heaped upon the United States. But Mr. Williams' advice was not taken and California and Washington went Democratic. We hope Mr. Williams will be renominated, and he should be.

Gus Moser, who was president of the State Senate, which office he filled with credit to himself and the people of the state, and who is again a candidate for governor, was in the city on Saturday. Mr. Moser is a good campaigner, and has a large number of friends in this county. He would make an excellent governor, being well qualified for that position. Four years ago he was a candidate for governor, entering the race late, but in a race where there were eight candidates he came out second highest. Notwithstanding that he was defeated he was not like so many persons who feel sore after being defeated, for he got out and worked for the successful candidate. That is a good precedent for every Republican office seeker to follow, for it pays in the end, and will give Mr. Moser a good many votes. That Moser is a formidable candidate must be conceded, for on the day of election it will surprise a good many persons the big backing he will get in Multnomah county. A good many think that the race is between Moser and the Governor. The friends of Mr. Moser in Tillamook feel confident that they are going to carry the county for him, basing this upon the vote four years ago, which was as follows: Gus Moser, 356; James Withycombe, 246; T. T. Gear, 122; Grant Dimick, 106; A. M. Crawford, 100; George B. Brownell, 80; Charles A. Johns, 61; William A. Carter 53.

Let's see says the blind man. When on a trip to Portland recently, all the saw mill men of the county put their heads together with the idea of seeing what could be done to obtain the Whitney Co.'s tract of spruce, southeast of this city, which is claimed to be the best body of spruce in the United States. The Tillamook mill men agreed upon a price as to what they thought it was worth and went to the Whitney Co. to see whether it could be obtained and at what cost. Lisen to this, especially those who are imputing wrong motives to the timber owners of this county. The tract was offered to the Tillamook mill men for one half what they agreed it was worth. What stands in the way, as we understand it, is the cost of building a logging road to the timber, for when a track is built over the meadows of some of the land in this county, one can readily see that it would amount to a hold up. If the government could be induced to take hold of the logging road and force it as a military necessity, there would be no trouble whatever. Every saw mill in the county could obtain an abundance of spruce logs. In all justice to the timber owners of Tillamook County, it is wrong to accuse them of withholding their timber for mercenary purposes. This is what they object to, and we think they are per-

fectly justified in doing so, they do not want parties to go into their timber and select the best spruce trees and leave the balance, leaving a fire trap as a menace.

State Senator S. B. Huston, of Portland, has announced that he has withdrawn from the contest for the Republican nomination for United States Senator. This case was quite a surprise to the voters of Oregon, as Mr. Huston was recognized as a very formidable candidate, being one of Oregon's foremost citizens, a lawyer of wide reputation, and his many friends throughout the state.

Mr. Huston says among other things that he withdrew in order that the Republicans could unite upon a man and be certain of electing him in November. This narrows the race down to R. N. Stanfield, of Eastern Oregon, and C. L. McNary, of Salem. It became apparent when ex-Governor Oswald West made his eleventh hour entry into the contest for the Democratic nomination that the old game of stirring up strife in the Republican ranks and thereby electing a Democrat would be played again, so Mr. Huston decided to sacrifice his ambition an d block this little game, which has been so successfully played by West in the past.

The supporters of Mr. Stanfield are very jubilant over this turn in affairs as it is apparent that, due to the close relationship between West and McNary, the voters are turning to Stanfield as they realize that in the Eastern Oregon man the Republicans have a candidate whose nomination insures election.

THE WAR, THE FARM AND THE FARMER

The farms of this country could carry the war to a victorious conclusion even if all the rest of the nations should quit. The rest will not quit; but we could win it without them if we had to do it. The farmers of the United States can whip Germany. We can whip them with guns. We can whip them with our money. Every farmer in the United States must remember that the war has a first mortgage on every cent he has. The last spare cent in the pockets of every farmer in America should be devoted to the war.

The Kaiser began foreclosing his mortgage on our farms when he declared ruthless submarine warfare. The war is our answer to his bill of foreclosure.

Our contribution is, first, our sons and brothers for the trenches; second, the last pound of food products which we can grow by mobilizing our scanty labor supply, utilizing the men, women and children and the townspeople about us; and third, money for Liberty Bonds.

This is the crucial year of the war. Our soldiers are at the front, hundreds of thousands of them in the trenches, and a million more ready to go. The whole burden of carrying on our own part in the war, and of aiding our sister nations in arms, rests on the United States Treasury.

If the treasury fails or falters or finds itself unable to respond to every call upon it, the war is lost. Do you realize that?

Your son, and all the nation's sons are relying on the United States Treasury to furnish things with which they may fight.

Their lives are lost if the treasury fails. Our country is lost if the treasury fails.

Germany wins if the treasury fails. Therefore every cent you can rake and scrape together belongs to the treasury, that our soldiers may come back to us alive and victorious. This is literally true. We can whip the Germans with our money; but not with the money in our pockets or bank accounts. It must go into the United States Treasury in subscriptions to Liberty Bonds.

While Gerard was our ambassador in Berlin, the Kaiser said to him one day that he would stand no nonsense from America after the war.

Do you know what that means? It means that the Germans intend to subjugate this country if they come out of this war victorious.

The German Imperial government has preached the superiority of Germany to all the rest of the world until the German nation is drunk with megalomania. One of their great writers expressed the prevailing official view in 1903, when he wrote:

"The Teutonic race is called upon to circle the earth with its rule, to exploit the treasures of nature and of human power, and to make the passive races servient elements in its cultural development."

Who ever has the characteristics of the Teutonic race is superior. All the dark peoples are mentally inferior, because they belong to the passive races. The cultural value of a nation is measured by the quantity of Teutonism it contains.

Are you one of the darker races? Are you willing to be rated as one of the "servient elements" in Germany's cultural development?

You began to be one of the "servient elements" when peaceful people were slaughtered as they carried your produce to market. Was it because you belonged to a "passive race"?

This war is for the purpose of saying to that insane claim, with the roar of a hundred thousand cannon—"NO!"

Never since the Turks threatened to overwhelm Europe was the world in such danger as now. Germany must be defeated this year. Unless we win, our place in the world is lost, and our history as one of the "servient elements" begins. We must withhold nothing from the support of the war. We must give our sons. We must bring forth food in abundance. We must give into the treasury of the United States every cent we can spare.

This summer the support of the war is up to the farmers; and Uncle Sam has never called upon the farmers in vain!
