The national council for defense has offered a suggestion that property may be termed a plan to simplify the problem of Christmas shopping. Twenty carpenters came in on Tuesday to work at the ship yard from Portland, and a number of these are married men who want to bring their families to this city, but there are no empty houses to be obtained. There are quite a number of buildings that could be converted into homes for the men, and no time should be lost in doing so, for it will not be long before another hundred men will be added to the ship yard staff.
Dr. James E. Reedy, who is in the United States V. R. C., writes: "Hello, Mr. Baker, I am on my way and you know the rest—the last you will hear of me in U. S. A. for a while, that is six months to a year and a half. Tell everybody to buy Liberty bonds and see that they buy. I am on the train and the last letter I can write to Tillamook in U. S. Good Luck." The letter was dated August 3.
Proprietors of all businesses and professional men, with only a few exceptions, will pay the annual federal license of \$10, and heads of wholesale concerns doing a yearly business of \$200,000 or more of \$25, according to a schedule inserted in the draft of the revenue bill by the House ways and means committee. Farmers, merchants, ministers and teachers will be exempted from the \$10 occupational tax, as well as concerns doing an annual business of less than \$2000.
The county court will leave tomorrow for Portland to be present when the bids are opened for the improvement of the Three Rivers road. The length of the project to be constructed or improved is approximately eight miles, and the principal items of work are approximately as follows: 24 acres of clearing and grubbing, 30,000 yards of common excavation, 4,000 cubic yards rock excavation, construction of bridges, culverts, etc., and 10,000 cubic yards of surfacing. The work embraced in the contract is to be completed in 300 weather working days.

Members of the Yamhill county court were over into Tillamook county the past week investigating the sentiment favorable to the construction in cooperation with the national government of six and a half miles of road connecting Grand Ronde with the Sour Grass road. There is demand for a daily mail service through by Sheridan to accommodate that section of country about Cloverdale and Pacific City which gets service a day late when mail is sent by way of Tillamook as is now done. It is hoped to formulate an agreement this year so that by next season this stretch of road may be built, but first agreement must be made with the government and property owners as to the line of survey.—Telephone Register.

Boat Builders Exempt.
District boards may grant deferred classification to registrants on the sole ground that they are employed in the shipyards, according to a ruling received by Adjutant-General John Williams yesterday. This overrules a position taken by one district board that the men must have their Emergency Fleet Corporation exemption papers to gain deferred classification.
The matter came up as a result of the meeting of shipyard owners last week, when it was asserted that many men almost indispensable in the work were being put in class I by the district board.
The Adjutant-General telegraphed to Washington as follows:
"Can district board grant deferred classification on industrial grounds to a registrant employed in the building and fitting of ships in a plant under the supervision of the Emergency Fleet Corporation on a claim predicated on such employment?"
Provost Marshal-General Crowder replied: "The answer is yes."

THE KAISER EXPOSED.
