Henry E. Thompson and Clay Brown vs. Joseph Fellman, O. V. Roberts, Pacific City Lumber Co., W. B. Alderman, H. Sander and F. R. Beals, is a suit filed in the circuit court to recover money growing out of the sale of the Pacific City Lumber Co. There is a second suit in which Henry C. Thompson and Clay Brown are the plaintiffs and Joseph Fellman and O. V. Roberts, Pacific Lumber Co. and F. R. Beals are defendants.  
Blanche Johnson vs. Oliver C. Johnson, is a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. These parties were married at Dayton, Oregon, the 29th of December, 1914, and no children were born to the union. The complaint alleges that defendant treated plaintiff in a very cruel and inhuman manner, and has heaped upon her such personal indignities as to render her life burdensome, failed to provide her with a proper home and support, that he was very reckless in all his business transactions and neglected to pay his honest obligations, and that defendant has a very bad temper. The plaintiff prays the court to dissolve the marriage contract and be allowed her maiden name, Blanche Tucker.  
P. S. Brumby, representing the Bloodgett Co., was in the city on Wednesday, having returned from a trip up the Wilson river to see what damage was done to the timber in the recent forest fire. The fire started on Bill Smith's place from a fire he had set out. The fire went rapidly over a large stretch of timber, and Mr. Brumby thinks that the timber destroyed will be a total loss, especially that up Cedar creek, where there is a large quantity of cedar and hemlock. This is an unfortunate and serious loss to the timber owners, who had taken every precaution to prevent fire, but it goes to prove what damage can be done by persons who indiscreetly set out fire. It will be known in a few days the amount of damage done and the lands over which the fire swept.  
The Tillamook Headlight criticizes the early announcement that Tillamook county had reached its quota in the Liberty Loan, for the reason that it influenced persons who might otherwise subscribed and caused others to buy less than they would had they not believed the responsibility had been met. The criticism is well founded, and applies with equal force to Washington county, where there is no question that optimistic early reports had an effect upon subscriptions. According to Portland newspapers the state headquarters were told by the county chairman not to worry about Washington county because it would be over the top before the end of the week before the campaign officially opened. At that time less than half of the quota of the Hillsboro district had been raised. We only refer to this matter because of its effect upon future campaigns and with no desire to reproach the county chairman, who was probably led astray by enthusiasm.—Independent.  
**To Pray at Home.**  
In a proclamation issued by Governor Withycombe, designating October as Go-to-Sunday-School Day, but owing to the Spanish influenza embargo it is requested that the people pray in their homes on that day. The Governor says in his proclamation: "Being mindful of the importance of Sunday School work, I respectfully call upon the leaders in the Bible School movement to plan such an observance of Go-to-Sunday-School Day as shall emphasize the necessity

And I further request that in every Sunday School in Oregon devout prayer shall be offered on October 27th that Almighty God shall grant speedy triumph to the allies in their heroic struggle for righteousness and justice. Let us make this Sunday an occasion of solemn devotion and supplication to Him who is guarding and defending our sailors and soldiers and comforting those who have suffered bereavement because of the war."  
**Carter-Whalin Wedding.**  
On Monday evening, a pretty wedding occurred at the beautiful country home of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Neilson, when Miss Hazel Onetta Whalin became the war bride of Corporal C. S. Carter. The ring ceremony was used and the nuptial knot was tied by Rev. Harry E. Tucker, of the Christian Church. The young couple will reside at Vancouver, Wash. and will be at home there after the 6th of November.  
**Sugar Violators in Bad.**  
There are quite a number of sugar violators in Tillamook county who will have trouble with the Federal Authorities. They undertook to beat the game of procuring more sugar than they were entitled to by purchasing sugar at different stores, thinking, no doubt, they would not be detected. Some have even gone to the same store and obtained double their allowance, and this makes it hard on the store keeper. The sugar cards have been scrutinized and reveals the fact that about 50 persons in the county will be prosecuted by the Federal Authorities for violating the sugar ruling, their names having been reported. The authorities have the proof in the fact that they have the cards with the person's signature to it of receiving the sugar.  
These are clear cases of violating the sugar ruling, and there is no way of getting out of it for those who thought they would not be detected. They have been and they will have to stand the consequences.  
**Spanish Influenza Situation in Tillamook County.**  
Thus far Tillamook county has not developed many cases of Spanish influenza, and there is a good deal of speculation whether the county will be effected with the disease as in some other localities. Ten cases have been reported, none of which were considered serious. Dr. Boals is willing to take the embargo off, but does not want to go contrary to the State Health Officer, for should the embargo be taken off and the disease spread over the county, then the state authorities would attribute that to lifting the embargo. Although it was thought at first that two weeks embargo would be sufficient, it may be necessary to extend the time. That the disease is taking firm hold in some places is freely admitted, with an increase in the death rate, and this necessitates that proper precautions be taken when the first symptoms appear. All cases should be quarantined as soon as possible after a person is stricken.  
Word was received this morning that Spanish influenza had made its appearance at Wheeler, there being 30 cases reported.  
**Oregon Military Police Take Hand In Liberty Loan Drive.**  
The Oregon Military Police for the past two weeks has had two of its members in our midst, rendering some assistance to the Liberty Loan Drive and about \$20,150 was subscribed through their efforts. When it is taken into consideration that most of this came from those who had either refused to subscribe or had subscribed far below their rating it is a showing that the organization can be justly proud of.  
The Oregon Military Police is a body of men gotten together through the untiring efforts of Major Richard Deich, who is a patient, economic and efficient gentleman. He has a thorough system of weeding out undesirable, and he organized a body of men that have been of material assistance in their every line of endeavor, throughout the state.  
In larger cities the lurking I. W. W.'s have ever been present, but through fear of the boys walking posts around and in the ship yards this element can not gain a foothold. Too much credit cannot be given one of our fellow townsmen "Jitney" Smith. From early morning until late at night he has donated the use of his car, and through his vast acquaintance he has been the means of saving the detail from the Oregon Military Police much time and expense. Accosted by many who wanted to pay him for the use of his car, he would invariably answer "My car is being used now by Uncle Sam and until he is through it is not for hire."
