### Notice as to Stock Running at Large

Notice is hereby given, that at a general election held in the various precincts of Tillamook County, State of Oregon, on the 5th day of November, A. D. 1918, a vote was taken for and against stock running at large in the precincts of said county of Garibaldi, Nehalem, and that portion of Wilson precinct described as follows:

### New Kind of Loan Shark

A new kind of "loan shark" has developed. He is the money sharp who buys an equity in a Liberty Loan Bond that is only partly paid for by an employee who is purchasing it on the installment plan.

These sharks have snipers among working people and pay them for acting as agents. The "agent" tips off a fellow-workman that he can get ready money in a hurry by selling his liberty bond in spite of the fact he has not paid for it. Of course there will be a discount. If the worker is hard up he often falls for the bait. The discount is applied to the full price of the bond but is deducted from the portion already paid in by the employe. The result is that the employe often receives an amount equal to only half the cash that has accrued to his credit. The assignment he signs forces the employer to turn the bond over to the shark upon receipt of the balance of the payment due.

Liberty Loan authorities are doing their utmost to head off these practices. It would be well if employers would post notices in their shops informing employes that there is no need of their sacrificing their liberty bonds. If it is necessary for anyone to sell a bond, the full market price can be obtained for it over the counter of any reliable bond house. The transaction is a clean business transaction and can be conducted in a business way without working secretly through some broker who makes a long profit out of the necessities of a humble subscriber to the Liberty Loan. At present the market discount on a \$50 Liberty Bond is only about a dollar, which amount is more than balanced by accrued interest on \$50 bonds bearing coupons due less than three months from now, so that anyone owning a \$50 bond and needing the money can usually get the full \$50 for it over the bond banker's counter, or at least get within a dollar of the \$50, depending on the amount of interest that has accrued and the relation of that interest to the market price of the bond.

### Highway Restriction Off

War restriction on supplies of labor and material for highway construction have been abandoned in so far as same were under control of the U. S. Highway Council. States, counties and communities are at liberty to proceed with their own projects for highway construction without reporting in advance to the council or awaiting its approval of applications on file. This does away with obtaining permits before December 10 for highway work proposed to be done during 1919.

Supplies of steel for bridge work and of a few other materials are still under control by the War Industries Board, but applications for these materials is made through the contractors in the ordinary way at the time the order is placed with the manufacturer. There is no necessity of advance approval of the project by this board.

The Capital Issues Committee is retaining control over the road bond issues and from indications will retain such control until after the next Liberty Loan. It has liberalized its policy, however, by granting permits for nearly every highway bond issue that has been passed to it for approval.

Sentiment of national authority during war time has been strongly favorable to highway construction wherever same could be conducted without too great interference with essential war work. Now that peace is in sight highway work will have the right of way it deserves as the main factor in developing the country.
