agement by their vote. As I went to this conference, it seemed that there was so many things that emphasized the need of more interest and enthusiasm in the work of the Red Cross. The streets full of khaki clad boys, with a sprinkling of the blue of the Navy. The presence of men in the uniforms of our Allies. The crowded stations where men were bidding good-bye to their wives and children, the last kiss for the wife and the tiny baby that had been held to the last minute, the brave smile of farewell for one saw few tears, and the constant moving of troop trains loaded with cheering and shouting boys. Then as we drove through Camp Lewis the many squads of men all busy learning to make war with one great aim, that aim the destruction of the horrible beast who has thrown this world into so much pain and misery. The marching, the drilling, the mounting of guns, the learning to take the shock of the recoil of the rifle, the digging of trenches, the bayonet practice, the camouflage, all made a deep impression. How, soon would those thousands of Camp Lewis boys be wanting the help and comfort and care that only "The greatest Mother on the Earth" can give. And how small the number of men we saw in comparison to the number of men in that great army that we must raise, and send across to help our allies and ourselves.

If each and every one could see this camp and its various war activities and keep in mind what agony and suffering that very training brings in its wake I do not think you could stand to not give money only. You would want to see how much you could do to alleviate that suffering and would want to help with all your strength. It will be only when we all give freely of all we have in money and work, time and strength that we can hope to have this war come to an end. Let us then bend all our energies toward that end. What if we don't get to go to the beaches as often this summer. Are our boys at the front playing in the sand or enjoying the cool breezes of the mountains? Indeed no! In the heat, stench, filth and discomfort of the battle field they are standing that you and I and our dear little ones may have and enjoy these very things we are not willing to go without even during this time of struggle and which we would never again have the privilege of enjoying were they not willing to sacrifice their all for us. Then let us work, work as we never have worked before, work with the energy and speed that we would work with if indeed the Hun was about to bombard our town. Work that the sooner we may enjoy the fruits of peace.

Supreme Court Decides in Favor of County in Road Case.

The Supreme Court decided the case of A. A. Arstik, M. J. Jenck, John Jenck and John Fleck vs. Tillamook county in favor of the latter. This was a proceeding to review the action of the county court in establishing a county road near Cloverdale and which caused more or less discussion in that part of the county.

Justice J. Behson, who rendered the decision said the first contention presented by applicants is that no preliminary survey was made of the proposed highway as required by statute. This objection is based upon the fact that the record is silent upon the subject. There is no statute requiring a record of such preliminary survey and in the absence of evidence the presumption that official duty has been regularly performed, must prevail.

It is next urged that not sufficient field notes, plats or profiles were filed as required by law. The record shows affirmatively the filing of field notes, plats or profile, and the question of their sufficiency cannot be investigated in a proceeding of this nature. Gurney vs. County Court, 33 Or. 204, 54 Pac. 1089.

The third point raised by applicants is that the County Court, having rejected the first report of the board of viewers, and without making an order discharging them, reappointed the same parties, making a new order for viewing, surveying, etc. This at most, could be no more than a mere irregularity, and no substantial error.

Finally it is urged that the county court exceeded its jurisdiction in approving the report of the viewers upon the question of damages. The report of the viewers upon this subject follows the language of the statute then governing the matter, Sec. 652 L. O. L. and the record is silent as to the manner in which they arrived at the result. Counsel for partitioners asserts that they did not make any allowance for the land actually taken, but we are unable to find anything in the record upon which to base an inference as to the details considered by the viewers in determining the amount of damage.

We find no error in the record, and the judgment is affirmed.

VOTE IN PRIMARY ELECTION.

Official Count Completed, Giving Successful Candidates for State.

Salem, Or. June 15.—Official canvass of the vote of the recent primary election was completed this morning by Secretary of State Olcott in the presence of State Treasurer Kay, Governor Withycombe being absent. The final lead of O. P. Hoff, as candidate for the Republican nomination for State Treasurer over Thomas F. Ryan, was 118 votes. David P. Mason of Albany, captured the Democratic nomination by a narrow margin over Hoff.

Other pluralities and majorities for the important offices by the official count follow:

Withycombe's lead over Olcott for Governor, 13,980; McNary's lead over Stanfield for United States Senator, 21,347; Johns' lead over Coke for Justice of the Supreme Court, 1218; Williams lead over Miller for Public Service Commissioner, 956; Williams lead over Desimone for National committee man, 15,993; Gram's lead over Dalziel for Labor Commissioner, 4436.

Gram and Williams also received the Democratic nominations for Labor Commissioner and Public Service Commissioner, respectively. J. A. Churchill, George M. Brown and Percy A. Cupper received both Republican and Democratic nominations for Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney-General and Superintendent of Water Division No. 1, respectively. George Cochran, of La Grande, also received both nominations for Division Superintendent in Division No. 2.

W. C. Hawley was accorded both the Republican and Democratic nominations in the First Congressional District, while James Harvey Graham was awarded the Democratic and N. J. Sinnott the Republican nominations in the Second District and C. N. McArthur the Republican and John S. Smith the Democratic nominations in Multnomah county for Representative in Congress. Percy R. Kelly, of Albany, who was a candidate for the Republican nomination for Justice of the Supreme Court received the Democratic nomination with Coke second and Johns third, but under the law cannot accept it.

West's lead over King for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator was 19,386; Pierce's lead over Starkweather for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination was 4482, and Forbush's lead over Morrow for Democratic National committeeman was 1454.

German Alien Women to Register.

Registration of German alien women in accordance with the President's proclamation of April 19, commenced on Monday last and will continue until the evening of June 26.

Registration in this county must be made at postoffices with the postmaster.

Registration shall be made by affidavit, to be executed in triplicate and accompanied by four unmounted photographs of the registrant, not larger than 3 1/2 inches in size, on thin paper with light background. The photograph shall be of the shoulder and full face, without hat or other head gear. A modification of the ruling has just been made, giving the right to women of any religious order or society prescribing the wearing of a headdress to furnish photographs of themselves.

Each photograph must be signed by the registrant across the face hereof so as not to obscure the features.

Particular attention is called to the requirements that the registration officer shall register the finger prints of each registrant. This must be done by the registration officer personally.

Direction for Taking Finger Prints. The following suggestions are given for the benefit of registrants who are not familiar with the method of taking finger prints:

On a smooth slip of glass or metal a coating of printer's ink should be carefully spread, evenly and thinly, by means of a roller. The registration officer should then grasp the thumb and each finger of the registrant in turn, beginning with the right hand, and roll the bulb of it on the slab. The thumb and finger should then be rolled lightly on the paper in the space designated for each. The registration officer should press the finger lightly so that a clear impression may be made. The rolling is important, so that the lines on the side, as well as on the face of the finger bulb, may be shown. After this has been done for the thumb and each finger on each hand, flat impressions of the bulbs of the four fingers of each hand should be taken simultaneously and pressed upon the paper in the blank spaces provided for this purpose.

One peculiar incident occurred in Tillamook County last week. A marriage license was issued to Geo. K. Lehnhoff and Harriett Walker. The former is registered as a German alien enemy, and the latter will have to register as a German alien woman.
