The Nehalem Box and Lumber Co's saw mill at Nehalem was totally destroyed by fire at two o'clock on Friday morning. The mill belonged to the Effenberg estate and was partly covered by insurance, the loss amounting to \$5,000. The plant originally was taken from Netarts to Nehalem. The company was furnishing the cheese factories with boxes, and the loss of the mill by fire will cause some delay in obtaining these boxes.
Tillamook County Fair Board decided to postpone the county fair this year owing to labor conditions, etc. Pamona Grange which went on record as favoring a fair early in the year, decided last week that it would be happy to postpone the fair. The readers associations also acquiesced in this, but the fair will take the form of a stock show, the date of which will be given later. This will not interfere with the school fair which will be held some time in September.

It is expected that as soon as the present boat is launched the whole of the material will be on the ground for the second vessel, which will be built much faster than the first vessel.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY ONCE MORE IN HONOR ROLL.

W.S.S. Drive a Decided Success and Quota is About Reached.

Thanks to the chairman and committee in each school district and a number of ladies, who have sold W. S. S. stamps in this city the past few months, and to the patriotic citizens who have invested in stamps, Tillamook County is again in the honor roll, having gone over the top in the War Savings Stamp drive last week. The county's quota was \$151,000, and very few persons thought that amount of money could be raised at the present time, when quite a number of citizens had only partly paid for the Liberty Loan bonds in the last drive, when Tillamook county trebled its quota. It was thought Tillamook County had set too swift a pace in that drive, and perhaps, it did, considering that other drives were to follow. Coupled with the fact that Tillamook county did treble its quota in the last Liberty Loan drive and doubled its quota in the last Red Cross drive, it is deserving of considerable more honor in going over the top in the W. S. S. drive, for it was generally admitted that the quota of \$151,000 was high when the largest amount of stamps that could be bought by one person was \$1,000.
It is safe to say that a large number of stamps have been sold in this city the past few months of which no record have been kept, which would have increased the amount of money raised in this city several thousand dollars.
A word of commendation is due the ladies of this city and some of the school districts who have been selling stamps for the past few months, and we know it was a source of pleasure to them when some of the men folks of this city took hold of the drive with the idea of getting through with it and with an effort to put Tillamook county once more over the top. That proud position is once more attained and everybody in the county appears to be happy at the results obtained. County chairman Geo. B. Lamb and the Executive Board are grateful to the large number of willing, patriotic workers in the W. S. S. drive and it is their assistance and kindly help that brought about such a flattering result and honor to Tillamook county. There are some few districts that are at work making up their quotas and stamps will continue to be sold in Tillamook, as this city is short on its quota several thousand dollars.

Report by Chairman Lamb.

The W. S. S. drive is still on and some of the districts are still canvassing to make their quota. The solicitors are all to be commended for their untiring efforts in bringing the matter before the people. The people have patriotically responded to the demands of the government. Hundreds of people in this county have made pledges that mean real sacrifices to them.
Just a little more effort is required to put the county over the top. We must not fail in this. It is not the intention of the County Chairman and Executive Board to exceed the quota set for the county by the government but it must be met. The prospects are very good that it will be within a few days more sustained effort.
Wheeler district, which includes Wheeler and Brighton, has made a star record. With a quota of \$11,200 they subscribed and sold over \$20,000 worth of stamps. The soldier boys at Brighton are deserving of special mention, having taken \$100.00 worth of stamps each.
Also the Batterson district at Anglersvale sold three times its quota of stamps. The Japanese R. R. laborers having taken a large amount. The people residents in the district however made up the quota without the outside aid; that was owing to the efforts of the solicitors.
The first district to go over the top was Rockaway.
A full report will be made next week if the returns are all in. We give below the amounts as reported at present. There will be changes in the final report.

Still Remembers Tillamook.

Eleven years ago, a French gentleman, Monsieur Le Vicompt de Peuffeuilhoux, visited Tillamook in quest of health, and became very much attracted towards the Tillamook country. He purchased a block of land in the city, lying between Third and Fourth streets, and west of Miller Ave, which he still owns. The Viscount always declared that someday he would erect a large hotel on this property. By advice of his physician he left the Tillamook country after a brief stay, for Switzerland, where he now lives.
Attorney S. S. Johnson has just received a letter from the Viscount in which he says: "I am sending you \$20.00 for the benefit of the wounded soldiers in Tillamook. No doubt your valiant young men bring a lot of glory to the Star Spangled Banner. May God protect them and bring them home again."
This is a subscription to a fund for which so far has been no necessity, but the time is not far off when some soldiers from Tillamook will return wounded, and then the fund initiated by the Viscount might be of importance. Mr. Johnson would like to have suggestions from citizens who would be interested in the premises. Meantime, the Viscount's donation will be held, and, in any event, will eventually be expended, in accordance with his intention.
We might suggest that the donation of \$20.00 be turned over to the local Red Cross to be used for civilian relief, for one of the conditions that part of the money is returned is for civilian help, of relatives or soldiers who may return sick or wounded and needed help in their respective localities.
