### Sheriff Washington County is Arrested for Shipping in Liquor.

In the federal court at Portland Thursday morning Federal District Attorney Haney filed an action against Sheriff J. C. Applegate, C. B. Buchanan and John W. Bailey, of Hillsboro, charging them with importing liquor into Oregon.

The men were arrested by federal officers at three o'clock that morning at a small station on the Oregon Electric when they went to secure an express package shipped to them from San Francisco. There were five boxes containing wine, whiskey and gin, which had come from San Francisco through the Portland office and was transferred to the Oregon Electric, federal authorities having kept in touch with the shipment from its destination until its arrival, and when the men went for the consignment they were arrested.

When arrested the men confessed their guilt and when arraigned in the Federal Court a plea of guilty was charged.

The court fined the trio \$250.00 each and sentenced them to ten days in prison.

The men offered no defense, threw themselves on the mercy of the court and stated that they wished to have the matter over as soon as possible.

The high official capacity of the sheriff and the prominence of the parties concerned has created a sensation unparalleled in the history of Washington County and the affair is deeply to be regretted.

Representations made Monday before Federal Judge C. B. Wolverton brought revocation of the jail-term, portion of the sentences he had announced Thursday on John W. Bailey and Charles B. Buchanan, Hillsboro business men, for confessed violation of the Federal liquor laws. Clemency was denied Jesse C. Applegate, former Sheriff of Washington county, and Applegate entered the Multnomah county jail at noon, beginning his 10-day term.

Judge Wolverton took the new facts into consideration and dropped the jail sentence from the sentences of Bailey and Buchanan, the same time raising their fines from \$250 to \$400. The fines were all paid, including that of the ex-official.

**Applegate Surrenders Office**  
Humiliated by his arrest and the attendant storm of criticism which broke in Washington county, Mr. Applegate on Saturday tendered his resignation as Sheriff.

It cost Applegate six silver dollars and a lot of grief and discomfort to "break into" the County Jail Monday. It took the Kangaroo Court of corridor "C" of the jail about 20 minutes to put the former Washington county official through "the paces," and when they had finished with him his face and ears burned as they never did before. No sooner had the iron doors clanged behind the former sheriff than the prisoners of corridor "C" started the festivities.

"You are charged with breaking into the county jail without the consent of the inmates," was the complaint lodged against him by the "judge," who faced him with an eye that gleamed. "Are you guilty or not guilty?"

"Guilty" the crestfallen sheriff mumbled. And then the "Sheriff," "prosecuting attorney" and "bailiff" and other officials of the Kangaroo court got busy. "Say," spoke one of them, "we've been here for so long we've lost all track of things on the outside; what's whiskey bringing a quart now?"

"What is your occupation?" questioned the judge.

"Nothing at present or for the next 10 days," Applegate replied.

"What has been your occupation?" the court insisted.

"I was sheriff," responded Applegate with a voice scarce above a whisper.

"So you're the guy that violated his public trust and got away with a 10-day jolt, are you?" quired the judge.

"Well we'll have to give you the limit. This is the first time we've ever had a crack at a sheriff."

At this point the "prosecuting attorney" urged the judge to exercise no mercy. "Give him the limit, and then some, for spoiling the society of this corridor for the next ten days," he urged.

the County Jail at the time, and they all stood near the corridor bars as spectators while the "trial" was in progress. At one time when Applegate sought to interrupt the court he was given another fine for contempt of court.

"Whew, that's a tough place to put a fellow in," said Applegate when a jailer let him out of the corridor for his dinner.

### GASOLINE MONEY FOR LIBERTY BONDS

Motor Car Owners Can Do Great Work. Eliminate Trip to Aid United States

As spring comes on and the roads improve, the automobile owner will get out his car. Before he tunes it up for the first long Sunday tour with his family, it would be well at this time for him to reflect that every gallon of gasoline he uses will mean that a gallon of gasoline cannot be used for a motor truck hauling provisions and munitions to the front for the fighting men in France.

It may sound trivial, to say this, but when one pauses to reflect that there are more than 3,000,000 pleasure cars in use in America and that each can burn from three to six gallons of the precious fluid every Sunday that an outing is taken in the car, one readily can see that such an outing means that the already scant supply has been made shorter by several millions of gallons. With the supply decreased and the Government to supply the thousands of motor trucks it is shipping to France for the army, the price will rise and the Government will be at a greater expense to conduct its military operations.

"As every one familiar with the war situation knows," said an army man recently, "gasoline is one of the big factors in the great struggle. Its importance in the ultimate winning of the war is very great. It propels submarines, flying machines and motor trucks and ambulances. The United States is the great producer of this by-product of petroleum, and all we can produce is needed by us to hasten a victorious conclusion of the war."

"It seems to me that the owners of pleasure cars can effect a great saving in gasoline if they care to do so in the seasons when outings and pleasure tours are in order. Short trips and not too many of them will result in a big saving of gasoline, without robbing the car owners of their pleasures. And here is the fine part about this thrift—that is, one of the fine points: the money saved in gasoline can be turned into Liberty Bonds, and Liberty Bonds can win the war. The man who is willing to save gasoline now and turn his savings over to the Government will be able in the future to take all the long tours he cares to, and he'll be able to ride as a victor."
