Government Awards Contract for Another Vessel.

A telegram from Washington, D.C., to the Feeney-Bremer Co., brought the good news that on the advice of L. J. Wentworth, district superintendent of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, at Portland, the shipbuilding firm had been awarded a contract to build another Ferris boat for the government. It will be built on the ways where the present boat is being built, and will be commenced as soon as the vessel now on the ways is launched. District Chairmen Report Meeting With Great Success.

THE CITY'S ROLL OF HONOR

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Balmer, of Red Clover District, Goes Over the Top With \$1000.00.

The W. S. S. drive in Tillamook County started off with every reason to believe that it will be just as successful as the Liberty Loan, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and other drives in this county, as the chairman and committee in each school district have taken hold with a vim.
County School Superintendent G. B. Lamb is the chairman of the executive committee, which also includes P. W. Todd, A. W. Bunn, Ed Gilbert, H. Crenshaw, Chester McGhee, and Fred C. Baker. The county has been well organized and reports from school districts are very encouraging.
On Monday Chairman Lamb sent the following circular letter to each district chairman:
Tillamook, Oregon June 24, 1918. To the School District War Savings Committee:
The time is growing short for the eventual occasion when one hundred million people of the United States of America shall at one time, weld themselves into Uncle Sam's mighty Home Base War Savings Army. June 28th will be a memorable day and the act will be sacred by the motive behind it. I commend you upon your splendid effort and the privilege you have of heading your district's division of this army, representing legions of Loyal American—Men, Women and Children.
Have your committee of workers completed and instructed. If not, there is yet time.
The following telegram was received by me this morning:
Portland, Ore. June 22, 1918. G. B. Lamb, Tillamook, Ore.:
War Saving Campaign in your county must not be allowed to fail. No one at time of National crisis has right to refuse time or money necessary to meet the responsibility. Delectation on part of workers is a crime. As representative of government you have right to demand full co-operation. Phone all your district and strengthen every weak point. Emphasize everywhere need of limit pledges and newspaper publicity. I am depending on you. Best wishes for success.—Jackson.
As County Chairman of War Savings you are expected to win success in June Campaign, just as we expect our boys in France to win victory in this war period. One hundred percent Americanism in your county should mean nothing less than one hundred percent pledged in war savings period. I am confident you will succeed.—F. A. Vanderlip.
The fate of this movement is in your hands. May you be firm enough and strong enough to carry it through. If I can help call by phone.

"The undersigned citizens of Tillamook City each hereby subscribe and promise to pay for War Saving Stamps in the amount of \$200.00 being an investment of \$166.66 if made to-day."
That was the heading of a subscription list circulated amongst the business men of this city by W. G. Dwight and H. H. Rosenberg, and they raised \$11,000 in the first day's round up. Should, however, the county's quota fall short of \$151,000 a number of these gentlemen will be touched for a further sum by Uncle Sam's representatives in the Tillamook City school district, for everybody who has anything to do with this drive are representing the government of the United States. Of individual subscribers, as far as we are able to learn. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Balmer, of the Red Clover School District, were the first to go over the top. Mr. Balmer taking \$800.00 worth of War Savings stamps

and Mrs. Balmer \$200.00. It was thought \$1,400.00 was a big quota for that district, and what surprised the solicitors was the first two homes they visited they reached their quota for the district.
A number of the school districts have reported that they have reached their quotas and some having gone over the top with goodly sums, Hebo reporting that it had gone over the top this morning with \$500.00 in advance of its quota.
It has been decided to hold a meeting tomorrow (Friday) evening in the City Hall at eight o'clock, which will partake of a patriotic gathering, when it is more than probably that some idea as to how the drive is progressing will be made public. Mrs. S. S. Johnson is the chairman of this district, and a strenuous effort is being made to raise considerably more than its quota, to make up for districts that have larger quotas than can be raised.

BIG CELEBRATION THE 4th. Will be the Largest Patriotic Demonstration Ever Held in the County.

There will be a big parade on the 4th of July in this city as Tillamook will be the only place in the county that will celebrate the Nation's national holiday. Big crowds are expected from Cloverdale, Beaver and the southern part of the county as well as from Bay City, Wheeler, Nehalem, Brighton and the beaches.
The soldier boys from the various spruce camps, the rifle club, fraternal orders and business men and various organizations will be in line for the parade, which will form at 10:30 o'clock a.m. The various organizations will for mon Stillwell Avenue, and south of 1st Street, all units facing north. The Tillamook band will lead the parade with the Liberty Car. The soldier boys from the various camps will be the escort and guard of honor and will take their place in the line under their command. Next in the line will be the G. A. R. and W. R. C. The fraternal floats will form in this section, the Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges of the county following their floats, the drum corps will be the next in line after which will follow the Rifle Club; the business floats and autos will form in this section using the rifle club as a base; all other organizations will be directed to their places in the line of parade by the Grand Marshal. All units forming will form in the line north from 5th street and Stillwell Ave. to prevent any confusion. The Tillamook Hose company, with their auto truck will lead the parade and keep the line of march open.
Line of March of Parade.
From 1st and Stillwell Ave, East on 1st Street to 4th Ave East; thence South on 4th Avenue E. to 3rd street; thence East on 3rd street to 5th Ave. E.; thence south on 5th Ave. E. to 5th street; thence west on 5th street to 2nd Ave. E.; thence north on 2nd Ave. E. to first street; thence East on 1st street where the parade will pass in review and halt and disband in front of the court house square where the public speaking of the day will take place.
The program and sports committees are making arrangements for prominent speakers and every effort is being put forth to secure, if possible, someone from the battle fields of Europe. There will be all kinds of contests arranged for the afternoon which will be fully announced during the day. There will be two big ball games in the afternoon after the sporting events are pulled off and there is also planned to have street dancing on the paved streets which will be roped off for the occasion. Tillamook plans a gala day.
Rollee W. Watson, assisted by able lieutenants, will be the grand marshal of the day. The various committees will preside over the sporting events for which cash prizes will be announced.
Food Hoarders are Fined.
The word has gone out from the Federal Court that there shall be no food hoarding in Oregon. In the first case ever brought before a court in this state, Fred Kebbe, a farmer of Mohler, Tillamook County, was fined \$500 for hoarding flour, and his son, Fred, Jr., was fined \$200 for the same offense.
Judge Wolverton, who passed the sentence, made it clear that the penalty was made light in this first case, and that it might be imprisonment next time. He pointed out the importance of upholding the food hoarding law to help beat the Kaiser, and said that every patriotic citizen should assist the government in winning the war in every possible way.

Questionnaires are now being mailed to June 5th, 1918, registrants; Registration numbers from 1 to 15 both inclusive were mailed June 25th; from 16 to 29 inclusive, mailed June 26th; from 29 to 43 mailed June 27th; and balance 44 to 57 inclusive were mailed June 28th. These are to be filled out and returned within seven days.
The above calls will take all the men now in class one, and with additional calls the board will have to take them from class two.
All persons who can give information in regard to any draft registrant whose status is affected by the work or fight regulations, which come effective July 1, are particularly requested by the War Department to do so.
In fact, the regulations make it the duty of all citizens to report at once all facts which may come to their knowledge concerning registrants who are idle, or who are engaged in the non-productive occupation or employment. This report should be made to the nearest local draft board.
Persons writing or giving this information in person need have no fear their names will be revealed, for this sense as strictly confidential.
Under the head of "Idlers" who will receive consideration from the local boards in their re-classification of such registrants who decline to enter a useful occupation or employment, the government lists such occupations as "gamblers of all descriptions and employes of race tracks and bucket shops, and fortune tellers, clairvoyants, palmists and the like."
