## WANT 250 VOLUNTEERS TO GATHER MOSS. Also 60 Autos to Go to Sandlake on Sunday.

Portland Chapter of the American Red Cross, in a letter to Mrs. C. J. Edwards, president of the Tillamook Branch, is wanting 5000 sacks of Sphagnum moss for a reserve supply to be used the coming winter. With the moss gathered Sunday, and in transit, which amounts to about 2000 sacks, this will leave between 2000 and 3000 sacks to be gathered before the wet weather sets in. That is the moss situation in a nutshell, and as the Portland Chapter makes an urgent appeal to the Tillamook Branch, it is very important that a strenuous effort be made to procure the moss as soon as possible.

There are quite a number of persons in the county who are deserving of a great deal of credit for the time they have given in procuring moss, also to those who own autos and auto trucks, but there are others who have taken no part in this commendable work. Taking into consideration the number of persons and the number of autos in the county, it has been a little difficult to obtain moss gatherers and autos to take willing workers to Sandlake.

It is true that Portland Chapter is greatly pleased with the efforts of Tillamook people in furnishing such a large amount of sphagnum moss, and they appreciate it greatly, but it is the desire of the moss gathering committee that a strenuous effort be made the next two weeks to procure the balance of the moss required. With a little sacrifice, a little effort and kindly co-operation on the part of the citizens, this can be accomplished in one day if about 50 or 60 autos can be obtained to take 250 volunteers to Sandlake next Sunday. This is an exceedingly small thing to ask the people to do, considering the urgent need for moss and what sacrifices are being made in France by men from all parts of the United States.

With these few remarks in behalf of the American Red Cross and the Tillamook Branch, we call for 250 volunteers and 60 autos for next Sunday to go to Sandlake.

There were 700 empty sacks left on the ground last Sunday. These could have been all filled had 60 additional persons been present. Those who stayed away—not those who went to Sandlake—are responsible for the empty sacks.

Give this appeal your cheerful response and kindly co-operation by the registering of your auto or truck and name with Mrs. S. S. Johnson of the moss gathering committee, between now and Saturday evening, for those who take part in the moss gathering drive will have the satisfaction of knowing that they did a patriotic service and helped a great and good cause.

A telephone message from Prof. Sweetzer offers 500 sacks of moss for Salem next Sunday. There is no patriotic duty more needed at this time than the gathering of moss. Tillamook county can furnish it, and should do so cheerfully, for American boys are being wounded in larger numbers than ever before.

Volunteers should register their names, and those who volunteer their autos or auto trucks, at once with Mrs. S. S. Johnson, chairman of the moss gathering committee, Bell Phone 49, so that proper arrangements can be made for Sunday's moss drive and the number of sacks to be provided.

Cruel and inhuman treatment is alleged on the part of the plaintiff, the defendant accusing his wife of being unfaithful and associating with other men. The plaintiff says her husband has a violent temper and refused to provide her with proper clothing, requiring her to take in washing and earn money to purchase her clothing. No children were born to the union, and plaintiff wants \$25.00 per month alimony. Rollie W. Watson vs. Tillamook City, Robert T. Boals, Mayor, Albert H. Gaylord, city recorder, and Allen L. Page, George A. Edmunds, Gordon L. Burge, Addison H. Harris and Fred Christensen, councilmen, is a suit filed in the circuit court to enjoin and restrain the city officials from paying out insurance money to Albert H. Gaylord, who is the city recorder, the plaintiff contending that no officer of the corporation shall be interested in any contract work, the expenses of which are to be paid out of the city treasury. Keep your eye on the newspapers to learn the date of the coming registration day for men from 18 to 20, and from 31 to 45 years of age, inclusive, under the new draft law, soon to be passed by Congress. The exact date of the Registration Day on which 13,000,000 men in the United States included within these ages must register, cannot be announced until the new draft law is actually passed and signed by the President. But it is certain that the Registration day will be early in September. Every man in the new draft ages, whether citizen or alien, will be required to register on the day set. No excuse will be accepted for failure to register, and the penalty will be up to one year's imprisonment. For his own protection, every man affected by the new draft law is urged to watch the newspapers for announcement of the Registration Day, and to register on that day at the place designated by his local draft board without fail.
