FIRST BUNCH OF LIBERTY LOAN SUBSCRIBERS.

Tillamook County is not Buying As Fast and Strong as it Should.

Below we give the first bunch of Fourth Liberty Loan subscribers in Tillamook county. The list is a little disappointing, for Tillamook people are not subscribing as fast or as strong as they should. But this can be easily overcome the next few days for it is important that our citizens subscribe for Fourth Liberty Bonds as soon as possible. The local banks being closed on Wednesday on account of the Sphagnum moss drive, may have had something to do with the small number of bond subscribers up to the present time. By this time next week Tillamook county should and will have raised its quota. It must be raised next week, and the local committees will see that it is raised. Everybody will have to come through who possibly can. There are a limited number of persons who are not financially able to subscribe for bonds at this time, having shot their wad in the previous drive, but there are hundreds of others who are able to do so, and a large number of persons financially able to subscribe for large amounts. Remember that Tillamook's quota will have to be raised by the end of next week, therefore, it is important that you subscribe at once to avoid the rush at the banks.

It is reported that Tillamook County's quota is \$275,000.

The Liberty Temple will open on Sunday for the purpose of selling bonds.

LAST MOSS GATHERING DRIVE.

Large Number of Business Men and Others Go To Sandlake.

At a meeting of the City Council on Monday evening, it was decided that Mayor Boels should issue a proclamation asking the business men to close on Wednesday for the purpose of going to Sandlake to gather Sphagnum moss for the American Red Cross, consequently the next day bills were posted to that effect. The notice came somewhat as a surprise to most of the business men, who considered that more time should have been given and the business men consulted. However, quite a number of the stores closed with the banks as well, while others remained open.

This was the last moss picking drive of the season, which was scheduled for next Sunday, as a little less than 2000 sacks are required to fill the demand at this time.

There were over 100 persons in the drive on Wednesday, and they made a splendid record in moss gathering, for it is estimated it amounted to over 2000 sacks.

This will end the moss gathering drives for the present, and the people of Tillamook county, have made a splendid record and are certainly deserving of a great deal of credit for the strenuous effort they made in gathering Sphagnum moss for the American Red Cross.

County Exhibit at State Fair.

County Agent Jones and County School Supt. Lamb have been very busy the last few weeks getting the county and school exhibits together for the State Fair. The car of exhibits left Wednesday morning of this week and contained agricultural and other products representing the chief industries of the county.

Tillamook county will also be represented in the live stock line by a sow and litter of six pigs grown by Wesley Tippin, of Garibaldi, in the Pig Club work this summer. The sow is a pure bred Chester White and was bought last spring of Joe Donaldson. Wesley has kept a record of the cost of the pigs and will show them in competition with the other pig club members of the state at the State Fair.

Jos. Durser recently donated a registered Guernsey bull calf to the local Red Cross. She will be sold at auction at the State Fair and the proceeds turned over to the local Red Cross.

Chapel Car in Tillamook.
