DATE OF ANNUAL CONVENTION.

Of Oregon Butter and Cheese Makers' Association Announced.

The Executive Committee of the Oregon Butter and Cheese Makers' Association are laying plans for the biggest convention in the history of their association. At a joint meeting of the executive committee with the factorymen of Portland, it was decided to hold the meet this year in Portland at the Hotel Portland, the date, Wednesday and Thursday, December 11 and 12. The Portland boys are giving members of the association their unequalled support, and indications are that all parts of the state will be well represented by butter and cheesemakers.

The program while not definitely arranged will include speakers from the United States Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Markets, Oregon Agricultural College, and leaders in the butter and cheese business. Definite announcement of program will be made in a few weeks. The entertainment committee is working out some features that will mix well with the more serious part of the meeting.

Prizes and cash aggregating \$350 will be offered for butter and cheese entries at the exhibit to be held in connection with the convention. In addition to the medals and cash offered by the association the dairy manufacturing firms have been very liberal in their cash and product contributions to the prize fund. For butter the following are offered:

First place—Solid gold medal of the association. 10,000 butter cartons. Silver plated butter trier. Three gallons B. K. disinfectant.

Second place—Solid silver medal of the association.

Nafis acidity test outfit.

Third place—Bronze medal of the association.

Specials—Gold watch for the highest scoring butter salted with Worcester salt.

Gold watch and chain for highest scoring butter colored with Golden Glow color.

The association offers fifty dollars to be delivered prorata among butter and cheese entries scoring 90 or over. Winner of a first cannot share in this money.

For cheese the following will be awarded:

First place—Solid gold medal of the association. Silver plated cheese trier. Three gallons B. K. disinfectant. Cheese Preparation of the Digestive Ferments Co.

Second place—Solid silver medal of the association.

Third place—Bronze medal of the association.

Specials—Waltham 17 jewel gold watch for highest scoring cheese made with Marshalls' rennet extract. \$20 gold piece for highest scoring cheese made with Hansens' rennet and color.

Prorata money allowed butter and cheese makers.

Exhibits must be sent to the Oregon Butter and Cheese Makers' Association, Hotel Portland, Portland, Oregon so as to reach there by Tuesday morning December 10. A tripartite size cheese or cube of butter, inside dimensions 5x6x5 will constitute an exhibit.

Out of state makers and visitors are cordially invited to attend. Make your plans, as well as hotel reservations early.

Food Administration Satisfied With Handling of Tillamook Cheese.

Some time ago Carl Haberlach received a letter from the Food Administration regarding advances in cheese market. The matter was taken up with some of the directors and Mr. Haberlach wrote the Department going into detail as to how he arrived at the market price and cheese conditions in general. It is of interest to all the dairymen of Tillamook County to read the reply of the Food Administration to Mr. Haberlach's letter, which reply follows:

United States Food Administration
November 16, 1918

Mr. Haberlach,
Dear Sir:—Some time ago I wrote you, from the office of U. S. Food Adm. asking for particulars as to how you are handling the distribution of Tillamook Cheese, etc. and in a few days I had your letter of explanation. In it you seem to think that we were about to start a hear-

ing in the matter of cheese, and you ask that in this event, you folks of Tillamook have a representative present.

Will say that we have contemplated nothing of this sort; that we are satisfied that the manner in which you folks are handling this product is O. K.; that you are figuring your selling price on a figure based on that of competitive Eastern goods; that we know you have had, and likely will have, your troubles; that we are proud of the article you are turning out; that we hope the business will continue to grow and the fame of your product increase; and that we have your interests at heart and from us you have every well wish. Trusting that prices of feed may be lower soon; that you will have a mild winter, and that the make of cheese may be larger and larger, and that prices may be large enough to afford a fine profit to the producers. Red Cross Work to Continue.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 13, 1918.

My dear Mrs. Edwards,—On February 19th, last year, nearly six weeks before the United States declared war, National Red Cross headquarters advised its Chapters to prepare for war. That which has followed in the record of the Red Cross in helping to win the war and to relieve the suffering growing out of it, constitutes something of which every American has a right to be proud. Every American Red Cross worker must feel a sense of gratitude in having had a share in it all.

The moment of peace is now come. But with peace let no one suppose that the work of the Red Cross is finished. Millions of American boys are still under arms. Thousands of them are sick and wounded. Owing to the shortage in shipping, it may take a year or more to bring our boys home from France. But whatever the time, our protecting arms must be about them and their families over the whole period which must elapse before the normal life of peace can be resumed.

Our soldiers and sailors are enlisted until the commander in chief tells them there is no more work for them to do in the war. Let every Red Cross member and worker show our returning soldiers and sailors, that to care for their health, welfare and happiness, we are enlisted for no less period than they are.

We are advised from Washington that calls from Red Cross Commissions in many parts of the world indicate an almost unlimited need for civilian relief abroad. Your branch, should, therefore, make every effort to furnish at once all the refugee garments that have been allotted to you in order to be prepared to take care of additional orders. The Bureau of Chapter Production is now preparing additional allotments of refugee garments and will issue them rapidly as one garment will be of infinitely greater service in saving life than many garments after winter is past.

Those who have been making surgical dressings should know of this need for refugee garments and should be urged to enlist in this branch of work. We suggest that you hold meetings at once at your workrooms reading to workers the contents of this letter, explaining the necessary change in work. Further information will follow as the situation develops.

The cessation of war will reveal a picture of misery such as the world has never seen before, especially in the many countries which cannot help themselves. The American people will expect the Red Cross to continue to act as their agent in repairing broken spirits and broken bodies. Peace terms and peace conditions will determine how we may best minister to the vast stricken areas which have been harrowed by war, and in this great act of mercy, the heart and spirit of the American people must continue to be mobilized through the American Red Cross.

On behalf of the War Council, we accordingly ask each member of our splendid body of workers throughout the land to bear in mind the solemn obligation which rests upon each one to "Carry On"; we cannot abate one instant in our efforts or in our spirit. There will be an abundance of work to do and specific advices will be given, but even at the moment of peace let no Red Cross worker falter.

Our spirits must now call us to show that it is not the roar of cannon nor the blood of our own alone, that directs our activities, but that a great people will continue to respond greatly and freely to its obligation and opportunity to serve mankind.

This closes one page in the history of this division, the realization that the surgical dressings made by the loyal women of the Northwest have saved the lives of many boys will be a source of life long gratification to all who have participated in the work. In rejoicing that this phase of Red Cross activity is no longer necessary let us not forget the misery and suffering throughout the world that still call to us to continue our production activity along other lines.
