Sheriff Campbell, who arrested a man by the name of W. B. Johnstone who had a charge of felony filed against him in California, released the man, as Governor Withycombe would not sign the extradition pa-

pers. It appeared that the man had bought the auto on the installment plan and had allowed several payments to become delinquent, when the charge of felony was filed against him. The man agreed to pay what was owing, hence his release.
Ralph Ackley vs. Joseph Fellman is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover \$375.00. It is alleged on May 20, 1918, defendant employed plaintiff to assist in the negotiations for an exchange of properties between defendant and F. R. Beals, and the defendant agreed that in consideration of the services rendered he was to receive the above amount, which defendant refused to pay.
There were two bids for the improvement of the Three Rivers road, which were opened in Portland on Saturday last, the Tillamook county Court being present, but both of which were rejected, it being considered that they were too high. The government will call for bids to be opened on the 28th and it is probable that the county will submit a bid, for it seems to be the opinion of the county officials that the county can do the work at much less cost than the bids that were opened on Saturday. The two bids were for \$115,000 and \$130,000. The county's share of the expenses of improving the road is \$17,500, the remainder being paid by the Federal government and the State Highway Commission.

County Judge Nicholls, of Yamhill County, was in the city on Tuesday conferring with County Judge A. M. Hare in regard to the improvement of the Grand Ronde road by the government, state and Yamhill County. It appears that a difficulty arose because the Grand Ronde road was not designated a post road, hence money could not be appropriated by the government for road work. It was with the intention of making this a post road that Judge Nicholls came to Tillamook, in having a petition circulated to the postal authorities. The judge says that if it is made a post road it will save considerable time to the people of the south part of the county receiving their mail from Willamette Valley points and being a farmer of Yamhill county, the judge is anxious to see the road improved, for it will mean a great deal to Yamhill farmers when the Tillamook dairymen can take their auto trucks and buy hay in that county, as well as grain. It is hoped that the difficulty of making the Grand Ronde road a post road will be solved in the next few months, when there will be no difficulties in the way of proceeding with the work, as the money is assured. Judge Nicholls was promised every assistance from Tillamook county.

The Food Administration has appointed a committee consisting of leading citizens of Tillamook County to establish a Fair Price List which the consumers should pay for their food supplies, and this committee is now at work, and by the next issue of this paper we will publish the maximum price which the consumer will be compelled to pay for almost all staple articles of food, including flour and all the substitutes.
The Food Administration tells us that any merchant selling food articles for more than the published price will be severely dealt with and the whole system is for the protection of the consumer.
Death of Mrs. M. T. Chance.
We are sorry to announce the death of Mrs. Laura I. Chance, wife of M. T. Chance, which occurred on Tuesday last.
The deceased has been in poor health for some time and went to California for several months.
The remains were buried today, the services being in the Grange Hall at Fairview and was conducted by the Fairview Grange, there being a large number of persons present to show their last token of respect to the deceased lady.
Laura I. Chance was born at Fairview, Tillamook County, Oregon, June 4, 1863. She was the daughter of Hiram and Sarah Marshel Smith, who were early pioneers of Tillamook and Marion counties, having crossed the plains to Oregon in the summer of 1852.
Laura I. Smith was married to John T. Fletchall, March 9, 1884, at Tillamook, whose death occurred July 19, 1890. To this union the following children were born, Mrs. Rachel Weston, Mrs. Myra Goeres, Mrs. Georgie Tinnerstet and Mrs. Addie Schmeizer, who still survive, and John M. Fletchall, who died in infancy. The following brothers and sisters also survive, P. H. M. and Clarence Smith, of Dayton, Oregon; Mrs. Johnson, of Beaver, Oregon; and Hiram W. Smith, of Maderia, California.
Laura I. Fletchall was married to M. T. Chance, Oct. 19, 1893, who survives the deceased.
The bereaved family have the heart felt sympathy of a large number of friends and neighbors.
Attacked By Large Eagle.
William Coffey, who came from Kelso, Wash., and is working in the north part of the county, was in the city on Saturday, and told of the experience he had with a large eagle. He was walking on the railroad track between Wheeler and Brighton, carrying his coat over his left arm, as it was a warm day. Suddenly he was felled to the trussel over which he was passing at the time, face downward. He thought he had been sand bagged, but, not so, however, it was a large eagle that had struck him with such force that it knocked him off his feet, at the same time digging its talons into the man's neck and coat. That was the situation when Coffey looked around and realized what had happened to him. In his endeavor to extricate himself and to get on his feet again the eagle showed fight and clawed the man in the back and on the leg tearing the man's clothes. The eagle showed no signs of wanting to get away and in the fight that ensued Coffey managed to push the eagle off the trussel with the coat, and both fell into the water below. Coffey tried to recover the coat, taking his shoes off, but the eagle attacked him again, when Coffey grabbed his coat and threw it over the eagle and captured it, but it was no easy job to hold it as the eagle showed fight and made desperate efforts to get away. After a time Coffey managed to hold the eagle in such a way, with the coat over it that it was held captive. Coffey did not propose to let go of the eagle, but was in a quandry to know how to recover his shoes and socks. A stranger coming along he asked him to hold the eagle, but the stranger said he would not do so for \$20, so Coffey packed the bird to Brighton, where the men of the spruce division were assembled, and Coffey gave them the bird as a mascot. From tip to tip the eagle measured 96 inches and was the largest eagle ever seen in this country. The spruce men have the eagle under their care. "A DAUGHTER OF THE GODS"
A \$1,000,000 Picture to be Shown at The Gem Theatre, August 27.
"A Daughter of the Gods," William Fox's screen fantasy, with Annette Kellermann in the title role was presented in Washington recently. The production is said to have cost a million dollars. Reckoned by the appreciation of a show-defying audience, it was worth the money. Miss Kellermann was given whirlpools, cascades, rock-toothed breakers and plain ocean to swim in, a sultan to dance before, a fairyland to play in and an army to lead to war. To materialize environments in keeping with the activities of this super-women of the screen the Fox million waved its golden wand and a city of Moorish splendor rose on the shores of Kingston, with the tropic loveliness of all Jamaica for the background and a restless sea billowing from beach to skyline.
The magic of the same wand created a queer, happy world, inhabited by apparent thousands of tiny, white bearded gnomes, and yet another sea-kingdom, where forever happy mermaids breasted billows and danced in foamy spray.
There is a prologue in which a bird escapes from a cage—its earthly prison—and becomes Anitia, a daughter of the gods. The story is told in two parts and many scenes, and everything happened a long time ago in a country not on the map. The land is ruled by a sultan, who has become a cruel despot through grief for a long lost son, who was lost in the sea. The Witch of Badness, jealous of the power of the Fairy of Goodness, who guards Anitia, promises to restore the prince from his sea grave if the sultan will put the maid to death.
Stolen by desert thieves, she has already been sold to the royal harem and dances before the ruler, who offers her jewels and caresses. She spurns both and wins the love of the just-restored prince. The sultan jealous on his own account, imprisons Anitia in a formidably high tower, and she dives from a window into the sea. Chased by scores of slaves, she is captured, bound and thrown to the crocodiles.
The instant the girl touches the water her good fairy changes the huge wide-jawed creatures into swans. Fearing the sultan's wrath, the executioners open the water gates, and Anitia is swept over a cascade into the whirlpool below.
There is no screen deception in the sensational exhibit. Miss Kellermann, bound from neck to ankle, is spun around in the frothy undercurrent, dashed against rocks and finally swims out to sea. Her friends, the mermaids, direct her to the friendly gnomes, and Anitia is happy among them until the fairy calls her to lead the little people against the sultan in defense of the prince, who has been bound to a sea rock to die. The fairy changes the dwarfs into splendidly vigorous crusaders, with Anitia at their head.
There is the clash of cross and crescent; the scaling of the city's walls, the terrified flight of harem women, slaves and dancing girls, the destruction of the city by fire, and a supreme moment when Prince Omar, freed to defend his father's realm against the enemy, meets Anitia, each with visor lowered, and the daughter of the gods is slain by the lover she had fought to save.
The prince dies and the two are happily reunited in "the land of the Great Beyond" Katherine Lee, as the little girl who pined to death for her beloved bird and is transformed into a coral-crowned mermaid, excels even her remarkable work with Miss Kellermann in "The Daughter of Neptune," and her baby sister, Jane Lee, was wonderfully cunning as a minnow merman who on earth was the little prince who was lost in the sea.
While the production primarily demonstrates the spectacular power of the screen, one persistent idea threads the iridescence of the picture splendor, the happiness of the "great beyond."
Plans Three War Loans.
Washington, Aug. 17.—Tentative plans of the treasury provide for three big Liberty loan campaigns within the next year, each to raise \$5,000,000,000 or more. The first will be from September 23 to October 19, as announced; the next is planned for January or February, and the third May or June.
This program will be necessary, it is said, to provide \$16,000,000,000 required in addition to the \$8,000,000,000 to be provided by the new revenue bill.
If government expenses and loans to allies fall much below the \$24,000,000,000 estimate, the government is expected to try to combine two loans into one big campaign for the largest credit ever sought by any nation. Such a campaign would be set for such a time in the late winter,
