He is a graduate of the Royal Military College, of England, and has had twenty-three years of experience in the British Army.. He has served in every campaing undertaken by the British Government during that time, including the Boer war and the Boxer troubles. He has been attached to many foreign armies as mititary observer, including the Japanese army during the Russo-Japanese war and the German army. On several occasions he has been detailed to train foreign troops. At the outbreak of the present war he was commissioned to recruit a regiment in Ireland. This regiment he trained and officered with cadets whom he also trained, and led to France, where, as a part of the famous Ulster division, it was fairly wiped out in the early days of the battle of the Somme, in an action which has been characterized as the greatest deed of the war. Colonel Leader was himself broken down by the campaign, and after months in hospitals was pronounced unfit for further active war service.

He is at present Commandant of the Officers Training Camp at the University of Oregon. He has spoken many times in other parts of the state and always delivered a message that is worth while. Don't fail to

## Registration Day To-Day.

Every man in the United States and its possessions between the age of 18 and 20, inclusive, and 31 and 45 inclusive, whether he is a citizen or an alien, must register today (Thursday), Sept. 12th, proclaimed a registration day by President Wil son under the new draft law lower ing and raising the draft ages.

It is expected that the number of men who register in Tillamook county today will be somewhere about the

If a man is 46 years old on Regis tration Day, Thursday, September 12, is he requested to register?

This is typical of many question asked regarding registration require ments under the new draft law which lowers and raises draft limit to include all men between the age of 18 and 45 years, both inclusive. The answer to the foregoing ques tion is "No". A man who is 46 years old on Registration Day, September

12, does not register. If, however, his 46th birthday should come on September 13, the lay after Registration day, he would have to register, for he would then e within the 45 year age limit on

September 12. Similarly, a youth who has attaind his 18th birthday on or before Chursday, Septembar 12, must regiser. If he is not 18 years old until he next day, September 13, he does tot register.

All men between the ages of 18 and 5 years, both inclusive, who have ot already registered under the forper 21 to 30 age limits, both inclu- MISS BROCKWELL IN ive, must register on Registration ay. The only exceptions are men lready in the military service.

That is to say, every man who has ttained his 18th birthday on or beore Thursday, Sept. 12, and has not ttained his 46th birthday by that ate, must register unless he has alady registered under the 21 to 30 ear draft law, or is in the military r naval service.

### Older Men, Crowder Announces, Will Be Inducted Into Service Later.

Washington, Sept. 10 .- Youths of 19 and 20 years and men between able fighting material in their ranks has been exhausted older men will not be inducted into service.

Questionnaires will go to these registrants first and boards have been ordered to proceed so that some may be called in October.

General Crowder, in a statement to all employes and industrial represen-Tweedledee thrown into a dark and the plans of industrial deferments

General Crowder has said the War Department could expect to draw 000 men physically fit for service

150,000 to Enter Schools.

He also said that men of 19 and 20 called were entitled to admission to the students' training corps at the 400 secondary schools with which the War Department has made contracts, but added that this corps would number 150,000 men, while over 3,000,000 youths below 21 will register Thursday.

Methods of selecting these to be inducted into military service and educational training corps, he said, were the concern of other branches

of the Administration. "Someone must indicate that the individual case is one which should arrest the special attention of the boards in respect to the registrant's occupational status," said General Crowder in his statement. "The boards do not possess a superhuman omniscience. Nor are they permitted by circumstances to devote unlimited time to the search of questionnaires for possible grounds of claim."

In 1917 out of more than 3,000,000 registrants called, only 140,000 filed occupational claims, or 4.7 per cent; thus 95 per cent of all registrants no question of such deferment.
