At a meeting of the city council on Monday evening another ordinance was introduced to "bottle up" the city for two weeks. It was not thought advisable to take action and to wait and see what effect the ordinance passed last week will have in stamping out the Spanish influenza. B. C. Lamb, president of the First National Bank, was appointed city treasurer.  
Representative Jones, of Lincoln and Polk, presented a bill in the house providing for a \$2,500,000 for a Roosevelt coast military highway to extend through Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties to the California line, being contingent on the Federal Government appropriating a like amount and providing for floating bonds for the project.  
Roy L. Cook, the druggist in Clough's drug store, was arrested for not having his mask properly adjusted. This is how it happened. He was wearing a mask and while doing something had cause to raise it, when Marshal Noyes was in the store. The case was to be tried before the City Recorder, but as the ordinance did not permit more than four persons to be present, the case was continued until after the ban on meetings is taken off.  
**Lightening Destroys Barn.**  
Lightening struck Preston Marolf's barn at nine o'clock this morning and was totally destroyed by fire. His herd of cows were in the barn at the time, and neighbors hastening to render assistance succeeded in saving all but four head. About 60 tons of hay was also destroyed. It is a serious loss to Mr. Marolf, as he had only \$1,200 insurance on the hay and barn.  
There is a report that another barn was destroyed by fire with an auto in it.  
**City Marshal Fined for Violating Flu Ordinance.**  
The first person to be pinched for violating the new flu ordinance was City Marshal W. E. Noyes, who violated the law in holding a special sale in disposing of a stray horse, at which between 40 and 50 persons were present. The city marshal acted according to law in posting notices of the sale of a stray horse, before the flu ordinance went into effect, but failed to postpone the sale when the embargo became operative. The city marshal pleaded guilty on Tuesday to a complaint sworn to by W. B. Alderman, and the City Recorder Mrs. Stranahan, made him pungle up \$25.00.  
**Death of C. A. Altenburger.**  
One of the victims of Spanish Influenza last week was Charles Altenburger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Altenburger. He was born at Portland, Oregon, May 21, 1893, and spent most of his life at Vancouver, Washington, with his parents. From there he moved to Blaine, Ore., Feb. 24, 1917. He married Ruth Grey, of Blaine, and lived on his farm till death took him. He died Tuesday morning, Jan. 14, 1919. He is survived by his wife, his parents, two sisters, Mrs. Rose Bauer and Mrs. M. D. Sandridge, three brothers, Henry, Joseph and Albert, to mourn his death.  
He was 25 years, 8 months and 14 days old at the time of his death. Services were conducted by Rev. Harry E. Tucker, at the grave.

**FLU SITUATION BETTER**  
Few New Cases Reported—Six Deaths in County.  
The flu situation in this city and county is somewhat improving, and the wave that went over the county recently is thought to have expended itself. The quarantine regulations in this city, no doubt, will bring about a great improvement, and on that account the danger of contracting the disease is greatly minimized. It would be a good thing if all parts of the county had the same quarantine regulations as this city, where patients and the entire household are quarantined. The citizens generally heartily approve of this method and expect to see good results.

**County Officials' Salaries.**  
Senator T. B. Handley and Representative C. J. Edwards have under consideration the matter of county officials' salaries, as they have been requested to introduce a bill to increase the same. The salaries of most of the county officials are far below that of other counties of like population and assessed valuation of the county, and for that reason and on account of the high cost of living, Tillamook county officials consider they are entitled to more pay. This is the raise that is proposed to be incorporated in a bill at the State Legislature:  
County Judge ..... \$2,500.00  
Increase, \$1,300.00  
Sheriff ..... \$2,500.00  
Increase \$900.00  
County Clerk ..... \$2,000.00  
Increase \$400.00  
Assessor ..... \$2,000.00  
Increase \$800.00  
County School Supt. .... \$1,800.00  
Increase \$800.00  
County Treasurer ..... \$1,200.00  
Increase \$200.00  
County Surveyor, per day ... \$7.00  
Increase \$2.00 per day.  
District Attorney ..... \$2,000.00

This makes an increase in salaries of \$5,200.00, not including that of the surveyor.  
**Legislators Confer With Court.**  
Senator T. B. Handley and Representative C. J. Edwards came in from Salem on Friday to confer with the County Court and some of the citizens regarding matters pertaining to Tillamook county. On Saturday the local attorneys met, with Senator Handley in his office to discuss the salary of the district attorney. A conference was held with the County Court, when several persons were present. Lincoln county is wanting to concede a small portion of that county, or vice versa, so that one or the other county can build a road between the two counties. It was thought best that Tillamook county take the territory and build the road. Another matter of considerable importance to this county was a proposition to build a hard surfaced road from Portland via Astoria, Seaside, and Neah-Kah-Nie mountain to Tillamook City. This is a proposition that will come before the state legislature and the State Highway Commission, and the local law makers were anxious to know what the county court and the people of the county thought about it. It met with hearty approval and County Judge Hare said the county would guarantee a 50-50 proposition for the building of a hard surfaced road from Nehalem to this city, provided the proposed bond election is favorably voted upon. The County Judge was of the opinion that the State Highway Commission should undertake the building of the road round Neah-Kah-Nie mountain. Clatsop county is highly interested in this project, and with the assistance of Multnomah's delegation it is thought that this can be carried out. Messrs. Handley and Edwards left on the train on Sunday, and being held up at Mohler, beat it out of the county via Seaside.

**DRASTIC FLU ORDINANCE.**  
Quarantine Patients and Homes—Masks to be Worn.  
The City Council on Thursday evening met to reconsider the ordinance which had been discussed the previous evening, which was to quarantine the city against Spanish influenza. The ordinance provides for the health of inhabitants of Tillamook City; providing for a strict quarantine of the disease commonly called Spanish Influenza; requiring all physicians and other persons having knowledge thereof to report cases occurring within the territorial limits of Tillamook City and requiring the City Health Officer to investigate all reports of such cases, requiring the City Recorder to keep and publish lists of quarantined places and persons; making it unlawful for any person residing without the territorial limits of Tillamook City who has been exposed to come or be within the territorial limits of Tillamook City; creating the office of Quarantine Controller, appointing W. J. Hill to such office, fixing his salary and prescribing his duties and authority; closing certain places of business for a limited time; requiring the wearing of masks; providing for the punishment of violations thereof; suspending the operation and force of all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; and declaring an emergency.  
The first part of the ordinance, that referring to reporting and quarantining cases to remain in effect until July 31, 1919.  
The penalty is placed at from \$25. to \$100.00. For a period of two weeks it is unlawful to hold or keep open for public attendance any public meeting or gathering, or any party of more than five persons, or any dance, pool room, card room, theatre, moving picture show, church, school, or club, lodge, etc.  
The section in regard to wearing masks is as follows:  
Section 18.—All proprietors, clerks and attendants of and in all offices, stores and places of business within the territorial limits of Tillamook City, and all persons who may enter any such office, store and/or place of business are hereby required for a period of two weeks from the time of the taking effect of this ordinance, to wear, during all the time they may be in such office, store, and/or in place of business any person other than the proprietor, clerk and attendants being present, a mask, of a type approved by the City Health Officer of Tillamook City. A customer actually being operated upon by a dentist or actually being examined by a physician, or a person eating or drinking in a public eating or drinking place; while so eating or drinking shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.  
The penalty for going into a place of business without a mask is placed at \$10.00, and the same penalty applies to those who are in offices, stores, etc, if they fail to have a mask on when another person enters the building or office.  
Mayor Boals signed the ordinance on Saturday and it went into effect that day at noon, and was generally complied with.  
As the flu ordinance failed to mention where and how a person was to wear a flu mask, this part of the ordinance was amended on Monday evening.
