## Circuit Court Cases.

Judge G. R. Bagley, who held an adjourned session of the circuit court last week took several cases under advisement. They are Solon Schiffmann vs. E. L. Youmans and W. E. Youmans, which is a damage suit; Rose S. Clark vs. Edward M. Clark, a divorce suit; D. T. Edmunds vs. C. R. Magarrell, A. Malaney and F. R. Beals, which is to reform a deed; and D. T. Edmunds vs. F. R. Beals, an injunction case. The judge signed an order for the arrest of George W. Worthington, who had not complied with the order of the court in the divorce proceedings in which he was to support his wife and family. The bail was placed at \$500. E. H. Collis and Aaron Bonham vs. W. S. Cone was a foreclosure of tax lien case, which was decided in favor of the defendant. The plaintiffs own a one third interest in the property in question, while the defendant owns a two thirds interest. The defendant refused to pay the city tax because he has contended that the charter of Bay City was illegal. The plaintiffs, however, without the consent or request of the defendant paid the tax in question and now seek to hold the property. The court holds that this cannot be done. Following is in part the findings and conclusions of the court in regard to this case. "That on the 20th day of December, 1910, there was an attempted amendment to said General Law which was the Charter of said Town of Bay City under the initiative powers by a pretended act entitled "Ordinance Number Three" and attempted to submit to the legal voters of said town within its corporate limits which said pretended ordinance was entitled "An Act to incorporate Bay City in Tillamook County, Oregon, heretofore incorporated under the General Laws of Oregon, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith" and attempted to submit the same under the initiative and referendum powers under the Constitution and said general laws of incorporations. "That said pretended ordinance number three was never filed with the Recorder of said town and that the same or any copy thereof was never published in said town of Bay City, nor in lieu of such publication was there ever posted three or any copies thereof in three or any other number of places or any places in said town nor at all in any manner published. "That the plaintiffs by the reason of their being tenants in common with the defendant in the ownership of the property described in the foregoing findings could not and can not acquire any tax lien nor any right in any tax certificate which would entitle them to foreclose as against their co-tenant the defendant herein. "That the Ordinance number three of the Town of Bay City, mentioned in the foregoing findings of facts was and is void, that all taxes levied by said town of Bay City thereunder are and were void. That the tax certificate and any sale attempted thereunder on account of the legal and the illegal being intermingled was and is void. That the plaintiffs having voluntarily paid all the taxes assessed against said property and as mentioned in the complaint and did so without any request on the part of the defendant and without any promises on his part to repay them, have no right to recover the same from this defendant, in this suit or in any other manner. And the county having sold

the property and issued said certificate of delinquency to the plaintiff including the illegal taxes aforesaid, with the whole of said taxes and sale is void and of no effect so far as the defendant is concerned. And the plaintiff having voluntarily paid the same cannot recover the same in any manner."

## W.O.W. Liberty Class.

O. W. T. Muellhaupt, special representative of the Woodmen of the World, is in the city in the interest of Tillamook Camp, and is superintending a liberty class drive for new members in keeping with the war program of the order. The class is justly termed "Liberty", since this western society with a reserve fund of nearly \$1,000,000.00 is backing up its patriotism with dollars, and is the protection of its soldier members in the service of Uncle Sam and Allies. In addition, the 850 organized camps in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Wyoming, Utah and Colorado are leaders in all movements which make for civic and national welfare. Since organized 28 years ago, this society has paid to the widows, orphans and dependents \$26,000,000.00 in amounts of either \$500, \$1000, \$2000 or \$3000. The monthly payment plan makes it possible for all desirable men from the ages of 18 to 50 to carry protection linked with fraternity and patriotism. The Tillamook Woodmen meet every Thursday evening and all members belonging elsewhere are cordially invited.

## Another Thrift Campaign.

Three fold is the purpose of the Oregon thrift campaign, announced by the Patriotic Conservation League beginning June 8th, in the mustering of waste materials from every home and hamlet in the state, with school children as a ready regiment for the promotion of the enterprise. The Patriotic Conservation League, at its headquarters in Portland, will receive shipments of waste materials from every community, paying therefor at the highest market rate, in baby bonds of the War Savings Stamp issue. The purpose of the league is to further the distribution of war savings stamps, to provide a fund for the welfare of Oregon boys summoned to service, and to conserve war materials for America.

## Wonderful Photoplay Coming.
