Report of Tillamook Cow Testing Association for April.

Five hundred and ninety-one cows were tested this month, producing on an average of 865 lbs. milk and 35.65 lbs. fat per cow. The three high herds are owned by Joe Durrer, with 26 cows averaging 1219 lbs. milk and 48.64 lbs. fat; Mrs. Therese Ross, 5 cows averaging 1084 lbs. milk and 48.33 lbs. fat; L. A. McCormack, 5 cows averaging 728 lbs. milk and 46.33 lbs. fat.
