ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL SPHAGNUM MOSS PICKING PICNIC.

Under Auspices of K. of P. 425 Sacks Were Picked on Sunday.

The K. of P. is entitled to a great deal of credit for its efforts in arranging a picnic on Sunday to pick sphagnum moss for the American Red Cross. It proved highly successful in every way, with a total of 425 sacks of sphagnum moss filled from the bog which had been picked over several times. Everybody worked with a vim and in 2 1/2 hours the whole of the sacks were filled and had more been on hand the party could have picked over 500 sacks. On Saturday afternoon it was seen that there were less than 300 sacks on hand, and it was found advisable to procure 150 more, which was done.

When the moss gatherers returned to the city Sunday they felt that they had performed a patriotic duty and felt elated at their success, for had the party been picked on a fresh bog it could have picked double the amount of moss, but it was thought best to pick over the old bog again, and have it cleaned up as far as possible before starting on new ground.

One trouble the moss gathering committee met with, and which is impeding the production of moss, is the need of more autos on Sundays to take people to Sandlake to gather moss. There is an urgent demand for moss. There are many willing people who are anxious to gather the moss, but there is a lack of conveyance. This is the situation that confronts the moss gathering committee, and to solve it the committee is now asking those who own autos to come to their assistance. The committee is indebted and feel thankful to those who have taken their autos and moss gatherers to Sandlake the past few Sundays, but is anxious to obtain the names of others who will do likewise. Will you help the moss committee and perform another patriotic duty to the government and the American Red Cross? If so, then notify either the chairman of the moss picking committee, Mrs. S. S. Johnson or Fred C. Baker, who will keep a list of those who offer their autos and the Sundays they will go to Sandlake. To relieve the sack situation, it was thought advisable to have plenty of sacks on hand for future moss gathering picnics to Sandlake, and with that object in view the moss gathering committee purchased 1000 sacks on Monday. These sacks will be washed and ready for use this week. It is expected that 500 sacks will be returned from Portland and other places this week, which will mean that there will be 1500 sacks available this week. Now about filling them next Sunday. Will you be one of those who will go to Sandlake and help do it? The moss gathering committee is wanting these 1500 sacks filled on Sunday if possible, and it will be no trouble to do so if persons with autos will help take pickers to Sandlake. Join the moss gathering company on Sunday and help fill these sacks.

Bids Wanted for Improvement of Three Rivers Road.

Sealed proposals for constructing or improving the National Forest Road project partly within the Siuslaw National Forest, State of Oregon, County of Tillamook, will be received by the District Engineer, Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Department of Agriculture, at Portland, Oregon, until 10 o'clock a.m. on the 17th day of August, 1918, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids, and none will be considered except those from contractors ascertained to be experienced and responsible.

The length of the project to be constructed or improved is approximately eight miles, and the principal items of work are approximately as follows: 24 acres of clearing and grubbing 30,000 yards of common excavation, 4,000 cubic yards rock excavation, construction of bridges, culverts, etc., and 10,000 cubic yards of surfacing.

The work embraced in this contract shall be completed in 300 weather working days.
