PERSHING'S STAR.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Has Service Flag For General.

From in front of St. Mary's Episcopal church at Cheyenne, Wyo., there floats a service flag that has more interest than any other in this section of the middle west, for it carries one bright blue star standing all alone above the rest in honor of General John J. Pershing, commander in chief of the American expeditionary forces in France. Permission to add this star to this flag was given by General Pershing.

General Pershing's connection with Cheyenne is one of sentiment, for it was here the romance began which resulted in his marriage to Miss Frances E. Warren, daughter of United States Senator Francis E. Warren. Mrs. Pershing, with her three little daughters was burned to death in a fire at the Preidio, San Francisco, while the general was on the Mexican boarder. It was in the picturesque church over which the Pershing star floats that their funeral services were held.

Unifying the Churches.

Is the war to result in fewer churches and more religion? Last winter under the duress of heatless days there were numerous instances of churches uniting their services on account of the coal shortage. The three Protestant churches of Schenharle, N. Y., have gone a step farther than the expediency measure of last winter and have voted to form a federation for the period of the war. The denominational bodies represented in this federation are Methodist, Lutherans and Reformed and they are to be served by a new minister chosen from a denomination other than any of the three.

The time may be far distant when there will be a single Christian Church. It may be wise that there should not be. There is, however, an unquestionably strong tendency toward greater church unity. The first and most neutral step would be unity in the many branches of different denominations. If three churches in a small village can worship together, why should not all the scattered members of the Methodist denomination be brought together and another union be consummated of all Lutheran bodies?

When all the branches of each of the great denominations become united, a great step will have been taken toward unity of Christian forces. Leslie's Weekly.

No Party Monopolizes Patriotism.

It is recognized here among all careful students of the political situation that the balance of power in the coming election is held by the thinking voter of the highest type. This is the voter who must be appealed to as an American, who reasons things out for himself on broad constructive lines, and who casts his vote in national affairs with as great care as he makes a decision in any of the vital affairs that affect his own life. This type of voter is asking urgently and seriously whether he should support the Republican or Democratic congressional candidate in the present campaign.

The Democratic appeal is chiefly based on the cry of "support the President," despite that in his cabinet of the war and in all vital legislation the support necessary to the enactment of war legislation asked by the president has been that furnished without thought of party by the Republicans in Congress. The Democrats are also, wherever they can, striving to create an impression that in some inexplicable way it would be an act of disloyalty to vote against the President's party candidates. They are still using this false issue despite the fact that it has failed them in Wisconsin, New Hampshire and Illinois, and will doubtless again fail them again in Maine in September. The war has never been in any sense a party issue from the moment the United States entered the conflict. As a matter of fact everyone knows that Democrats and Republicans are united to bring complete success to the allied cause, although it is a matter of record that the Republicans in Congress, because they possess a higher grade of judgment and a clearer vision, have furnished more effective support to war legislation than the Democrats.

The Republicans have for the thinking voter two main lines of argument. There are: First, that the President and the world should know that in electing a Republican Congress the will of America would express itself definitely now against a premature or compromise peace; and second, that the rehabilitation of the nation after the war must be placed in the hands of the party best fitted by temperament, ability, history, and personal to accomplish what will have to be almost a miracle of constructive statesmanship.

Germany's Friendliness.

"Why has Germany no friends?" asks Vorwärts, the Berlin Socialist newspaper. The question is merely rhetorical. Vorwärts knows the answer. But the truth can be told in Germany only by indirection and in cautious instalments.

Germany has no friends because she deserves none. She is psychologically incapable of making friends. She recognizes no sanction but that of force. In her dealings with other peoples she wants to compel submission, not to create friendship or gratitude.

When in German Territory.

We may be thankful that the war in the form it has assumed has, on the whole, been spared in our home territory.—Hindenberg.

The war is not over. If the allies penetrate into German territory, they will not be capable of the beastly atrocities committed by the Germans in Belgium and France, but under the extreme provocation they had, it will be a very grave question whether they will not exact from the Germans a form of retribution beyond anything the Germans have believed possible.

The Speech of a Baffled and Beaten Man.

The words spoken by the German kaiser at the Krupp munition works are the troubled thoughts of a guilty soul. He "doth protest too much." He labors hard to cast off his guilt and a greater falsehood was never spoken than his assertion that "envy induced our enemies to fight and war came upon us."

Every American knows that no thought of envy of Germany prosperity and growth lay in any mind in this country in 1914. And beyond that the record is incontestable that France wanted peace, that Italy shrank from entering the conflict, and that British statesmanship, profoundly saddened by the dread prospect of war, made frantic efforts in every chancellery in Europe to prevent it.

That is history and the kaiser can not cry it out.

"Who was it?" asks the kaiser, "who introduced terrible hatred into this war?" and he hastens to add the false answer: "It was the enemy." Does the German kaiser imagine that the world can so soon forget such blasting truths as Germany's quick coinage of the hate-engendering slogan, "Gott strafe England?" Does he imagine that human memory is so transitory that even now it can forget the storms of German hatred that glorified the sinking of the Lusitania, that shouted the German nation hoarse over Belgian atrocities and the horrors of the invasion of France?

With Pecksniffian cant the kaiser impudently appeals to witness that since December, 1916, he has made repeated overtures for peace—but a peace that would leave Germany rich with the spoils of conquest and unpunished for its crime.

Between the lines of the German emperor's speech can very readily be read a cunning purpose to save himself and his throne from the deep disappointment and the impending wrath of his own outraged and suffering people. It is the speech of a baffled and terror-stricken man.—Spokesman Review.

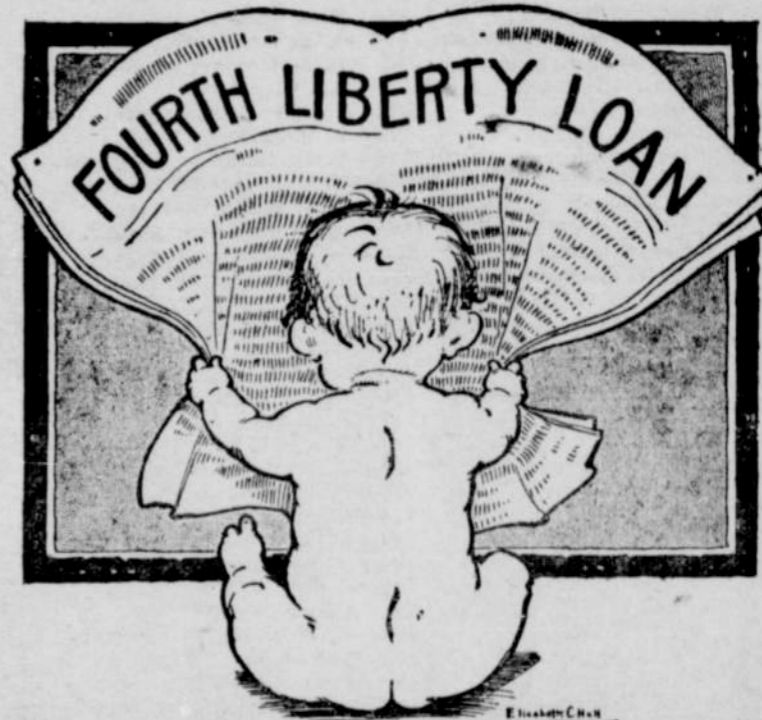
