It doesn't make any difference where we are, we always have a good time, and as long as shells are not actually falling around us, they are the least of our troubles.

Some amusing things happen sometimes, even here where unexpected things happen. The other day a bunch of us were out digging trenches up in the woods, when all at once a big gun went off just behind us.

Of course all this happened in an instant, and then all was as though nothing had happened—but the incident served for a few jokes anyway. It is the first shock that "gets" a fellow anyway. What is going on all the time is not greatly noticed.

I guess I had better close. Maybe I can find some ink to write the next letter with. Tom.

France, June 21, 1918. Dear George.—No noubt you will be much surprised to hear from me, but I know that you would be interested in things over here.

MORE CHEESE IN JERSEY MILK.

Cheese Made from Jersey Milk is Better Than That Made from Holstein Milk.

The above statement is the opinion of P. S. Lucas, instructor in Dairy Manufactures, of the Oregon Agricultural College, in a letter addressed to F. M. Lamb, which follows:

You have been misinformed by the man who tells you that there is more cheese in Holstein milk than there is in Jersey milk. There is not only more fat in Jersey milk but there is also more casein so that it stands to reason that since cheese is made up of these two components as well as water, there is more cheese in Jersey milk than in Holstein milk.

It is an old idea that all fat above a certain percent in milk goes into the whey, but an absolutely erroneous one, as has been proved time and time again. As a matter of fact, the proportion of fat which goes into whey from rich milk is actually less than the proportion of fat which goes into whey from poorer milk.
