Red Cross Thanks Patriotic Citizens.
On behalf of the Red Cross, I want to express a vote of thanks to the business men and the public in general for the splendid way in which they responded to the S. O. S. call for help in gathering sphagnum moss on Wednesday of last week. Every boy in France will reap direct benefit from your sacrifice in putting business aside for one day to help in this great work.
Every boy who faces the trenches has a sphagnum moss pad sewed into his clothing. When I reached Portland on Thursday I found an order for moss just twice as large as was expected. This order was for 100,000 pads and demanded a larger amount of moss than had been expected. I talked the matter over carefully with the manager, and also of the inevitable waste occurring when large numbers of raw pickers were sent to gather moss, and am gratified to be able to report that it is the opinion of Mr. Smith, that both from the standpoint of the proper harvesting of the moss, and as an economic measure on the part of those who pay the expense of sending cars to

carry pickers, that in future we employ experienced pickers to gather moss, instead of sending many cars with large numbers of inexperienced pickers.

Linen Shower for Hospitals in France.
A request comes from the National Red Cross, to ask the people of the United States for a linen shower for the hospitals in France. The shower is to be given during the week beginning the 30th of September, and is to consist of bath towels, hand towels, handkerchiefs, napkins, and sheets. They are to be of nearly new material, and to be coarse in texture. Each family is asked to give one, or a pair of pieces. These must be clean.
The Red Cross have asked that the communities respond liberally to this call. The town is to be divided into groups, and the ladies requested to collect the gifts. The following leaders are appointed, Mrs. John Perry, Mrs. L. F. Wilson, Mrs. Kennedy, Mrs. Botta, Mrs. Doty, and Mrs. Crenshaw.

The following letter was received from Lynn Henderson, who is in the 155 Co. 9th Regiment, in Texas.
Dear Dad—Received your long letter and can assure you that every thing you said was very interesting. I cannot write very much tonight, for must answer several other letters that I have been neglecting to write.
I received the razor and it is doing good work when the occasion demands, which is not often. I have a very light growth of beard and am certainly thankful. Some of the fellows have to shave every morning. Since being transferred into the 9th Reg. we have not had to work very hard, but as the companies are filled and things begin to run a little more systematically, then life will not be quite so easy. I will enumerate a days routine as it now stands.
First thing in the morning after reveille we fall out for fifteen minutes, Swedish or exercise. Then we go to "chow" and dine on slum and coffee diswater. Immediately after "chow" we police up around and in our tents for inspection at 8 o'clock. At 8:30 we fall out for drill and stand at attention for about 15 minutes, while undergoing another inspection. Our guns and clothing must be very clean, especially the former, or Lord help us. Its then "Squads right March!" to the parade grounds. The first period consists of close order drill, then a ten minutes rest. The second period takes up skirmishing, patrol, scouting, etc. Bayonet work takes up the third period and its pretty hard work. At 11:15 we are marched in and at twelve partake of our "beans" From 1:30 until 2:20 we practice signaling, which consists of the hand semaphore and the dot and dash code. From 2:30 to 2:50 we practice grenade throwing. The last period is devoted to swimming, which interests me as you know. Every Thursday we go on a long hike with packs. We also carry backs all morning every day we drill. Wednesday afternoon is athletic day and the fellows run, jump, box, swim, etc. Saturday morning camp is inspected by the Colonel. I would pay a dollar for every match or cigarette, but that could be found. Saturday afternoon we can go on liberty until 12 p.m. Sunday the same.
