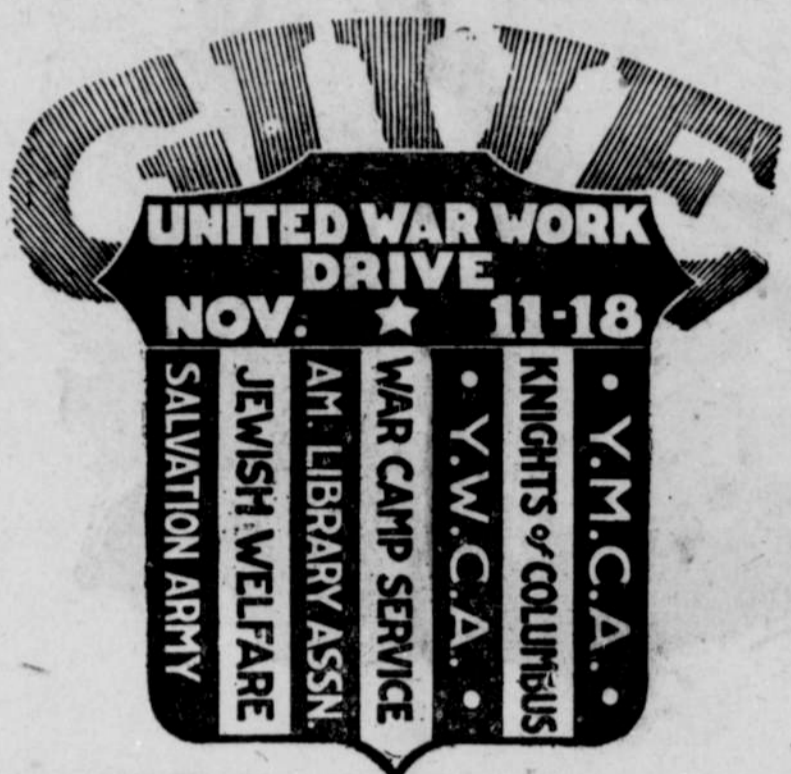

Congressman Hawley Takes Action in Grand Ronde Post Road.
Washington, D. C., Nov. 1, 1918.
Hon. Fred C. Baker, Tillamook, Ore.
My Dear Friend.—I have presented the proposal for the establishment of a star route between Willamina and Hebo to Mr. Geo. L. Wood, superintendent of the Division of Rural Mails in the office of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General. This division prepares all advertisements inviting proposals for star route service, receives proposals, prepares awards for the execution of all contracts, and prepares all orders for the establishment of or change in star routes.
We went over the matter together on the map, and in connection with your letter and those received from other gentlemen, he appears to be quite favorably impressed with the proposal, after our examination, and promised to give it immediate attention. It may be necessary to have the proposed route inspected by a postal inspector, if the data in the Department and in the letters I filed with my statement are not sufficient to satisfy the Department.
Some mention has been made of a petition and other papers explanatory of the proposal, but to date such have not reached me. I will give the matter further attention and do all possible to have the route established. The outlook appears favorable.

The District Attorney and Teachers' Salaries.
To the Editor of the Headlight:
There appears to be considerable misunderstanding amongst the teachers of this county as to an opinion which I was supposed to have rendered on the right of the directors of the various school districts to pay the teachers their salaries during the time the schools remain closed on account of the influenza, and I am writing this to clear up the matter.
As a matter of fact I have not rendered any written opinion on the question, but did give Mr. Lamb, our county school superintendent, a verbal opinion to this effect: That if the directors were compelled to close the schools by authority of law the district would not be obliged to pay the teachers; but that if they closed them of their own accord or were not obliged to do so by authority of law then the district would be liable. In other words, if the Surgeon General of the United States Health Commission, who it is reported closed the same, was not clothed by law with such authority, or if, being clothed with such authority, he did not proceed according to law in closing the schools, the district would be liable.
As to my own personal feelings in the matter, I believe the teachers ought to be paid as long as the district continues to hold them on the job; however, the teachers ought not to condemn the directors for withholding the salaries until they can get an opinion from the attorney general on the question, which has been submitted to him, for the reason that if they pay out any school moneys without authority of law, they would be come personally liable for such expenditure.

Guernsey Calf Swells Tillamook Red Cross Funds.
In September, 1918, the first pure bred Guernsey female was brought into Tillamook county. Since then Guernsey enthusiasm has grown until now there are about 100 pure bred females in the county. Some twenty-five breeders have organized a County Guernsey Club and are looking out for the interest of the breed in the county.
This fall, Jos. Durrer, the president of the club, donated Red Cross Marie a pure bred heifer calf, to the Tillamook Red Cross. The live-stock committee of the Red Cross decided to sell this calf at auction at the Oregon State Fair. She was entered in the show ring and easily won the blue ribbon. At the auction sale on Friday she brought a total of \$306 which together with the \$20.00 prize money goes to the Red Cross fund. The purchasers were Calkins and Riggs, of Middledale farm, Creswell, Oregon.
Red Cross Marie is sired by Jolly Fermain No. 37639, owned by Frank Hunter of Tillamook and her dam is Lady Boeep of Edgemore No. 59520, a daughter of Boeep Mar of Iowa. She is therefore a direct descendant of Glencoe's Boeep, the many times Grand Champion at the National Dairy Show. The calf is as straight and nice as her grandmother and given a chance, should make a mark for herself.
Mr. Durrer has two sons in Uncle Sam's service, one in France and one in the Navy. He has one of the best herds in the Tillamook Testing Association of which he has been a member since its inception in 1912. The yearly average production of his herd of about forty cows the six years has increased as shown in the following table:
1912—7240 lbs. milk, 314 lbs. fat.
1914—6906 lbs. milk, 305.4 lbs. fat.
1915—6591 lbs. milk, 302.6 lbs. fat.
1916—7156 lbs. milk, 313.6 lbs. fat.
1917—7377 lbs. milk, 343.8 lbs. fat.
Is it any wonder that Mr. Durrer states that the money he spent in cow testing and better bulls is the best investment he has ever made?
Mr. Durrer has five pure bred females in his herd only one of which has completed a year's work. Imported Dame of Sarnia as a three year old made 6851 lbs. milk and 420.7 lbs. fat with ordinary good farm care. This product sold at an average price of 61c. per pound for butterfat or a total of \$257.60. She consumed \$78.20 worth of feed, leaving a net profit above feed cost of \$179.40. She returned \$3.04 for every dollar invested in feed and made butter fat for 18.6c. per pound. All honors to Mr. Durrer and his herd and many thanks to them from the Tillamook Branch of the Red Cross. Who knows how much suffering the Guernsey calf will relieve?

Andy Nolan is Safe.
On Tuesday a telegram was received giving the glad news that Andy Nolan had arrived at Manila, who is well known here and is a brother of Mrs. R. W. Watson. Nolan had graduated from the nautical department of the Shipping Board, and was appointed third mate of the steamer Damaru, which was recently launched at Portland and on her maiden trip. Between Manila and Guam the vessel ran into an electric storm and being struck with lightning, the vessel, which was loaded with gasoline, was soon in flames. Three boats managed to get away from the burning vessel, the only one picked up for a long time was the one containing the captain. As nothing was heard of the other boats for two weeks, it was thought they were lost as a severe storm prevailed when the boats parted company.

Influenza Situation Is Bad.
The latter part of last week the Spanish influenza situation became more serious, a large number of new cases being reported in this city. Whether this was owing to people congregating last Thursday, when the false report reached here that Germany had signed the armistice is a debatable question, but since then the disease has increased.
Three deaths are reported with a number of serious cases as well.
The deaths are: Carl Olson a logger, died at Wheeler, on Tuesday.
Harold, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Vantress in this city, died this morning. He was eight years of age.
W. Hall, who drives the passenger stage between this city and Cloverdale, died at the latter place.
With the influenza situation becoming more serious, there is no prospect of the embargo being lifted on Saturday, in fact it would be a mistake to do so.

THE BEAST OF BERLIN QUILTS THE HUN THRONE.
War Ends Suddenly When Germany Signs Armistice—Kaiser Flees To Netherlands.
Early Monday morning telephone messages were received in this city that Germany had signed the armistice and that the Kaiser and the Crown Prince had suddenly left Germany and had gone to the Netherlands for safety. Most everybody wanted to know whether the Oregonian and the Associated Press confirmed the news, for they still remembered how the Portland Journal had played a hoax and humbugged the people by sending out false news which was the second of a like nature.
The local committee that was appointed last week to look after the matter of a demonstration met Monday morning and decided to have one that afternoon. The saw mill whistle was blown at one o'clock and soon after people flocked to the city. The fire department, Home Guards, Red Cross and a large number of autos, bedecked with Stars and Stripes paraded the business streets, after which there were exercises, Mayor R. T. Boals and Attorney R. H. McGrath making patriotic speeches.
In the evening there was another demonstration and a lively time.

To All Retailers of Tillamook County.
All persons who have finished their canning and still have on hand some canning sugar, which they purchased for canning purposes, must return or account for the sugar at the store where they are purchasing their sugar.
If such persons have over 25 pounds they must return it. If they have less than 25 pounds they have the right to return it or notify you of the exact amount which they have on hand and you are to indorse it upon their monthly sugar card and they will then be authorized to use the sugar for their daily use at the rate of 3 pounds per person per month, and should not purchase any other sugar until the same has been completely used up.
I wish you would post this letter in some conspicuous place in your store and also give it as much publicity as possible. I am having the same published in the county newspapers.
