"Tillamook county, Oregon, has a war crop that is cheese, the whole cheese, and nothing but the cheese, so help me Hoover; exclaims the Los Angeles "Times." Switzerland can remain neutral and imported limburger may cling to Hunland, but Tillamook will see to it that the fighters for democracy go not cheeseless. The Southern Pacific hauled close to 5,000,000 pounds of cheese out of Tillamook in 1917 and the county received for it more than \$1,000,000. The industry is now so well established and is conducted on such a sanitary and scientific basis that Tillamook cows work overtime willingly and the international cheese record for 1918 is in sight according to a Southern Pacific railway official.

The German Curse in Russia.

Scenes of great interest at this time in "The German Curse in Russia" the amazing official War Film to be shown at the Princess Theatre, May 21-22 are those of the Women's Death Battalion showing Mme Botchkareva, its organizer and reader and her loyal feminine soldiers from the day that the call to arms was made, going through their training until they are perfect soldiers and then going to the front, where they not only took over two lines of German trenches but captured a number of Germans and a number of officers.
There is more real interest for the woman in these incidents in this production than have ever appeared in a war production before. If it were only for this particular incident the production would have been a sensation, for the scenes have never been seen before on the screen. Suffrage will be particularly interested in these incidents, as Mr. Thompson was with the Women's Battalion at the same time Mrs. Pankhurst, the English suffrage leader was visiting their camps and his camera caught everything that happened.

Business and Patriotism.

The feature of the present war that is peculiarly American is the way in which the instrumentalities of business have been placed at the service of patriotism. The time is passed for decision as to whether the call of the country is stronger than the call of profit. It is now not a question of putting business above your patriotism; it is a matter of putting business into your patriotism.
Through our Revolutionary ancestors accomplished great things in making America free, they had not learned as much about subordinating business to patriotism as we have learned. Writing to James Warren in 1779 Washington censures severely the business morality of his time. "Our conflict is not likely to cease so soon as every good man could wish. Unless we can turn a little more to first principles, and act a little more upon patriotic grounds, I do not know what may be the issue of the contest. Speculation, peculation, engrossing, forestalling, with all their concomitants, afford too many melancholy proofs of the decay of public virtue."
The moral principals of men change but little from generation to generation, but the ways in which these moral principals are put into practice change radically.
