

**MORE FOURTH LIBERTY LOAN SUBSCRIBERS.**

At a meeting of the committee of the Fourth Liberty Loan on Saturday evening at the Liberty Temple it was ascertained that this banking district had failed to reach its quota, being \$20,000 short. It was decided to appoint an assessment committee with the idea of raising that amount. The committee will go over the list of subscribers and ascertain whether some of the wealthy citizens have only subscribed small amounts when they should have taken larger sums, as well as to assess those who have not subscribed for bonds. There appears to have been a misunderstanding in the announcement being made that Tillamook County had subscribed its quota when, in fact, it had not done so, and this, no doubt, is the reason why people failed to buy as largely as they otherwise would. Another thing, there appeared to be a general understanding that as soon as the quota was reached that the strenuous effort should relax, as there will be other drives to follow. These two matters had something to do with this banking district falling below its quota, and now that an effort is being made to obtain the shortage, we have no doubt that it will be forthcoming in the next few days.
