**Wheat Bread Is Not a Necessity.**

Dr. J. H. Kellogg, the head of the sanitarium at Battle Creek, Mich., says there is nothing in wheat bread that we can not get from other foods. "Our people must cultivate the potato eating habit. More potatoes and less breakfast cereal and bread would be a very great improvement. Cereals contain an excess of acids. The potato furnishes a rich supply of organic bases or alkalis which neutralize the acids of the body and keep the blood in healthy condition."

"Meat will be used less and less in the future, and the important thing to know is whether or not we can get along without it. The experiments made in recent years by McCollum of Wisconsin university and by Meudell of Yale University show that meats, eggs and milk contain certain proteins that are very valuable for the body, because they are what is known as complete proteins. They are capable of making perfect tissues. This is not true of cereals, not even of wheat."

"Corn with milk added is a perfect substitute for wheat. It would do no harm if a complete embargo should be placed on wheat flour all over the United States. The people can live perfectly on corn as long as they have milk, eggs, nuts and beans."

"There isn't going to be any shortage of corn. The corn we are now feeding to our cattle, pigs and sheep will furnish food for 160,000,000 people for a year. It is the greatest economic waste in the country to feed corn to cattle. Of course, beer is made of corn, which is an enormous waste also, but the biggest waste of corn in this country is in feeding it to the cattle."

**Canada Wheat and Sugar Limits.**

A Canadian order in council provides that no person, with the exception of manufacturers of flour, bakers, confectioners, wholesale or retail dealers, or of persons living at a greater distance than 2 miles from a licensed dealer, shall hold or have in his possession or under his control more flour, made wholly or in part from wheat, than is sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period not exceeding 15 days.

Anyone living at a distance greater than 2 miles and less than 5 miles from a licensed dealer may hold or control flour made wholly or in part from wheat up to an amount sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period not exceeding 30 days. Anyone living more than 5 and less than 10 miles from a licensed dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements up to sixty days, while a person living more than 100 miles from such a dealer may have sufficient for his ordinary requirements for a period up to 120 days.

Any wholesale or retail dealer licensed by the Canadian food board may not hold flour made wholly or in part from wheat in excess of a quantity sufficient for his ordinary trade requirements for a period exceeding 60 days.

The regulation regarding parallels this save in the last clause. Manufacturers, wholesalers, or retailers may not have more sugar than is required for a period exceeding 45 days.

**Japan's Bulging Stock.**

Latest returns published by the finance department of Japan show the gold specie held by that country on March 15th to have been \$529,822,000 of which \$227,088,000 was held at home and \$302,734,000 held abroad. This is mainly due to the balance of trade in favor of Japan in the value of her exports over imports. For the three past calendar years, 1915-17, inclusive, our trade with Japan aggregated \$885,000,000, of which \$341,000,000 consisted of exports, and \$544,000,000 of imports. Japan's favorable balance in her trade with us during the three year period, therefore, aggregated \$203,000,000, which is a pretty satisfactory showing for Japan.

The total value of our trade carried in Japanese bottoms during the three calendar years mentioned was \$1,278,000,000, of which \$729,000,000 was imports and \$549,000,000 exports. Japan carried 4 per cent of the total of our foreign trade carried in foreign vessels in 1915, 7.25 per cent in 1916, and 11 per cent in 1917. Gold exports to Japan for the three years aggregated \$182,000,000, raising from \$250,000 for 1915 to \$155,500,000 for 1917. Imports of gold from Japan aggregated \$20,000,000, practically the entire amount being imported during 1915—\$19,600,000. If a good customer is a friend worth cultivating, Japan has little complaint to make against us. But how will the American working-men feel about this after the war, when Japanese competition is taking a section out of his wage, under the policy calling for "a removal of all economic barriers"?
