Os West put the Democratic party to sleep. Instead of the Democratic party having an aggressive candidate for United States Senator, West is evidently going to lay down and allow the Republican nominee to take the office without a fight.

From the look of things "bone dry" and "wet" candidates were not very popular last week, for both were hopelessly snowed under by the voters, receiving the smallest votes. Politicians will surely be shy of the "wet" and "dry" band wagon after what happened on Friday.

What's the matter anyway, that so few persons went to the polls on Friday in the primary election? It is only a few years since woman suffrage was granted, yet for all that, instead of the vote being doubled, it fell below any election ever held in the county in recent years.

One greedy politician Ben Olcott, got it in the neck last week. When Olcott wanted a second term for Secretary of State, why, that was all right, but when Withycombe asked for a second term, that was all wrong. So Olcott butted in and did his best to defeat the governor and have himself nominated. We fell glad that the people of the state swatted this dreedy politician.

When we hear any one say that the salary of the county treasurer is not big enough, we want to say it is mighty big pay for so little work. There are a good many bright intelligent women in the county who would be glad to take the office and do the recording work as well for the present salary. It isn't a man's job, anyway, when men are wanted for so many other things.

The sheriff and the district attorney are doing the right thing in arresting those who sell bitters and other dope containing alcohol in violation of the prohibition law. In one of their investigations they found so empty bottles which had contained bitters behind the home of one man, which goes to prove that the stuff was sold in large quantities. Republicans nominated Mr. Farmer in a clean, fair and gentlemanly fight, and he is now the nominee of the party and should receive the congratulations and support of the four defeated aspirants at the general election.

Bro. Trombley did a West stunt last week. The Herald is a Democratic organ, controlled, it would seem by some member of his own party for county treasurer, he boosted for B. L. Beals, the present republican county treasurer, who is in Mexico and is not an aspirant for the office. Surely there are some good Democrats in the county who should have been boosted by the Democratic newspaper for the office in preference to a Republican. But it goes to prove that the Beals' are the Republicans who are pulling the leg of the Democratic newspaper, and the tail that wags the Democratic mule in Tillamook county. This is how the Democratic party in this county is being prostituted, and it is enough to make every democrat pick up his ears when he sees such flippity flopping and their party betrayed.

The people of Oregon have again demonstrated the fact that they prefer politicians or attorneys to represent them in the national legislature, and that whenever a person, who is connected with the business life and activities of the state seek to become United States Senator, they are not only defeated at the polls, but are subject to scurrilous and abusive attacks by some of the Portland newspapers, that does not speak well for the intellectual development of the state,

when the people treat successful business men in that manner. Politicians and attorneys are not men who take hold of big industrial enterprises, nor do they give employment to thousands of men, but when it comes to having Oregon represented in the United States Senate they are chosen by the people. What's the matter with Oregon, anyway, and especially Portland, when successful business men are maligned whenever they run for that office?

The snap shot man has no word of criticism to offer against B. L. Beals, the present county treasurer, for he is a gentleman in every respect, and one of our most respected citizens. But as he was not a candidate for re-nomination, we simply raised a debateable question as to the advisability of abolishing the office and saving of \$1000 to the county. We are perfectly aware that whenever one starts a movement to do away with a public office a bunch of knockers spring up and oppose it. The snap shot man is going to stand by his guns and prove to the satisfaction of the taxpayers that the office of county treasurer is as much use as the fifth wheel to an automobile, and if the office is retained the county treasurer should be expected to put in a full day's work. The present county treasurer is not responsible for the poor system in running different departments and we want to make this clear that we are not throwing any reflections on Mr. Beals. He has held the office for a long time with credit to himself and county, and probably is of the opinion that he should give way and allow someone else to take the office, for the people of the county have shown on more than one occasion that they do not approve of one man holding down a county job too long. We have plenty of powder and ammunition at our finger's ends to prove that the treasurer's office should be abolished or reformed.

We are accused of wanting to "sneak" into office by the Beals' mouthpiece, which, of course, is highly amusing to the snap shot man, so we are going to prove to our own satisfaction, however, that it is the other fellows who are doing the "sneak" act, and will allow the citizens of Tillamook to judge. So here goes, and we will call this chapter one. It will be remembered that the previous primary nominating election the late J. H. Dunstan announced himself as a candidate for county treasurer, and no one else did so until a few weeks before the election, when he suddenly withdrew in favor of B. L. Beals, and what expenses he had gone to were paid by him. Was Dunstan put up for that express purpose to keep others out of the field? It was the right and privilege for the county treasurer to seek a re-nomination if he wanted the office and we are inclined to think he did not, and did not intend to run for the office when he left for Mexico. But a movement was started, by the aid of the Democratic newspaper which is more or less under the control of Beals Bros., to have the name of B. L. Beals written in the ballot, which was done and he obtained the nomination. It's all fair in love, war and politics, but we ask the people of the county to take into consideration how the nomination in the two primary elections were obtained and decide whether it is the snap shot man or the other fellows who want to hang on to the county sack. That is all we need say at present along that line, but we must apologize to the Beals Bros. if we have butted in, for we did know that they had inherited the office of county treasurer to be farmed out.

There is no one who wants the office of county treasurer in Tillamook county and that leads the Editor of the Tillamook Headlight to "take a shot at that office." He wants the office abolished. Baker says he is not anxious to hold public office and agrees that, if the people of Tillamook county will nominate and elect him to the office, he will prepare a bill to abolish the office and go down to Salem this winter and have it introduced and leg for it to head he band. Wouldn't it be better to divorce the county tax collecting from the sheriff's office and put it into the treasurer's office, where it belongs, and then make the latter an office worth while. And while you are in the divorcing business, just divorce the county judge from board of county commissioners, electing three county commissioners—one from each of the three districts—and leave the county judge to attend to the probate matters alone.—Newberg Enterprise.

For the information of the Enterprise we may say that one Oregon legislature did pass a law for the county treasurer to collect taxes and the next legislature knocked it out. As to electing three county commissioners, and allow the county judge to attend to probate matters, that, in most counties, would mean another chair warmer with very little to do, but drawing a nice fat salary. Why not have circuit judges attend to probate business, which would not increase the number of office holders? But we don't run our county affairs like we do our business affairs, and if we did so all county officers would be under one management, and local banks would be custodian of county money, doing away with the office of county treasurer. The department system needs changing, for it often happens that for a few weeks one office is crowded with work and another office with little or nothing to do.

THE PRIMARY ELECTION.

Withycombe and McNary Chosen by Big Majorities—Farmer has Walk Over for Commissioner.

The primary election on Friday resulted in a land slide for Governor James Withycombe and United States Senator C. L. McNary. These were the two offices, over which a large amount of interest centered, especially in the senatorial contest, which was between McNary and Stanfield. Oregon's war governor put all the political prophets to sleep, and he centered away ahead of the other candidates and will have about 14,000 votes to spare. The small vote obtained by Anderson, the "dry" candidate and Harley who mounted the "wet" band wagon, was a surprise. There was a close race for state treasurer and Supreme Judge, but from the looks of things the Republican state ticket will be made up as follows:
