Accordingly a French writer proposes the spirit of the dead shall be felt in the reconstruction of the country which they saved, by a "sufferage of the dead." This will permit these dead and gone heroes to vote through the intermediary of the women in their families and in this way woman suffrage may come to France. France owes this to the wives and mothers of its heroes.

Sending under government frank of advertisements for honor rolls to relatives of soldiers whose names appear in the casualty lists was criticized in the Senate the other day by Senator Borah. The senator read a letter signed by the American Honor

Roll Company of Hartford, Conn., agreeing to send an honor roll to the recipient of the letter for \$1. The letter, he said, was received in an envelope from the office of the adjutant general and sent under government frank. Senator Borah said this was a "picayunish petit larceny system to get \$1 out of the kin of those wounded in this war," and added that his purpose of bringing the matter to the attention of the Senate was so the adjutant general's office would know how this matter is being carried on.

What the War Really Cost.

It is far from the real truth to measure the cost of the recent war in dollars and cents. The war cost: Killed and died of wounds 7,909,768 Wounded, died of disease and maimed 31,591,758 Total 39,501,526 This is a terrible toll "to make the world safe for democracy"; and the world is still far from that desirable haven.

The War After the War.

The war has to a limited extent created a condition favorable to the American cotton goods exporter. Great Britain, which before the war enjoyed leadership in this field, has been forced by the necessity of concentrating on war production to curtail her exports of cotton goods. This has enabled the American manufacturer to gain a stronger foothold in several foreign markets, notably Latin American and the Far East, although his ability to take advantage of the situation has been restricted by the lack of tonnage and later by participation of the United States in the conflict.

Great Britain will shortly be in a position to resume her exports of textiles in about normal volume, it is believed.

We are Some Spenders.

It cost Great Britain, Senator Frank Kellogg reminds us, thirty-four billion dollars to carry on the war four years, raise five million men, clothe, equip and care for them, police the seas of the world and transport millions of men, and buy all the necessary supplies, many of them in our markets at the war prices, and convey them to Europe. Not including loans, the United States will have spent when the bills are paid, thirty-one billion dollars, and counting the loans to the allies, our total outlay will be equal to that of Great Britain. The worst part of it is that now the war is over there is no signs of cessation of extravagance; it is evident the waste is to go on so long as Congress continues to furnish the money from the people's pockets.

Poison Gas Causes Flu.

The chief of a hospital in Kansas City agrees with the Chicago doctor who thinks the plague is not influenza or a form of pneumonia, but is a nerve disease caused by poison. The Chicago statement the other day went on to say that the disease does not act like a germ disease; and the Kansas City doctor remarks that it is something new. "I believe it is a epidemic of poisoning, resulting in the breaking down of the central nerve station. The Chicago statement attributes the plague to the release into the air for several years without intermission of poisoned gas in France, the result of being a corruption of the atmosphere near the earth. The 'flu' is at any rate the most terrible scourge this country has suffered in a generation. It is reported that the morality of the larger insurance companies will be forced to the wall."

OREGON EXCEEDS ITS WAR STAMP QUOTA.

Clatsop County Heads List for Over-Subscription and Tillamook 8th.

Final computation of figures for Oregon's war savings stamp campaign for 1918 shows that the state, as in all other patriotic drives, exceeded its allotted quota. Purchases throughout the state amounted to \$16,489,972.83. This is one-half of 1 percent in excess of the state quota, according to figures given out at the state headquarters.

The figures show further that 13 of the 36 counties of Oregon exceeded their quotas, with Clatsop County taking the lead, both in over-subscriptions and in obtaining its quota first.

Oregon's quota, as originally fixed by the Treasury Department, was \$17,253,740. This was a \$20 per capita, giving the state an estimated population of 862,687. Later readjustments brought the quota down to \$16,414,326.

The record of each county, showing quota, maturity value of stamps sold and percentage standing follows:

In making public the final figures, State Director C. S. Jackson said:

"The war saving result is another testimonial to Oregon's loyal support of the Government's war finance. But for the influenza epidemic, we would have sold from 10 to 15 per cent more stamps. We timed our clean up campaign to begin in October, at the close of the fourth liberty loan drive. Then the flu struck the state and we were deprived of the splendid assistance we should have had from the school children. Multnomah county affords an illustration of the conditions that we had to meet. It came within 1.6 per cent of its quota. It is easy to see that but

for the epidemic the county would not only have made its quota, but would have reported a very substantial surplus. The subsidence of the war enthusiasm affected us far less than it did other lines of patriotic work. A year of educational work has informed Oregonians of the value of the stamps, and as the year drew to its close there was a notable tendency on the part of the investors to increase their holdings, coupled with purchases by people who had not previously bought, and lively inquiry for the 1919 series. The war savings stamps has established itself and the outlook for this year's business is exceptionally bright."
