BROTHERS IN CASUALTY LIST.
John Nielson is Missing and L. N. Nielson Severely Wounded.
Recent casualty lists from the Western front in France give the names of two Tillamook boys, sons of Mr. and Mrs. N. M. Nielson, who reside south of Tillamook city.
John Nielson is reported as missing and L. N. Nielson as severely wounded.
Mr. and Mrs. Nielson have another son in the army, Victor Nielson, who is still in this country.
L. N. Nielson was drafted from the Grays Harbor country, where he operated a ranch in partnership with Harry Swenson. L. N. Nielson and Victor Nielson were drafted from Tillamook county.
Death of James Taggart.
James Taggart was born in Shopman Township, near the village of Shipman, Macoupin Co, Illinois, Feb. 15, 1850, and died at Neskwon, Or., Dec. 14, 1918, aged 68 years and 10 months.
While a young man attending college at De Pauw University in Greencastle, Indiana, he was converted and joined the Methodist church. The deceased came to Oregon in 1887 or 1888, and was married to Miss Jessie F. Cutler, at Salem, Oregon, June 15, 1890. One son, Oscar Edwin, was born to them. Two brothers still live, one in Penn., the other in Illinois by letter some years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Taggart were transferred to the Christian church, the only denomination where they were living, believing they could work with them to more advantage, and afterward attended that church at Salem for some years.
They moved to their present home, Wildwood ranch, at Neskwon, some sixteen years ago, to engage in dairying.
His health began to fail some three years ago, but only lately has the condition grown serious. Heart trouble seemed to be the immediate cause of his death. Friday, Dec. 13, he sank into a deep sleep from which he never gained consciousness but passed away at 12:30 a.m. Saturday.
The Quarantine Ordinance.
The City Council amended the quarantine ordinance to cover Spanish influenza, which is as follows:
That whenever the health officer of Tillamook City, Oregon, shall learn by rumor or otherwise that any person within the corporate limits of Tillamook City has been exposed or inoculated or affected with small pox, diptheria, measles, scarlet fever, Spanish influenza, or any other malignant, infectious, or contagious disease, it shall be his duty to make a medical and thorough investigation of the cause of such report, and if he is satisfied of the existence of any of the diseases mentioned in this ordinance, he shall at once declare the house, boat, booth, tent, or other building, or structure of whatever kind or nature, in which any person shall frequent or abide in, together with such person or persons so exposed or affected by any such diseases, to be in a state of quarantine by the display of a danger flag or signal to be displayed in a public place upon the premises, and the flag or signal used for small pox shall be of a red color; for diptheria, black; for measles or scarlet fever, yellow; and for any other malignant, contagious or infectious diseases, orange; and when any such flag shall be displayed on any premises such premises shall be deemed in a state of quarantine.
The ordinance also gives the health officer authority to prohibit public meetings and gatherings, and provides the penalties.
Bad Gun Accident.
Leland Bester will be maimed for life on account of a bad accident that happened to him on Sunday. He had been hunting with his brother, Arthur Bester, on the Wilson river, in a row boat, on Sunday, and after returning to the bank of the river and while in the act of taking the gun from the boat, the gun discharged shattering the boy's right arm. Arthur Bester had the presence of mind to tie the arm above the injured part, which prevented the unfortunate boy from bleeding to death. The boys had to walk a mile to reach their home and when they did so the telephone was out of order. After some time Dr. Boals was advised of the accident and the injuries being of such a serious nature the arm had to be amputated. Leland is a son of Frank Bester, who is a dairyman residing at Fairview and is 16 years of age.
