Mrs. Dr. Boals has kindly consented to act as chairman of the Tillamook City committee to take charge of the packages which friends will send to the boys over seas. The cartons are expected to arrive about the first of November. According to directions Mrs. Boals will take charge of the packing and labeling of the packages. No packages can go unless sent by the 15th of November. Mrs. Boals will be assisted by Mrs. Kennedy.
C. A. Dunn who is connected with the State Highway Commission came in from Salem to make preparations for the improvement of the the Three Rivers road, which will be done by the State Highway Commission. Work will be started as soon as possible, as it is the intention of the Commission to get out the rock this winter so that the road can be completed as early as possible next year. Attorney General Brown was asked for an opinion whether the Commission could do the work legally and he has decided that it can.
At a meeting of the Executive Board of the Tillamook Branch of the Red Cross on Tuesday, the matter of caring for the sick, should the Spanish influenza become prevalent in the county was discussed, a letter from the Portland chapter having been read promising co-operation. Another matter that was discussed was the next war drive for funds for seven organizations. Mrs. Everson the secretary, who left for Portland later in the day with the treasurer, Thad Robison, were authorized to confer with the Red Cross officials in Portland on these matters.
Orpha A. Eastman vs. Alonzo Thomas Eastman is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married at Caldwell, Idaho, on April 3, 1905. The plaintiff alleges cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of the defendant, who on several occasions nearly killed the plaintiff by his violent and savage blows. There is one child by the union. The plaintiff prays that the marriage contract be dissolved, that she have interest in certain property, that she have judgment against the defendant for \$1000 and \$200 for the benefit of the plaintiff and that the latter have custody of the child.
The Fire Protection Board is anxious that the people be enlightened in regard to air craft production, especially in timber sections of the country where the fir and spruce grows. The Board is sending out samples of wing beams to different localities, so as to give lumbermen a better idea of the final disposition of the stock. These wing beams are finished products, but rejected for defects which can be plainly seen by lumbermen, and which shows the care which must be taken in their manufacture. Two of these wing beams have been sent to Thad Robison, of the Tillamook County Bank, and they are now on exhibition in the bank, with the places marked where they are effective.

Kilchis Forest Fire Loss.
The forest fire up the Kilchis river is far more extensive than at first thought, having, it is stated, burned over two townships of timber mostly belonging to the Whitney Co. It is thought that this fire was of incendiary origin as several fires had been started on what is known as the Crane place. The actual loss cannot be estimated at present, and this can only be obtained by the timber being recruised.
Another Tillamook Boy Seriously Wounded.
Geo. W. Phelps, of Garibaldi, Ore., received a cable October 15th that his son First Lieutenant Francis M. Phelps, was dangerously wounded September 28th in France, where he has been at the front since last June. Lieutenant Phelps joined the ranks May 12th 1917. He was born and raised in Tillamook county where he had a lot of friends and for 6 years practiced law in Portland.
Death of Rebecca Browning.
Rebecca Swift was born in Marion County, Ind., June 26, 1850. Went to Missouri at the age of 18. Was married to R. P. Browning, a soldier of the Civil War. He died in 1901. Five years ago she came to Blaine, Oregon. On October 9 she suffered a stroke of apoplexy and two days later peacefully passed away. She was a member of the M. E. South Church. One sister and four children survive her, namely: Mrs. Clara Sinclair, in Missouri; Mrs. Annabelle Jones and Clyde, of Blaine, Ed Ernest, of Seattle. Interment was at Blaine, conducted by Mrs. Dora Young.
Herbert H. Edgar Died of Wounds.
A telegram reached this office on Friday afternoon from Portland stating that Herbert H. Edgar, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Edgar, of South Prairie, had been taken prisoner. A week previous he had been reported killed. The news of his being a prisoner did not prove to be correct, for he was mentioned in Friday's casualty list as having died from wounds. Edgar's parents were hopeful that their son had been taken prisoner, but the mistake had been made in Portland. The young man was 29 years of age and was drafted at Bend, having taken up a home-stand in Eastern Oregon. He came to Tillamook to visit his parents, 23rd February last, previous to going "over there", coming in on the train on Saturday and leaving the next morning. Mr. and Mrs. Edgar have the sympathy of the people of the county in the loss of their son.
Is Mrs. Stranahan's Petition Legal Or Null and Void?
In making up the official ballot for the general election, County Clerk Harrison ran across a snag in the petitions of the four candidates for county treasurer. The petitions of Mrs. Everson, Miss Mills and W. J. Bryan each designated themselves as "Independent" candidates, which is the usual form for candidates who are nominated by petition, while the petition of Mrs. Stranahan is designated as "Republican" and complying with the wording of the petition the county clerk designated her as a Republican on the ballot. Referring the matter to District Attorney T. H. Goyne, he decided that the county clerk could not legally place Mrs. Stranahan on the ballot as a Republican, for no one could use the name of a political party without having first obtained the endorsement of the County Central Committee, of the party they belonged, and in this case even the central committee had no legal right to endorse a candidate. The district attorney is somewhat in doubt whether Mrs. Stranahan's name can be placed on the ballot, and this is the opinion of some legal lights of the city. Previous to either of the candidates becoming aspirants for public office, Mrs. Everson, Miss Mills and Mr. Bryan had registered as Republicans and all of whom had been identified with that party, while Mrs. Stranahan had registered as an "Independent." Since circulating her petition she had her registration changed to Republican. It seems that Mrs. Stranahan endeavored to obtain the endorsement of the Republican County Central Committee, and a meeting was called for that purpose, but it failed to materialize, for it would have placed the committee in a ludicrous and embarrassing position to have endorsed a person who had registered as an Independent, and who had no political affiliation with the Republican party, when there were three other candidates, each of whom were regular and genuine Republicans, when the committee had no legal right to do so. The question now in doubt is whether the county clerk can designate Mrs. Stranahan as an "Independent," when her petition says: "That party of political principle which she represents is the Repub-

lican party," when, in fact, she was not a member of that party, and in the opinion of some persons she had no right to circulate that kind of a petition. To solve the matter, a friendly suit should be started, if immediate action is taken, and this would not only settle the controversy but avoid legal proceedings after the election.
SPANISH INFLUENZA TAKES HOLD IN TILLAMOOK COUNTY
Ban Placed on Schools, Churches, Movies, Pool Rooms and Meetings.
Tillamook County was not to be overlooked in the Spanish influenza drive, which is world wide in its scope, and acting on the advice of the State Health Authorities Mayor R. T. Boals on Sunday closed the churches, movies and pool rooms, and the next day the schools came under the ban in all parts of the county. Following is Mayor Boals' proclamation.
A Proclamation.
Conforming to the following order issued by the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service I hereby declare that all public meetings, all public schools, all churches, theatres, pool halls and other places of amusement shall be closed until further notice.
R. T. Boals Mayor.
To the Mayor, Tillamook, Oregon.
By order of the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, you are directed to discontinue all public meetings, close all public schools and places of amusement on the appearance of the present world wide epidemic of influenza.
You are requested to urge on every one the necessity of avoiding crowds and shopping until the present epidemic has subsided. Signed,

There have been several cases in the county for over a week, but not of a serious nature, and although it is thought that the disease might spread rapidly in this county, there others who take the opposite view if proper precautions are taken and the doctors are informed immediately, so that houses can be quarantined.
TILLAMOOK BANKING DISTRICT IS SHORT \$25,000.
Effort to be Made to Raise This Amount Immediately.
Tillamook Banking District is short \$25,000 in its quota for the Fourth Liberty Loan drive and this amount must be made up immediately. Quite a number of persons who were financially able to buy large amounts of bonds have only subscribed for small amounts, and this is the reason why this banking district failed to come through on time and with its full quota.
This is how the district stands:
First National Bank \$93,300
Tillamook County Bank 72,050
Total \$165,350
A number of persons have increased their subscriptions the past few weeks and quite a number of additional bonds have been sold. Although the amount of money raised in the county is \$285,350, the committee does not intend to allow those who have not bought as large amounts of bonds as they should have to get off in that manner, and their names will be published if they do not come through immediately. The other banking districts in the county have come through and so must the Tillamook district, and the persons who have only taken out \$50.00 or \$100.00, when they should have taken \$500 or 1,000., are going to be rounded up and made to "cough up."
