### FINDS TIME TO PRAY.

#### Field Marshal Foch Does Not Neglect Religion During War.

A California boy, Evans by name, with the American expeditionary forces in France has written a letter to his parents in San Bernardino, telling of meeting General Foch at close range in France. Evans had gone into an old church to have a look at it. As he stood with bared head, satisfying his respectful curiosity, a gray man with the eagles of a general on the collar of his shabby uniform also entered the church. Evans paid small attention at first, but was curious to see him kneel in the church, praying. The minutes passed until nearly an hour had gone by before the gray man arose from his knees.

Then Evans followed the gray man down the street and was surprised to see soldiers salute him in great excitement, and women and children stopping in their tracks with awestruck faces as he passed. It was Field Marshal Foch. Now Evans of San Bernardino counts the experience of one of the greatest of his life.

During the hour General Foch was on his knees in that silent church in humble supplication 10,000 guns were roaring at his word. Millions of armed men were crouching in trenches or rushing across blood-drenched earth at his command. Generals and field marshals, artillery, cavalry, infantry, engineers and tanks fought as he commanded them to do and in no other manner, as he prayed in that little church.

Nor was it an unusual thing for General Foch to do. It is said that there is never a day that he does not do the same thing if there be a church that he can reach. He never fails to spend an hour on his knees every morning, and every night it is the same. He has done this during his entire life.

#### Irish Corporal Captures Youthful Hun in Shell Hole.

### A Question

#### Portland Prepares to Welcome Butter and Cheese Makers.

Portland is preparing to welcome the ninth annual convention of the Oregon Butter and Cheese Makers Association which will assemble here at the Portland Hotel, December 11 and 12. Representatives of Oregon Agricultural College and the State Dairy and Food Commissioner's office will assist the local business men in making the visit of the delegates an interesting and helpful occasion.

The Oregon Dairy Council, an organization formed to further the interests of all the branches of the dairy industry will lend a hand in making the gathering a notable affair.

J. D. Mickle, State Dairy and Food Commissioner, in speaking of the coming convention yesterday said:

"These are days of great opportunity for the butter and cheese makers of Oregon. In fact the dairy industry in all its branches should have more attention than ever before. Oregon has a chance to become known all over the United States and all over the world, for that matter, because of the excellence of its dairy products. The butter and cheese makers will have a big part in the success of this state as it comes before the country more and more as a district rich in products that feed humanity and no food is more important than food obtained from the dairies. I hope every man in the two lines of business represented in the association will come to the convention. He will be royally welcomed. He will help every other man who attends and will gather much information and inspiration that will assist him in building up his own interests."

At the recent meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's League resolutions were adopted asking that the office of Dairy and Food Commissioner be maintained as now as a separate and distinct administrative branch of the state government as the dairy industry represents an income of approximately \$20,000,000 annually and is deserving of this recognition.

The Oregon Dairy Council, which was a temporary organization formed to assist the industry by spreading the doctrine for a greater use and appreciation of milk and milk products, to assist the dairymen in their feed and labor problems and to help maintain a high standard of products and of herds, has been so successful that a strong demand is heard for the permanent foundation of the council. As a result the council will soon be on a firm basis. O. D. Center, director of extension service at O. A. C. is president, E. C. Callaway is secretary and J. D. Mickle, treasurer. On the board are representatives of various branches of the dairy industry and mill men, business men, representatives of the bureau of health and others well known.
