RED CROSS DRIVE IN TILLAMOOK A SUCCESS.

County Nearly Doubles Its Quota with About \$9,764.80.

The result of the Red Cross drive in Tillamook County will amount to nearly \$10,000 when all the money subscribed is turned in and checked over by the secretary, Mrs. Everson. This was the report made at a meeting of the Executive Board on Wednesday afternoon, and was immediately wired to the Portland Red Cross headquarters. The board felt well pleased, with the result of the drive, out the exact amount of money subscribed in Tillamook County will not be known for several days, as there are a few districts that have not turned in their subscription lists and receipt books, which they are asked to do as soon as possible. This is how the figures stand at present.
