W. S. S. Drive Over \$200,000.
The final reports from all school districts are now all in. It is found that the town of Brighton subscribed the sum of \$10,000.00 that was not included in the report of the Wheeler district last week. Brighton and Wheeler both being in the same school district. This brings the subscription for that district to \$30,000.00; a very credible sum.
Mr. P. A. Baxter, of the Dolh district, is entitled to great credit for the work he performed in this campaign. His district quota was \$528, and the people there subscribed \$1,160.00. Mr. Baxter tramped miles and miles over mountain trails, seeking out people who were in no district and in out of the way places in both Tillamook and Yamhill counties finding people whom no one else had hunted up. In performance of this service to the nation he left his own business and work freely and willingly to "do his bit". In every school district in the county the people have gladly done all in their power to help along the cause of Democracy, giving up their work at the most busy time of the year to perform a service to the government.
If there was anyone in Tillamook County who was not as courteous to these patriotic men and women who were representatives of the government in soliciting subscriptions such person after mature consideration surely owes an apology to the solicitor, who was performing a service to the government.
Tillamook County in this drive has pledged and bought War Savings Stamps to the amount of \$192,360, thus going over the top by \$40,800.
As a large amount of stamps have been sold, of which no account was kept before the drive commenced, it is expected that when the final amount is obtained the county will have subscribed over \$200,000.
Decides Case in Favor of Beals.
Judge Bagley has decided the case of D. T. Edmunds vs. R. C. Magarrell Albert H. Malaney and F. R. Beals in favor of the defendants. The plaintiff sought to reform a conveyance of certain real property made by the defendants Magarrell and Malaney to him on August 10, 1910, so as to make the description include real property which it is asserted he purchased and was intended to be conveyed to him and which was omitted through the mutual mistake of Magarrell and Malaney. In so far as the defendant Malaney is concerned, he is in default for want of answer and the defendant Magarrell practically admits that there was such mistake, and as to Malaney and Magarrell, plaintiff would be entitled to the reformation sought. The defendant Beals, however, answers that as to the particular tract sought to be included in the description by the reformation, he is a purchaser in good faith for a valuable consideration and without notice of plaintiff's claim. The judge, in concluding his review of the case says: "I am thoroughly convinced, however, that it was intended by Malaney and Magarrell to convey to the west margin of the continuation of second street, and if it were not for the intervening rights of Beals alleged in his answer and sustained by the proof, plaintiff would be entitled to the relief sought. The decree will be for the defendant Beals."
Annoying Delay in Hardsurfacing.
It is certainly very annoying that so much delay and procrastination is going on in paving the five miles of road by the State Highway Commission south of the city. Work was started on that improvement last summer, and by the looks of things the summer will be over before another start is made. It is dollars to doughnuts whether the pavement will be completed this year, and in that event it will have to go over to the third summer and the people in the south part of the county will have to wade through the mud the same as they did last winter. If this is a criterion of the road work being carried on by the State Highway Commission, it would seem that a little more push and energy would put into the work by the engineer's department. It is unfortunate that there is such delay in federal and state road work, after so much boasting being done for good roads. These delays are having a bad effect with the people who were heartily in favor of the State Highway Commission and the work it had planned and let contracts for, but the delay, as we stated above, on the road south of this city, is certainly very annoying.

THE MOSS PICKING DRIVE.
Tillamook Branch Red Cross Making Strenuous Effort to Gather Moss.
As a result of the moss picking drive in Tillamook County, new life and new energy is being aroused to meet the immediate demand for moss and still more moss, with the result that every Red Cross auxiliary in the county is anxious to do its bit, and the next few weeks the drive will be in full swing and it is expected that Tillamook County will be going over the top in moss production. Mrs. C. J. Edwards, president of the Tillamook branch, finding that the demand for moss was so urgent and a strenuous effort should be made to meet the demands, appointed a committee, composed of Mrs. S. S. Johnson and Fred C. Baker, to organize the county for a moss picking campaign.
On Friday a delegation visited the Cloverdale auxiliary, composed of Mrs. Edwards, Mrs. E. Bates, Mrs. S. S. Johnson and Fred C. Baker, and after discussing the matter the ladies of Cloverdale decided to get busy and locate a moss bog, which is said to be in the vicinity.
The committee arranged for a moss gathering picnic at Sandlake on Sunday, but owing to lack of conveyance about a dozen persons were left behind. It was a little disappointing to them, but as there was a scarcity of sacks on Sunday those who did go to Sandlake had them filled before the lunch hour. There were delegations from Cloverdale and Beaver. Everybody appeared to have a good time, and altogether about 125 sacks of moss were gathered. It would have been no trouble to have gathered 500 sacks.
The moss picking committee conferred with Mrs. Robertson, president of the Sandlake auxiliary, and on behalf of the Sandlake people, she said that they would pick as much moss as was wanted if the committee would furnish the sacks and attend to the transportation. The committee thought this a most magnanimous offer and will endeavor to keep them well supplied with sacks. But the moss picking committee thought that it would be a good plan to arrange moss picking picnics to Sandlake and in that way the burden of the work would not fall upon the Sandlake people so much and they would be delighted to have people from other parts of the county visit them.
After the moss picking committee had conferred with Mrs. Edwards, the latter telephoned to Portland for 1000 sbs. The moss picking committee gathered up a large number of sacks on Monday which had been given the Red Cross, and purchased 50 sacks besides, which somewhat relieved the sack situation for immediate use.
It was found necessary to appoint a moss shipping committee and Mrs. Edwards appointed Mesdames Groat, Gruber and Barnes. Mrs. Edwards had been attending to the shipping and this will relieve her of this part of the work.
On Tuesday a moss picking picnic was arranged by the members of the Christian church and a goodly number went to Sandlake where they gathered 200 sacks and had a good time as well.
The children who have been picking moss at the moss rooms for several weeks were taken on a picnic to Kiches on Tuesday. Mrs. Knight having charge of the youngsters who had a good time.
Improvement Three Rivers Road
There being some question whether the improvement of the Three Rivers road would be postponed by the Federal authorities, County Judge A. M. Hare wrote the District Forester, and the following letter was received from District Engineer P. H. Dater:

The office of Public Roads informs me that the survey is practically completed and that every effort will be made to hasten the necessary office work preparatory to advertising for bids.
